The Wharf at Felindre

No one seems certain, but **The Wharf** was probably named for the dry wharf where wagons would reverse up and load their cargo. In the photo below the wide step to the right of the car is the old wharf where wagons used to load from. A front room served as a grain depot.

Another theory is that Felindre (town of the Mill) is the site of the confluence of the Deudder brook coming down the side valley into the Teme where there were at least two mills, hence the water mill on the sign. Behind the pub is Mill Wood on the brook, and the remains of Vron Mill are nearby on the Teme.

The building goes back to the late 18th century. But there have been three other

inns. Just up the road near the crossroad is Upper House, once the site of a 17-18th century inn, the **Black Lion**. Bridge House, recently demolished, was opposite the Village Shop and recorded as a pub in the 18th century. Another inn was a bit further along the road.

A noteworthy publican, R E Bousefield, arrived in 1941 to avoid the London bombs. He had lost both legs in a Royal Navy ship during World War 1. He used two sticks.

Mandy and Wayne Price, the publicans for the past seven years, rent **The Wharf** from Brian Thomas, a former landlord who lives next door at the former Village Shop. When he was the landlord he added the present bar. The former small bar positioned in one of the entrances to the pool room had been added reluctantly by the previous landlord Chris Griffiths, who had bought the building to run his business out of and was persuaded by locals to re-open it as a pub

Leslie and Mary Morris, landlords from around 1949 to 1967, added a small porch to the front. The present bar is in what was the dining room, with a little cast iron fireplace. The big fireplace with a welcome settle was in the main room. The present lounge bar was once the kitchen.

Ladies were not regular visitors to the pub back then but any that did visit had to pop upstairs to use Blodwyn's toilet if the need arose, and the gentleman had the use of a urinal that had been installed in the stable next to the pub – it is still behind Wayne's

store of logs. The only servery available when Arthur was there was a small hatch in a door on the side of the bar. Mostly glasses would have been handed to Arthur who would scuttle off into the bar and then deliver back to the thirsty recipient – table service before Covid!

Geoff and Carolyn Duthie moved into **The Wharf** in 1978 and soon after added the large triangular porch to the front and replaced the porch to the side with a pool room and new indoor toilets (including one for ladies). They also introduced a large bar with several counters for people to stand at and order and drink their beer.

The first floor of **The Wharf** has entertained many. Once it housed a tailor. Lesley Morris's wife Mary did Bed and Breakfast there. It was also flats, but it is now the home of landlords. A stairwell once led down to where the bar is now; Jenny Barrett remembers sitting on the bottom step drinking his alcohol free Minster Shandy out of the bottle when he was a boy.

The pub has a history of supporting local sports. From long ago it was the meeting point for the football team, and also for the successful tug-of-war team who competed in tugs



around the world. When Lesley Morris was there the football team changed in the stables before coming to the games room. Derek Brick remembers going there as a youth with his football team. Mandy has recently re-instituted drinks and food for the local football team.

The Wharf shared activities like weddings with the Village Hall. It hosted pub sports like dominoes and darts, but also whist drives, throwing and running contests, guess the weight, timing how fast you can put on fancy dress, etc. (see page 13)

The Wharf also stood in the Welsh tradition of hymn singing with or without the piano accompaniment of Margaret Lewis (church organist at Beguildy). The Dolithon Choir with Brian Thomas often came along.

This Christmas Santa arrived by horse and cart to his grotto in the main room. Three elves accompanied him while a load of children, maybe as many as 60, came for a chat and a pressie. (See page 13 for a photo.)

There must have been much fun at **The Wharf**. Jacqui Salt, former landlady at **The Horse and Jockey** remembers when a group of Wharf lads (maybe the pool team?) on a pub crawl arrived with a live chicken which they plopped on the table, much to the amazement of everyone. They also tried (unsuccessfully) to abduct the barmaid (all in good fun).

Cover - St David

This unusual image of St David reminds us that our patron saint was the abbot of a monastery where monks lived simply, drinking only water and eating vegetarian (hence the leek as his symbol). Most images of David show a formal bishop wearing a mitre (tall crown) dressed in regal robes. But David became bishop reluctantly – not for him were high positions.

As with most images of David a dove is on his shoulder, a sign of the Holy Spirit. He also bears a simple staff, symbol of authority (the “good shepherd”). But unusually David carries a little bell, rung to summon the monks from their labours to prayer.

The image was created by Celtic Studios, 1963, a firm that often portrayed David as bare-headed and barefoot or with sandals.

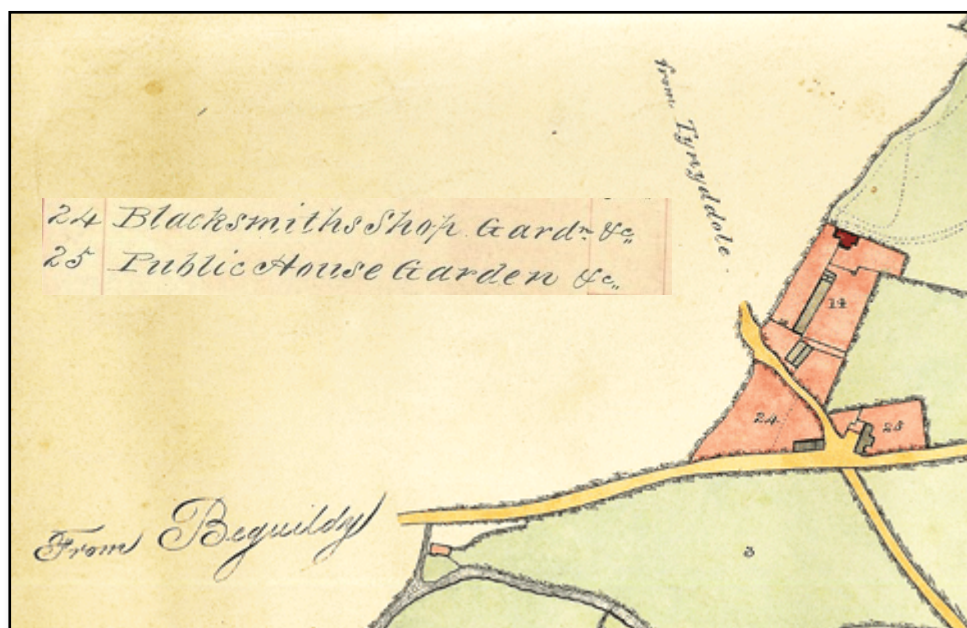

My Favourite Thing – Grand View at Pilleth

Despite being a humble Radnorshire church, St Mary's Pilleth has something grand about it. It is an ancient site, one of only a few listed in the Domesday Book.

← The first thing you encounter after driving up the secluded lane is the wide, formal, cobbled steps, signalling something special.

Emerging from the flight of 28 steps onto the flat, mown grass, you may be blown away by the view below of the Lugg Valley. It curves gently east through green pasture land and scattered farms. Few churches offer such a

lofty view of a quiet valley below, with only the occasional sound of a distant vehicle. One feels at ease with the world.

The plain white interior boasts a clear glass east window and side windows edged with pink which was given as a wedding present for our daughter who was married here in 1987. Before the windows were restored the windows were patched with broken, ribbed and yellow glass which obscured any view but now you can clearly see the surrounding hills and the grandeur of Offa's Dyke country. A place of peace and tranquility for prayer and meditation.

Spectacle at Llandod Lake

On a cold but sunny winter's day I visited the lake at Llandod and witnessed an interesting spectacle. The lake was mostly covered in ice so that some of the water birds were walking rather than swimming on it. But there was a group of men wading in it up to their waists! What strange behaviour. But there had to be an explanation.

← The lake is used by an angling club, and each winter they carry out a stock take of the fish - particularly carp and tench. I did quite a lot of fishing in my youth and I knew of these breeds but had never caught them. The men broke several passages in the ice, and systematically trawled the lake with a long net. This involved getting the net to pass under the ice, and the water fowl that were on top. Of

course some of the swans were in the water so they had to be coaxed to cross the net. In mid-afternoon the net was brought into the bank and people were treated to a spectacular scene.

The water was alive with hundreds if not thousands of fish. Lots of small roach, perch and dace, and probably more breeds. But the stars were the carp, some of them a mirror variety, and a few tench. The big ones were picked up one by one, and given a visual health check. Special ones were selected for closer examination and weighed by members of the angling club, before being released. It just shows that no matter how old you are there are always new experiences to witness.

Idris Lloyd: 1940s to the Spring of 2019. A Life of Work.

This continues the story of Idris Lloyd's youth in Dutlas.

When I left school I spent a period of time in London earning **£5 a week**. After a while in London I got **homesick** and returned to Dutlas. There was no regular work so I helped out here and there. A local **stone mason employed me** to assist him at The Runnis. An area of the front of the house was bulging. We propped it up and removed the collapsing stone work, cleaned the stone and rebuilt. When finished the mason had no further work where he needed an assistant.

I found work on a **local farm full time** being paid **18 shillings a week** which did not buy much. Six weeks work may pay for a new pair of boots. The summer of 1946 was very wet. Farmers were unable to harvest much hay for fodder. The cereal harvest was a little better. A lot of the crops were damaged by rain.

The winter of 1946-47 was dreadful with very **heavy snow fall and severe frosts**. Most of the local **roads were blocked**. Farmers would go to Knighton with horses, returning with as much **bread and food** as they could manage to get, **sharing it out** with other people who could not get to Knighton. There was a **shortage of coal**, no deliveries were made. The road to Knighton was eventually opened one Sunday morning by a caterpillar bulldozer, followed by a delivery of coal by The Radnorshire Company. It was very upsetting to find **sheep buried in snowdrifts**, often frozen to the ground, attacked by crows and their eyes pecked out as they were unable to defend themselves. When the thaw came carcasses had to be buried. Farmers lost a lot of livestock due to starvation and the severe weather. There were drifts on Radnor Forest in June 1947. *(Idris' story continues next month.)*

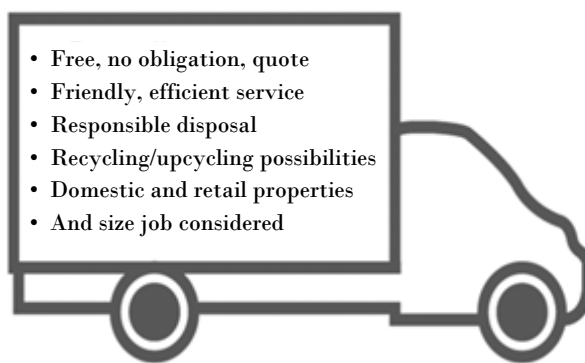

History of Simnel Cake

Simnel cake is a light fruit cake with a layer of marzipan in the middle and on the top, which is lightly toasted. It was originally made for the middle Sunday of Lent, when there would be a break from the 40 day fast on Laetare Sunday, also known as Refreshment Sunday, Mothering Sunday, Sunday of the five loaves or Simnel Sunday. The origin of the word Simnel is not known although there is a 1226 reference to 'bread made into simnel' which is understood to mean the finest white bread from the Latin *simila* - 'fine flour'.

Fast forward to the 17th and 18th centuries, and the bread mixture had been replaced by a

pudding batter, not dissimilar to spotted dick, enriched with dried fruit, spices and almonds. It would be boiled like a pudding. When cooked, it was wrapped in pastry, glazed with egg and baked until a good hard crust formed. It is only when you get towards the end of the 19th century that it starts to look like something we would recognise as a cake, though surprisingly it is not until the 20th century that the familiar marzipan layers and decorative disciples appear. Usually, 11 or occasionally 12 marzipan balls representing the 12 apostles minus Judas, or Jesus and the 12 apostles minus Judas. - *Association of Church Editors*

Recipe: Simnel Cake for *Mothering Sun, 27 March (or Easter)*

Ingredients for the cake

- | | |
|----------------------------|-----------------------------------------------------|
| — 6 oz soft butter or marg | — 6 oz currants |
| — 6 oz light brown sugar | — 3 oz glacé cherries, quartered, rinsed and dried. |
| — 6 oz self-raising flour | — 1 oz candied peel, roughly chopped |
| — 3 eggs | — Grated zest of 1 large lemon |
| — 6 oz sultanas | — 1 teaspoon mixed spice |

Ingredients for the filling and decoration

- 1 lb almond paste
- 2 tablespoons apricot jam
- 1 egg white

Method

- Grease and line a 7 inch round loose-bottomed cake tin.
- Roll out one-third of the almond paste to make a 7 inch round.
- Combine all the cake ingredients together. Beat well until thoroughly blended. Spoon half the cake mixture into the prepared tin and smooth the surface. Place the almond paste round on top. Spoon over the remaining cake mix and level the surface.
- Bake in pre-heated oven at 150°C (130°C fan, gas mark 2) for 2¼ hours until golden brown and firm to touch.
- Cover the top of the cake with greaseproof paper if it is browning too quickly. Leave to cool for 10 minutes then remove from tin and leave to cool completely.
- Warm the jam and brush the top of the cake. Roll out half of the remaining almond paste to a 7 inch round and place on top of cake.
- Roll the remaining almond paste into 11 even sized balls. Place around the cake, attaching them with egg white.
- Brush the tops of the balls and the almond paste with egg white and place under a hot grill for a couple of minutes until the balls are golden. *Member of St Andrew's Church, Sonning*

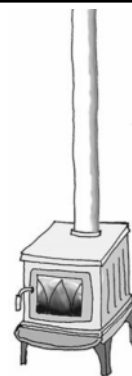

We are all different, but each of us

has his own best to offer. The responsibility for the way we live life with all its challenges, sadness and joy is ours alone. If we do this well, it will also be good for our neighbours. If you throw a stone into a pool, the ripples go on spreading outwards."

"It does matter therefore what each individual does each day. Kindness, sympathy, resolution, and courteous behaviour are infectious."

"We may feel powerless alone but the joint efforts of individuals can defeat the evils of our time."

Flora

March is the time to sow, transplant and take cuttings as well as spring cleaning in the herbaceous border, but leave the peony, scabious and alstromeria hybrids alone as they resent disturbance. You can move and divide bearded iris. Deal severely with michaelmas daisy, rudbeckia and solidago. Sow sweetpea seed 1 – 1 ½ inches deep outdoors. There is still time to prune and tidy up the roses. Cut back buddleia to within a few inches of the ground or in the case of old plants, to the previous year's wood.

Later this month plant gladioli. They take approximately 90 days from planting to flowering. Planting a few at fortnightly intervals will keep a continuous splash of colour at the back of the border. Lots of flowers which are ideal for the arranger can be grown easily from seed — amaranthus (green and red), didiscus (lavender blue), euphorbia (green and white), godetia, larkspur, nasturtium, nicotiana and many more.

Spring is here with primroses and polyanthus in all the garden centres -- aubrietia in purple, pink and red, iberis (white) and lovely pots of pansies. With a few sunny days the daffodils will begin to show drifts of bright yellow. Already the crocus is out, giving a real dash of colour. The snowdrops are still a delight; they are best moved when they have finished flowering and still in full leaf. Do plant them in little groups, not singly, as they enjoy the company. Hellebores are all blooming now in the most delightful colours – best in half shade.

Soon it will be Mothering Sunday (mid-lent) when we give gifts of flowers and plants. In years past gifts to mums would have been violets, primroses and pussy willow picked from the country lanes, together with a special cake. These days you can make your own gift with little green ferns in a bowl with a growing primrose, a purple crocus and a few little Easter chicks. What pleasure for mums and grand-mums on Mothering Sunday.

St Herbert of Derwentwater 20 March

I love going to Keswick at the north end of the Lake District because it is where my mother spent her happiest childhood years. Even as a little girl, one of her favourite walks was to go down through Crow Park, past the landing stages and the boat houses and on to Friar's Crag. From here you can see the Derwentwater islands: Derwent Isle, Lord's Island with its remains of a manor house and, in the distance, St Herbert's Island with, according to the Ordnance Survey, the remains of a summer house. Many people think this ancient "summer house" is the remains of Herbert's hermitage, including William Wordsworth who wrote a poem about it.

Herbert ate fish from the lake and grew vegetables around his little hut. He lived at the same time as St Cuthbert of Lindisfarne. At that time the Diocese of Northumbria stretched right across the north of England from sea to sea, so Bishop Cuthbert became Herbert's soul friend and Herbert would make an annual visit to Lindisfarne for spiritual direction.

One year Cuthbert made the journey instead to Carlisle because Queen Eormenburg wanted to become a nun. When Herbert met with him Cuthbert told him that he didn't have long to live, which distressed Herbert so much that he asked Cuthbert to pray that they would both die on the same day and at the same hour so that they could enter heaven together. Evidently this came to pass and they both died in their respective hermitages on 20 March 687, though it isn't recorded at what hour. It is said, though I don't know by whom, that St Herbert's Island was the inspiration for Owl Island in Beatrix Potter's "The Tale of Squirrel Nutkin".

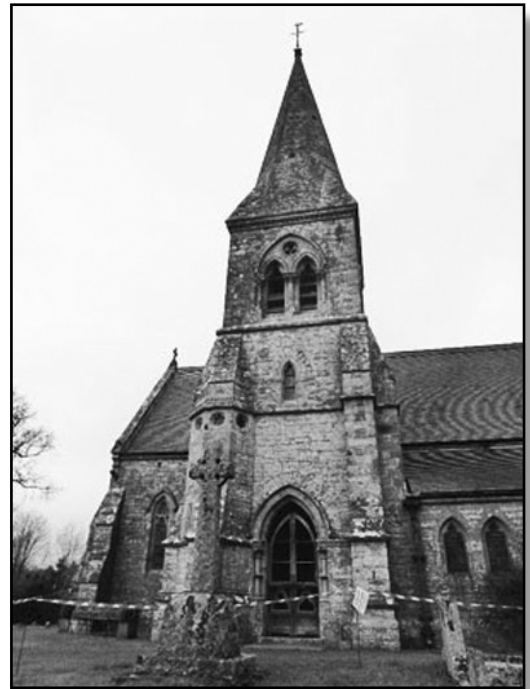
Weathervane Damage

Access Llangunllo 1840 Tithe Map

This parish map overleaf was prepared following The Tithe Commutation Act 1836, which allowed tithes to be paid in cash rather than in goods.

Originally a tithe, dating back to Anglo-Saxon times, was a tax or levy of 10% of land and its products, which was meant to be devoted to the upkeep of the parish church and the support of its priest or minister. All property owners had to pay this tithe and give their tenth sack of corn, tenth pig, tenth sheep, etc, directly to the priest.

Tithes were valuable and from quite early times could be “appropriated,” with the “appropriator” receiving the greater part of the tithe, but from it had to pay the vicar or curate who actually took the services.

At some point, the tithe of the parish of Llangunllo, which then included the church of Pilleth, was “appropriated” to Brecon Priory. By 1840 the priory had become the collegiate church of Brecon and the Canon to benefit

was Revd Hyam Burn. He in turn “leased” the tithe to Richard Price of Norton Manor, MP for Radnorshire 1799 – 1847, a descendant of the Prices of Pilleth and Monaughty and an ancestor of the present Green-Prices. Richard Price, as lessee, paid a fixed annual payment and the Canon was guaranteed a regular income, without the trouble of collecting the tithe. No doubt the lessee also made as much “extra” as he could.

In 1840 the tithe of Llangunllo Parish, based on four thousand acres, amounted to £401

(over £43,000 today). The vicar, Rev Morgan Edwards, received a quarter of this money with the remainder going to Richard Price. The church got nothing, neither did the diocese, except indirectly via Hyam Burn.

The Tithe Map gives a comprehensive picture of the landscape of the time with acreage of meadow/pasture, arable, wood, common and glebe land recorded. Alongside the map, is an accompanying schedule with the names of all owners and occupants of land in the parish, plus their payment. As tithes were no longer an actual pig or sack of corn they were “commuted” for a sum of money nominally equal to a proportion of the value of the property’s land.

There does not appear to be any record of a tithe barn in Llangunllo; these were used by the tithe owner for storage of the goods of the tithe, especially crops. As noted earlier, the owner of the parish tithe not actually living in the parish, could possibly account for this.

Not surprisingly, tithes were unpopular, especially with farmers and in particular in Nonconformist parts of Wales. In 1914 the Welsh Church Act led to the creation of the Church in Wales, which came into effect in 1920, and tithe money was no longer received.

A Snap Shot of Llangunllo and the “Year of 22”

1522 – The parish was part of the “Marches of Wales”, the lawless border region, with the Radnor Forest area the most troublesome and known as “*an abode of rank robbers.*”



A mediaeval church existed and from the 15th Century had owned this fine processional cross.

1622 – Part of the County of Radnorshire after The Acts of Union of 1536 and 1542 and subject to English law. The village consisted of a vicarage and a number of dwellings centred on the church and the crossroads. However, most of the people still lived in outlying farms and homesteads, including Weston, Crungoed and Dolyfelin, built during Tudor times and now replaced with later dwellings.

1722 – The Churchwarden’s Accounts record the following expenditure:

For ye Black Cloth (a Pall for funerals) £1 – 12s – 6d

For Ale when the fox was killed 2/6

For destroying Jack Daws 11/-

The Churchwarden Accounts begin in 1693 and are among the earliest in Wales. Interestingly they are all written in English, albeit sometimes, “Radnorshire English!”

1822 – Money was collected in the Parish for the poor in Ireland. A failed potato crop in the summer of 1822 and limited employment opportunities created famine in the west and southwest of the country.

Donations were received from seventeen households with the sum of £1 – 4s – 0d (£162.45 today) sent to help suffering families.

A Snap Shot of Llangunllo and the "Year of 22" (Cont)

1922 – The W.I. was formed on 10th April.

The War Memorial of Portland stone was erected in the village centre in memory of the seven local men who lost their lives in the First World War and dedicated at a ceremony led by the Bishop of Swansea.

The land for the memorial was donated by Mr Bryan of Crungoed and local subscriptions raised £215 – 18s – 7d (just over £13,000 today) to fund the construction.

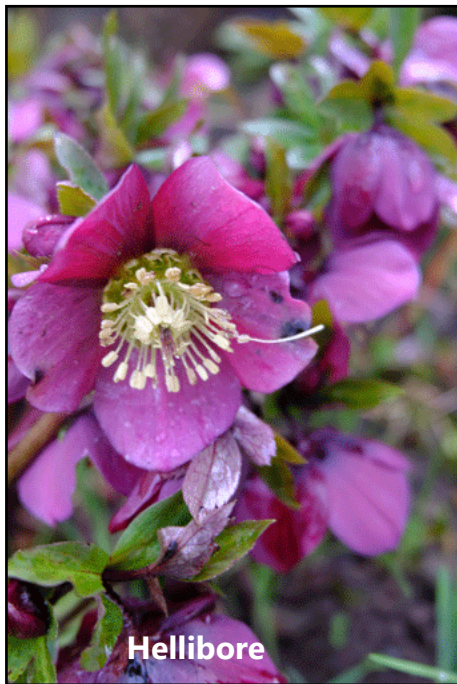

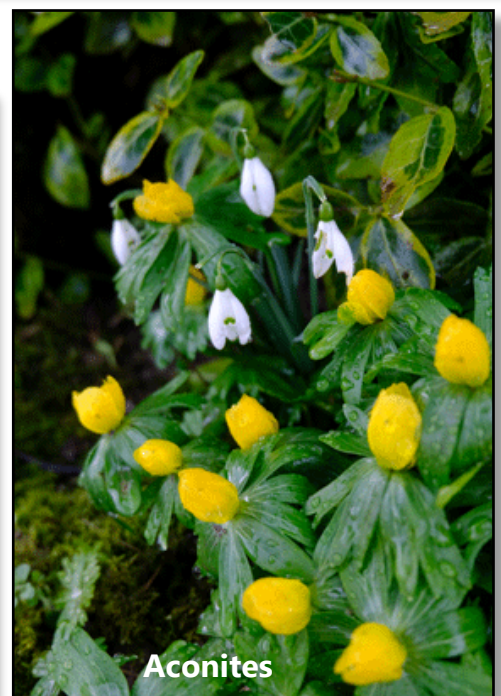
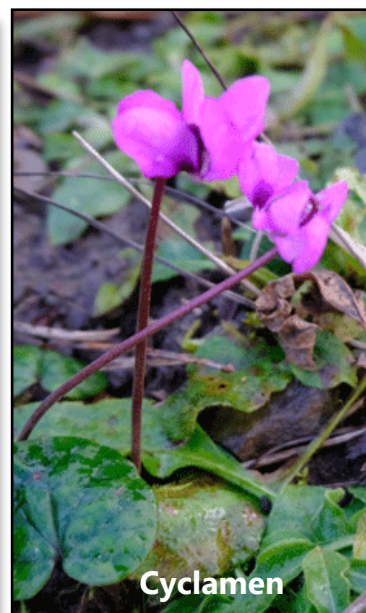
