Christmas in the 'Horse and Jockey'

The Horse and Jockey's snug houses this white hat in a glass case. Why? As a popular meeting point for farmers and



auctioneers after cattle markets, the **'Horse and Jockey'** is particularly lively after the Christmas Fat Stock market. One day an American

wearing this white hat arrived in the crowded pub, and joining in the celebrations he offered his white hat at auction. It has stayed with the pub ever since and every year it is auctioned for the highest bidder to wear on Fat Stock day – proceeds for 'Children in Need'. To date it has raised \pounds 3,310.


The Horse and Jockey has been here a lot longer than that hat; it is one of the oldest buildings in Knighton, possibly late 14th Century. From outside Boots, facing the inn, the left-hand side is below ground level, up to the edge of the window because the streets were unpaved, so all the muck slid down Wylcwm Street to accumulate on the side of the pub.

Old ship's beams inside support the struture. Gary and Jacqui Salt, former

landlords, remember that their children's bedroom had one of these huge beams with a notch cut out where someone had cut out the ship's name as a keepsake.

The Horse and Jockey started life with another name, perhaps the 'Bull Ring' which stood in the open area in front. There would have been bull and bear-baiting; the animal was chained to a post and set upon by dogs. This junction of Station Road and Wylcwm Street was still called the "Bull Ring" in 1851. Then it might have been a market place.

The Inn's name would have changed to the 'Horse and Jockey' by the early 1700's as it was then the meeting place for horse races on Bailey Hill (still 'Race Course' on maps). Originally there was a horse stable off the courtyard with a through passageway to a garden (now a lorry car park). When the Salts bought the pub in 1989 the stables had just been converted to a restaurant, but it had served as a venue for the local teenagers to meet up. The long wooden horse trough is still in situ from medieval times. The restaurant had been in the room above the front bar with stairs to it between two bars. (cont.)

From around 1926 it was a popular meeting place for cyclists. At some point in the 1930's Tim Bywater, a renowned local bonesetter, held a surgery here.

When the stables were converted a games room and kitchen were added over a yard, to join to the restaurant. The building to the right with accommodation and storage was once a separate cottage. The courtyard is now a popular seating area. The main section of the Inn has a charming snug, sometimes called the 'Farmer's Bar,' and a larger bar area with an inglenook fireplace, not used, for safety reasons. It still bears fire marks where mugs were hung from a wick which occasionally caught fire.

The pub with eight ensuite rooms is now owned by a sympathetic Dutch couple, Stephanie and Wouter Egeler.

The Kinsley and Round House

These two are down from the 'Horse and Jockey', but not open as pubs today.

The Kinsley

The Kinsley has always been a landmark for railway users. It was built around 1865 opposite the new railway to service passengers and railway workers with accommodation, food and drink. The property had three storeys with three bars (one with a piano for sing-songs), rooms on the top, a dining room and stables at the back.

It takes its name from nearby Kinsley [Kinsey] Wood, but it has traded under several names: the **Kinsley Hotel**, the **Central Wales Hotel**, and the **Railway Inn**. Originally it was owned by the Lichfield Brewery and then Ansells.

Over the years the flooding of the Teme has dogged the heels, or at least the cellars, of **The Kinsley**. More recently the demise of many public houses hit this one as well; although the owner fought to keep it open as a public house, it finally closed in 2005 and re-opened as a bed and breakfast in 2006.

Round House

Just a few steps from **The Kinsley** is **The Round House.** It represents the conundrum of Knighton; a small part of the town across the Teme, including the railway, is actually in England.

The owner who built this charming, round fronted building in 1880 imagined he would take all the Sunday trade in Knighton as Welsh licensing laws forbade trading on Sunday, but the Round House was in England with different laws. The City Fathers must have disapproved and never granted a license. He may have thought he was in England but they said that the Teme had been diverted when the railway was built, so its status as an English property was in doubt. Today this sign on the building clearly shows it in the parish of Stowe (in England).

So built as a pub, it never fulfilled its destiny. Photos by Laura on page 10

Cover - Annunciation to the Shepherds

The angel Gabriel usually appears to Mary, but here we have his dramatic appearance to the shepherds "abiding in the fields." A colourful Gabriel appears on a rocket thrust of light while the shepherds kneel before this divine messenger. Other angels in the background complete the story from Luke: "Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying "Glory to God in the highest," which is the inscription accompanying the window.

The window by Trena Cox is in the Church of Emmanuel, Buckley, Flintshire. The window was dedicated "To the Glory of God. In memory of Ephraim Hopwood Jones [d.1946]. Given by his wife."

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My Favourite Thing – the Porch at St Cynllo's

My experience of St. Cynllo's Church has not been a very long one because I only moved from the Llyn peninsula to this village a little over four years ago but I do recall my first visit to the church. Because I have great difficulty walking up hills, and the approach to the church is certainly upward going, I had driven there, only to find that there was nowhere to park so I simply abandoned my car by the church gate in the hope that nobody would need access before I left.

That is where, and when, my love affair with St. Cynllo's Church really began. Just seeing all those wild flowers blooming in the churchyard, hearing the sounds of so many birds and noticing the many butterflies and other insects flitting about was enough to start the romance. When I eventually made my way up to the building's entry porch I found what I think is the favourite impression of any of those various churches I have ever attended.

Radnorshire Christmas 'Plygain'

With the Church bells ringing the day both in and out, church and chapel goers went to the early "plygain" (which derives from the Latin for 'cock-crow' and refers to the early service) or the more conventional morning service.

Congregations both in church and chapel assembled at five or six o'clock on Christmas morning, and sang carols often in Welsh, until daybreak. The custom may date back to pre-Reformation or even Celtic times, deriving from the aurora (dawn) mass, which the nonconformists continued. The Primitive Methodists of Presteigne persisted with the "plygain" until about 1890, and went home singing carols through the streets after the service. From Elizabeth Newman of the Radnorshire Society from "Folklore of the Welsh Border" by Jacqueline Simpson. A porch carrying wonderful notice boards was displaying delightful photographs taken at recent events and of activities in which the church family had taken part in addition to the expected collection of other informative notices.

St. Cynllo's Church porch gives one such a warm feeling of family welcome which, when I attended the next available service, was borne out by the other congregation members, especially at the end of the service when socialising took over. Tables were brought out and spread with plates of cakes and savouries, whilst tea, coffee or soft drinks were to be had plus lots of chat and laughter to accompany it all.

God's Welcome Home truly starts at the porch of His house and continues until the last of His visitors leave, knowing that the welcome still awaits them for when they return. Maureen G. Joyce








Songs of Praise Knighton Silver Band

Songs of Praise Oct 24

The Knighton Silver Band inspired a rousing Songs of Praise at St Edward's. Geoff Weaver conducted the band, played the organ and introduced the ten favourite hymns of Great Britain.

Each hymn, from the Victorians to the present had a story. "Jerusalem" was top drawer as it was based on the romantic legend that Jesus came to England, specifically Glastonbury, to "walk upon England's mountains green."

Another classic "Amazing Grace" was written by a reprobate captain, John Newton, whose ship, the "Greyhound," was seriously floundering. Crew and captain fought to save it until, exhausted, he was tied to the helm from 1pm until midnight. In desperation he turned to the New Testament, specifically Luke 11.13 *'If you then, though you are evil, know* how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask." He was converted, saved from the storm and "Amazing Grace" is our legacy.

The funeral favourite "Abide with Me" was written by Henry Lyte, who died ten weeks later.

"How Great Thou Art" wasn't an English hymn at all, but Russian (maybe German). When Stuart Hine was a missionary in Ukraine, he discovered it and translated it to English. Verse 4 is about displaced Russians: *"When Christ shall come, with shout of acclamation, and take me home, what joy shall fill my heart."*

Of course we finished the afternoon with William William's best loved hymn from as far back as 1762, "Guide me O Thou Great Jehovah."





New Bishop for Swansea and Brecon

The Archdeacon of Wrexham, John Lomas, has been chosen as the 10th Bishop of Swansea and Brecon. John Lomas was an aircraft engineer who served in the Royal Navy during the Falklands War. He left his engineering career to train for ministry and was ordained in 1994.

Since then, John has served in St Asaph Diocese and has played a key role in planting churches and transforming those in difficulties. He was part of the team leading the diocese's successful $f_{1.9m}$ bid for a major evangelism project in the heart of Wrexham. Prior to that John was the diocesan Transition Minister, helping parishes with no current Vicar to think about the future in innovative ways. As Vicar of Holywell for a decade he oversaw the building of a new church, St Peter's, as a resource for the whole community.

The appointment was confirmed on November 22, and his consecration at Brecon Cathedral is yet to be fixed.



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Bobby's Beat

From the diary of a parishioner who served in the police, last in the series.

All of our police cadets were entered into the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme, part of



which was a four day hike, on a route planned by themselves, in a remote part of the country. In 1971, I and a policewoman took several groups of four in a minibus to Dartmoor for their training expedition. Each day the

WPC and I would meet each group at a designated checkpoint to make sure they were safe and well, as they had no means of communication. At this time the IRA terror campaign was gathering pace.

One afternoon we went to Burrator Reservoir to meet a group. This was, and probably still is, a popular picnic and recreation place for the public. We parked up to wait for our group, and a military Land Rover came next to us. It contained a Sergeant and two others from the Royal Marines. After a while we saw a platoon of trainees with rucksacks and rifles coming down a track, led by an NCO. Next to the

All of a sudden a volley of automatic fire and loud explosions came from the trees. Obviously the soldiers were as unprepared for this as we were. The NCO signalled for them to lie down in the ditch. The soldiers jumped from the Land Rover and ran towards them, and at the same time three men in civilian clothes ran from the wood and drove off, fast, in an unmarked car. Hazel and I were quite bewildered. We had a police radio in our bus, but not on local police frequency.

When the panic had subsided I went to the sergeant and let him know who we were. He explained that the squad were trainees on a march exercise, but the other men were part of a separate exercise for advanced Royal Marines who had to return to base without being spotted by supposed terrorists. I expressed our concern that in such times as we were experiencing, and in a very public place, such things were going on that could be easily misunderstood. I don't suppose this ever got to the ears of the local Chief Constable! Bobby Fuzz

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

Harvest Auction - Air Ambulance

St Peter's, Evancoyd, raised \pounds 640 at the Harvest Festival Auction, which they donated to Welsh Air Ambulance. This grand sum was raised by the people of Evenjobb and shows that our contributions really do make a difference.

Captain James Grenfell, the Regional Managing Pilot, wrote a letter of thanks to the church. "Your support means we are now able to provide life-saving emergency care in Wales 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; lives like Ellie Harris from Caerphilly.

- "13-month old Ellie was suffering from what seemed to be a normal cold; later that day it soon became apparent that Ellie was far more poorly than was first thought. She started deteriorating quickly with concerning symptoms, including seizures. Ellie's parents immediately rang 999 and moments later the Wales Air Ambulance Critical Care Crew arrived.
- "In the short time between the 999 call and the team arriving, Ellie had suffered two cardiac arrests. Dr Dindi Gill said 'Ellie was extremely unwell and unconscious on our arrival. We were able to rapidly deliver critical care interventions, including anaesthetic, to improve her oxygen levels and take her directly to the specialist care to give her the best chance of survival.'
- "Almost a year on from the ordeal, Ellie is a thriving two-year old with bags of energy. Her father Matt said 'Without Wales Air Ambulance, Ellie may not be here today.'
- "Thank you again for supporting Wales Air Ambulance Charity. Your donations are the only way we can provide this service and continue "Serving Wales, Saving Lives".

Fungi Foray

Although it was damp and misty on the 19th October it was just the perfect weather for our purposes. A group of us gathered at St. Peters to look at and identify the various fungi in the Churchyard. This project is connected with the Beautiful Burial Ground initiative and forms part of the work for the conservation charity Caring for God's Acre.

At first glance we could not see a great deal but once our eyes had become accustomed to looking, it was apparent that we do indeed have a large variety of fungi, including wax cap toadstools of regional significance. Churchyards which have been tended in the same way for over a hundred years without chemical sprays and with close clipped grass, potentially contain some of the rarest fungi. This land is therefore most important for our heritage and maintaining the biodiversity of species. New scientific information on the role of fungi in connection with the health of the soil and their symbiosis with trees and plants is being uncovered all the time.

The organiser of this research event, Georgina Sharp, confirmed that we found a total of 13 different waxcaps along with corals, spindles and earth tongues. Our expert on these matters who led the expedition, Rob Rowe, thought there were enough species for Evancoyd Churchyard to be a regionally important site for grassland fungi.


St Brannoc of Braunton 7th January

St Brannock's Church in Braunton is a beautiful 13th century Norman church, but there was a church on the site many hundreds of years before that. In fact it may be the oldest church foundation in North Devon. In the 6th century Brannoc came to Devon, from Wales (or Ireland), floating on a stone coffin. Actually, that last bit seems unlikely, but stone coffins or stone altars often appear in the lives of the saints as a means of transport. It seems more likely that the stone was used as ballast in their flimsy ox hide curraghs as they travelled over the wild waves.

Brannoc found a nice hill where some people were living and he decided to build his church there, but whatever he built one day had fallen down by the next morning. Perhaps the locals had some objections. Anyway, Brannoc had a dream in which an angel advised him to find a white pig suckling seven piglets, which would show him where to build his church. He found the white pig with her piglets in a lovely meadow beside a slow flowing stream, and that is where he built his church. The present Norman church is a fine building with lots of interesting detail. There is a roof boss carving of the pig with her piglets and the story is again illustrated in one of the windows. Braunton (Brannoc's Town) is now said to be the largest village in England and its church has long been a place of pilgrimage and worship. *Rosemary Hanna*

At the November 7th community coffee morning (now an established event on the




second Tuesday of each month 10.30 until 12) there was more creative activity. 10 lucky attendees became involved in designing a slipclay tile. This session was led by

Living Waters – Holy Wells

Good, clean water is essential for human life. It is also a building block of all living things – plants, trees and animals. Without clean water we die, as we know from the arid deserts and the onset of Climate Change in many places around the globe. But is there a deeper significance to waters found in natural springs?

Christ is baptised and the whole world is made holy; he wipes out the debt of our sins; we will all be purified by water and the Holy Spirit. Antiphon – quoted in A Pilgrim's Manual by Canon Brian Brendan O'Malley. This points to the power of water, once energised to renew and heal. Some years ago Canon Brian led a course at the Bleddfa Centre on the overlapping themes of the language of Nature and the power of Holy Wells. He explained that the sounds of Nature have a pattern, and if one is open to recognising them - working to comprehend those patterns - then one's soul may be soothed. He played sounds to the class to demonstrate: sounds such as birds twittering, wind blowing on trees and especially that of running water. All of these represent the energy present in Nature. This was an introduction to the energy stored in Holy Wells.

The origin of Holy Wells, as distinct from natural springs, is to do with the Age of the Saints. In Wales they are associated with Anglesey and the Llyn Peninsula in the North and Pembrokeshire in the southwest. When visiting St Non's well (mother of St David) our pilgrimage group encircled it, holding arms outstretched, and did an incantation to open the well. We waited ... the air became alive, buzzing with energy. It was similar to the feeling of an anointing with the Holy Spirit. Not surprisingly pilgrims from all over the world visit such Holy Wells. They are usually in isolated and secluded spots. The nearest one to us with known healing properties is Ishow Partrishow, Ffynon at near Abergavenny. It **Bishop of Hereford** sprang up from the martyrdom took his wife to be of St Issui. Pilgrims are healed at the well known to lay flowers in his memory - for the healing properties live on. Not so long ago the Bishop of Hereford

took his wife to be healed at the well. That was a physical healing, but one may find the soul is also regenerated. It's the water of life.




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Bleddfa Tunnel Disaster

Many thanks to Graham George for this story from the **County Times**.

"THE explosion was heard for miles around and the residents of Knighton had feared the worst.

"It was midday on July 4, 1896 and deep underground five men, employees of the Birmingham Waterworks at Bleddfa, had been seriously wounded and lay deep inside a tunnel.

"The men had entered the tunnel at 6am, venturing deep underground into a tunnel which had spanned three quarters of a mile.

"The Montgomery County Times reported: 'About noon a loud and unexpected explosion was heard, and at the farther end five men were found on the ground.

'Two of them are reported as very seriously injured, and the other three slight. All the men are blinded.'

Among the worst of the injuries was suffered by James Farley whose hand and arm had been blown off.

"The report continued: 'Dr Hardman and Dr Graves, of Knighton, were summoned by telephone and rendered every possible assistance to the sufferers, who had been removed from the tunnel and taken to their homes. Little hope is entertained for Farley's life.'

"Thomas James Farley did indeed succumb to his injuries soon after.

"The inquest into the accident was heard with evidence from foreman Abraham Gray and the other survivors whose sight had recovered a week later.

"The men's names were Peter Lithgrove, David Evans, Ernest Higgins and John Morgan.

"The men reported completing bore work by 8am and charging four holes which had each exploded. "They had continued their work by charging four more holes – one of which had contained a small piece of stone with the men placing a small charge to remove the stone which had been around two feet wide

"Following the explosion the men returned to the stone face and discovered the stubborn piece of stone had remained intact so set about working on it with a hand drill when the unplanned explosion took place.

"Farley, Gray and Lithgrove had been closest to the explosion which would claim Farley's life and leave them Lithgrove and Morgan seriously injured while Gray and Evans also sustained injury.

"Miraculously Ernest Higgins walked out of the tunnel unharmed."



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You will be surprised what we stock, call in and see Flower arrangers love the Christmas season with so many wonderful evergreens: holly, ivy, laurel and spruce are all traditional seasonal greenery. Holly has grown in this country from time immemorial; its glossy leaves and bright berries in the depths of winter charmed our ancestors and ourselves. It is indispensable at Christmas. The dramatic sculptural form of seed heads gives the garden a magical air on frosty mornings. Although flowers are in short supply, the bright starry yellow flowers of Winter Jasmine and the sweet smelling yellow flowers in Mahonia ('Charity') provide a stunning Christmas display.

Jobs: It is time to check stakes and ties on trees and climbers, making sure they are secure. Climbers like Honeysuckle and Golden Hop need pruning. Lift and divide large clumps of Hosta; discard the old central portion and replant small outer sections only. Take hardwood cuttings from Broom, Buddleia, Escallonia and Weigela. Gladestry Remembrance

Rev Rachael Storer led the service and Norman Evans read aloud the names of the Fallen on the War Memorial from the two World Wars.

Wreaths were laid by Ros Tarrant on behalf of St David's Church, Colva; Susan Mullin, Chair of Gadestry WI laid a tray of crosses with poppies, one for each life lost from the villages of Colva and Gladestry. Jess Squire laid a wreath on behalf of St Mary's Gladestry and Robert McGough and grandson Ethan, aged 6, laid poppies in remembrance of a relative Private Arthur Hewitt (Huey) Turner of

Lovely to have a sermon at The Cross this year; it was poignant and thoughtful, delivered by the Reverend Rachael Storer.

For many years ex-military personnel living in the village conducted the service. We had Colonel Paul McMillen, who had served in Brussels with NATO Command. After Peter sadly passed on with cancer Colonel Peter Mayes, formerly of the Tank Corp organised the annual services, aided by Gerald Smith, who had undertaken his National Service. Peter and Gerald were regular visitors to the battlefields in France and Belgium. They would visit the war graves and pay their respects. Neither Peter and Gerald are with us, having died in the last few years. But Robert and Sheila McGough (connected to the Gladestry. At the onset of the Second World 'War, Huey enlisted with the 5th Battalion the Gloucester Regiment. He served as a dispatch rider, carrying messages between units and officers when radio communication was poor. Sadly, on the 10th May 1940, Huey took a direct hit whilst riding his motorcycle and is buried in Belgium. He was 22.

At the end of the service, Rev Rachael read the Kohima Epitaph: "When you go home, tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today." *Ann Dean*

Another Remembrance in Gladestry

Turner family) were present, and a photographic display of their trip to the war graves is to be found in the church. This year we also had another highly decorated serviceman, in Steve Ward and his partner Alison. They had recently moved to the village and we wish them well.

Those who have visited the war graves are struck by the fact that there are no headstones or markers for the fallen where massive numbers were killed. Beside a communal grave where 25,000 Germans were buried is an inscription: ich habe dich bei deine Name Gerufen. ("I have called you by your name. You are Mine"). Simply put, God's love extends beyond human boundaries.


