## Knighton's George and Dragon

1637 is engraved on the outer wall, making the George and Dragon one of Knighton's oldest buildings. It started life as a small inn, the current bar occupies the original. It was named only the George; by 1876 Dragon was added to its name.

It's been added to ever since, contributing to its considerable charm: little rooms all higgledy-piggledy. The protruding bay is a

C 1905 without a front room. Shop front awnings extended up the Narrows (High St).

1920's addition. The room on the left as you enter, which bears the date, was perhaps a separate cottage. The cosy snug (or 'smoke room') behind the bar was accommodation. The restaurant room behind this is a later addition. The George and Dragon is three floors with cellar; the top floors are the landlord's accommodation.

In 1870 it is listed as having "outbuildings, vard, stables and garden ... cottage or tenement with garden and Brewhouse adjoining and a stable and yard." (Hobbs pp 29-30) In 1908 the sale catalogue lists it as having "a well-fitted bar, sitting room, tap room, large kitchen fitted with cooking range, and two pantries. On the second floor are five one arm. The family has always served as

commodious bedrooms for eight beds and on

third floor a large bedroom and landing. Underneath there is a capital beer and wine


cellar. The outside premises comprise brew-

house, coal-house, trap-house, 2 loose boxes, stabling for about 20 loose horses with loft

over, a hackney stable to hold about 12 loose

horses; together with excellent kitchen garden

and other appurtenances." (Hobbs, p 30)

## **Knighton Pubs That Are No Longer**

## The Bear Inn

The current 'Headmaster' (barber shop) facing the clock tower was once the **Bear Inn**, which perhaps came from the bear on duke of Worcester's coat of arms. In the mid 1800's the Prices, who were nick-named the 'bears', owned it. When it closed in the 1890s the front portion became a butcher shop. In 1988 Carl Evans also ran it as a butcher shop. Happily it is now 'The Headmaster' where you can get a haircut and local information. There are displays of local items where once there were meats.

## The Swan Inn

The **Swan Inn**, a notable black and white, dates back to Elizabethan times, with some half timbering. It was an important coaching house in the late 1700s to early 1800s when in 1794 a coach ran to London once a week.

Its cock pit attracted bets by the local gentry until cockfighting was outlawed in 1849.

By the 1900s it was one of the principal Knighton hotels, with its omnibus meeting trains for guests. In the mid 1900s it was a business meeting place, and by 1970 its stables were demolished and replaced with homes which still have access through Swan Court. By the millennium it ceased trading and became an Indian Restaurant (now 'Saffron').

## The Talbot


The **Talbot** (now 'Taliesin') is next to the **Swan Inn**. It is described as having "small and low" rooms and was the last Knighton pub to brew its own beer. It closed in 1920 and was a confectioner's shop during WWII. Tony Hobbs records that the "last shop-keeper was Mrs Turner who had a little pet dog which ... used to smoke a pipe."

## The Bridge Inn

The **Bridge Inn** (next to the red and yellow brick building which houses Elaine's Beauty Spot) was named for the old bridge over Cwm Brook. John Jones, the landlord in the 1860s, had been the last toll-gate-keeper where the railway station now is. The inn was not used much and became a shop and private home.

## Cover - Christ the King

Shards of colour radiate from Christ the King like a sun – Sbrowns for this world, pinks for spiritual awakening, reds for martyrdom, and blues for the heavenly realm. Jesus himself wears white for his purity and innocence but he carries a red shawl. The crowned Jesus stands with outstretched arms to embrace the world, his hands and feet. still bearing nail scars,

Four circular panels in the top rays represent the four Evangelists – the four gospels:

(1) Winged man or angel for Matthew

(2) Lion for Mark

(3) Ox for Luke

(4) Eagle for John.

At the very top is a dove, the Holy Spirit. The other panels also have symbols: wheat and grapes for Holy Communion, 3 circles for the Trinity, Fish as an ancient Christian Symbol, Lamb for Jesus as the 'lamb of God,'

Chi Rho, an ancient Greek Christian symbol.

## **Platinum Jubilee**

This month the Queen makes history by celebrating her Platinum Jubilee. 70 years in the job!

We join with millions across Britain and the Commonwealth who thank God for Queen Elizabeth's dedication, wisdom, and steadfastness over the past seven decades. The world has changed so much since 1952. But through it all, our Queen has kept her long-ago promise to the British people, to serve them with all her heart and might. And, because the Queen is a Christian, we know that God has honoured her and helped her in her role. Truly, God has blessed Queen Elizabeth II, and we thank Him for her.

## Recipe: The Original Coronation Chicken

Celebrate the Queen's Platinum Anniversary by going back in time 70 years and enjoying the original Coronation Chicken created by Rosemary Hume for Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation lunch on 2 June 1952. Serves 6-8 people.

#### Preparing the meat

Poach two young roasting chickens with carrot, bouquet garni, salt and peppercorns in water and a little wine, to barely to cover, for about 40 minutes or until tender. Allow to cool in the liquid. Joint the birds, remove bones with care.

#### To serve

Mix a small amount of the sauce (enough to coat the chicken) with a little extra cream and seasoning. Mix the chicken and the sauce together, arrange at one end of a dish, coat with the extra sauce. At the Queen's Coronation an oblong dish was used with a rice salad at the other end of the dish. The salad was made of rice, peas, diced raw cucumber and finely chopped mixed herbs, all mixed in a well-seasoned French dressing.

#### Ingredients for the Cream of Curry Sauce

- 1 tbsp oil
- 50g/2oz onion, finely chopped
- 1 dessert spoon curry powder
- 1 good tsp tomato purée
- 1 wineglass red wine
- 3/4 wineglass water
- A bay leaf
- Salt, sugar, a touch of pepper
- A slice or two of lemon & a squeeze of lemon juice
- 1-2 tbsp apricot purée
- 450ml/<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pint mayonnaise
- 2-3 tbsp lightly whipped cream

#### To make the Cream of Curry Sauce

Heat oil, add onion, cook gently for 3-4 minutes, add curry powder. Cook again for 1-2 min.. Add purée, wine, water, and bay leaf. Bring to boil, add salt, sugar to taste, pepper, and the lemon and lemon juice. Simmer with the pan uncovered for 5-10 minutes. Strain and cool. Add by degrees to the mayonnaise with the apricot purée to taste. Adjust seasoning, adding a little more lemon juice if necessary. Finish with the whipped cream.

## My Favourite Thing – Beguildy Churchwardens' Chest

There are quite a number of wonderful features in Beguildy Church dating through the centuries. Some are quite basic and some are fine examples of fifteenth century workmanship.

When I was asked to choose my favourite, I found it very difficult because I love them all for different reasons, but because of its age, basic hand work and what it represented, I decided on the ancient Churchwarden's dug out parish chest.

This was reputedly hewn out of a solid oak tree trunk, which probably dates back to the thirteenth century. At the end of the chest there was an iron ring for use when it was drawn by a horse to be buried or hidden in times of trouble. There would probably have been a kind of skid underneath for the chest to have been moved more quickly and easily.

One part of the chest would have held the Church's valuables, and the other the Churchwardens' treasures. Each compartment was locked separately, but sadly the locks have partly rusted away.

When I consider its age, I am so impressed and think how lucky we are to still have it in our Church. I wish it could talk so we could have a record of what it has seen over the past thousand years, truly remarkable.

## Flora

**Container planting:** For small gardens, patios and terraces, pots in different shapes, sizes and colours can make an exciting display. A good rule when choosing plants is to remember thrillers, fillers and spillers. Thrillers are tall, statement plants, arching grass and bushy evergreens. Fillers are colourful flowers and foliage that add texture and bulk out the pot. Spillers are plants that cascade over the side to soften the edges like ivy, Helichrysum or Bacopa.

Containers must have drainage holes to prevent waterlogging. Broken crocks, slate, pebbles in the bottom prevent compost washing away. Before placing pots consider which plants prefer sun to shade, while others dislike the wind.

**Clematis**: Blooms can be huge, glamorous blooms to wild pixie-like blossoms, with colours from deepest purple through reds and pinks to yellows, whites and green tints. That's before you mention the stripes, freckles and spots. Clematis will grow in large pots with a support to scramble up; otherwise they crawl amongst other plants, which can be pretty. You can also plant three varieties of clematis in a hanging basket to form a large ball: 'Filigree' (pale pink) 'Picardy' (almost red), and 'Bijou' (deep pink). They are fully hardy perennials so will come back next year even stronger. Other plants like begonias, lobelia, petunias, verbena, fuchsia, pelargoniums need to be kept in until the frosts are over.



## A Trip to Cefnllys Castles

Julian Ravest led the Radnorshire Society (historical) on a glorious sunny day to the Cefnllys Castles just above Cefnllys Church, three miles east of Llandod. This hill was probably first a wooden Iron Age fort; an iron age bank surrounds the whole upper site.

We entered at the old bastions and passed outer and inner curtain walls to the bailey and then to the high point where the stone keep with its corner towers once stood. It was built in 1242 by the 11-year old Ralph Mortimer. In the usual way it went back and forth between the English (Mortimers) and Welsh (Lewellyn ap Griffith) over 20 years.

Around 1267 Roger Mortimer eventually got fed up and built another castle at the other end

of the ridge. We crossed the ridge, pausing to view field boundaries on the banks, and house platforms on the top to Castle 2. The top gives a commanding view of the hills and River Ithon below, which surrounds the hill on three sides.

These wonderful landmarks were only in use over 60 years.

To explore these castles, view an excellent ten minute video using drone photography and photogrammetry. Google 'Cefnllys Castle Julian Ravest You Tube'.

Or walk up to these Mortimer Castles. Park at Shakey Bridge. Laura W-J Aerial photo from Wikipedia

## Saint Ishmael, 16 June

o you know the name of the village which was the first area in the whole of the UK to switch from analogue to digital TV in 2005? Here's a hint: it is the same village that had cockle wars in 1993 with gangs from Liverpool and Glasgow, the Gower Peninsula. Have you guessed it yet? It was Dylan Thomas's favourite haunt of Ferryside, where for hundreds of years the ferry went across the River Tywi to Llansteffan and back. Also, there is a beautiful church situated above the river, dedicated to St Ishmael. In Welsh his name is spelled Isfael, which means 'under prince', and he really was a prince. He was a Breton from Cornouaille in Armorica where his father, Budig ap Cybydan, was king.

Anyway, Ishmael, or Isfael, Ismel, Ismael, came over to south-west Wales and settled in Pembrokeshire. He was one of St David's best known disciples and also studied under Dobricius and Teilo. His mother was probably Teilo's sister, Arianwedd. His brothers were quite saintly too: Tyfei became a martyr and Euddogwy became Bishop of Llandaff. Ishmael worked alongside Teilo when he became Bishop of St David's and then he went on to receive his own bishopric

One of them, I think the one at Ferryside, is on the old pilgrimage route to St David's. It would make an interesting expedition to explore these ancient churches.

## Dutlas – The Runnis

This description of the Runnis in the 1930s continues Idris Lloyd's memories. Corrections for last month. 1) We recorded Mr Wood as the postmaster of Dulas but it was Mr William Ward. 2) The photograph attributed to The Harp is actually Halfway House, closer to Knighton, an area called The Whitterley's.

Thomas Jones lived and farmed at The Runnis. He was the son of Morgan Jones of Rose Cottage Dutlas. My mother was his step-sister. Another sister, Aunt Polly, lived in Bucknell. She was married to George Smith who, with his brother (Frank I think), ran the village shop and bakery in Bucknell. Later the shop was kept by Daryl and Phillis Smith.

Tom Jones rented The Runnis for many years. Giles Swancott, Tregodfa used to help him at busy times. During the war Tom had a live-in assistant known by a possible nickname of 'Smoker'. He smoked a pipe. I never knew his proper name. I think it may have been George. Runnis Chapel held anniversaries which were held at The Runnis before the war (1939-45). They were always quite busy with many children and parents attending.

Tom occupied half of the house, the other half being sublet. Mr Bathurst, or Bathous and his housekeeper, Miss Gather, lived in one half during the early 1930s. Mr Bathurst was a retired Blacksmith. His blacksmith's shop was in Dutlas and he had the reputation of being a very good craftsman. Some of his work is at the old Post Office in Dutlas, he made the fence at the front. Mr and Mrs Deakin lived at The Runnis for awhile. I believe he worked for Mr Elvet Bevan of Vedwllwyd Farm.

During the war a family evacuated from the East coast area to the Runnis: a Mr and Mrs Dalgliesh and their son and daughter, Alan and Patricia, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lucas(?). Mr. Dalgliesh was in the army, the rank of Major I think. Alan attended Beguildy and Presteigne County School. Patricia went to school in Knighton. After the war they went farming near Aberystwyth. I believe this was not successful. I think Alan later joined the army and trained to be an officer. Half of The Runnis house I believe was let as a weekend retreat. These tenants took Tom on a trip to the seaside: this was the first time he had seen the sea, his age then was probably seventy plus.

Tom was well known in the area. He had a mare to do the ploughing and carting on the farm. He usually went to Knighton on Thursday, market day, travelling to and from by Owen's bus service. Returning on the 7pm bus he would be a little intoxicated and when walking from Dutlas he would cross a bridge which belonged to the farm. When he was through the gate at the bridge he was met by the mare. He would catch hold of her tail and she would lead him to the farmyard gate to get him home. Tom was generally known by his nickname Tom The Dut. Tom lived into his nineties and is buried in Beguildy Churchyard near his father's grave. [Grave on p 37]

The roadway in front of The Runnis house used to have gates at the chapel and at Runnis. I would earn a few pennies on Bank Holidays opening and closing gates for motorists. Sometimes motorists would get their cars stuck in the ford at Runnis. Tom would earn a little cash by pulling them out with his horse.

The garden at The Runnis was elaborate before the war. It had a network of paths lined with box hedges approximately 3 feet high and 1 foot wide. These were kept neatly trimmed by my grandfather. Inside the roadside fence was a yew tree and several damson trees. The damson trees usually bore a lot of fruit; these were picked and made into jam by my mother, around 100-120 jars. As children we would chase around the paths having great fun and eating apples, raspberries, gooseberries and black and red currants from the garden.

## Pubs in Knighton in 1941

Jim Morris has sent us this article from <u>Radnorshire Society Transactions</u> Vol. 11 1941 listing 31 pubs in Knighton. He has added in italics and square brackets the rough location to where most of them are/were.

- Mr. R. Tench, has kindly provided this list of Inns in Knighton, and says, 60 or 70 years ago, there were in the town four Malthouses. [The list of Malthouses on page 31]
- NORTON ARMS HOTEL. in Bridge Street was built by the first Sir Richard Green-Price, Bart.
- SWAN HOTEL, in Bridge Street, the premises are old, part obviously half-timber work of Elizabethan period, though now covered with plaster. [Now Saffron]
- GEORGE & DRAGON INN, in Broad Street, dated 1673.
- HORSE & JOCKEY INN, Wylcwm place, the old sign taken down in recent years.
- RED LION INN, at the corner of West Street and Church Street, a building erected apparently within the last 100 years, formerly a Blacksmith shop stood on the site, and the old Red Lion Inn was lower down Church St. [Empty shop 14 Church St used to be the Tattoo Shop next to laundrette]

GOLDEN LION INN, top of the Narrows. FLEECE INN, in Market Square.

- CENTRAL WALES INN, stands opposite the entrance to Station, erected about 1865, after the making of the Railway.
- TALBOT INN, Bridge Street, now a shop and dwelling house. [Next to Saffron]
- BRIDGE INN, Bridge Street, now a shop and dwelling house. [No 2 Bridge Street]
- CHANDOS HOTEL, at corner of West St and High St, now a Temperance Hotel.
- CROWN INN, Broad Street, until lately the Conservative Club. [Ladies' hairdresser's opposite George & Dragon.]
- JOINERS ARMS, Church Street, now a dwelling house. [Opposite Thomas Clough's]
- DUKES ARMS, Church Street, now a dwelling house. [No 2 Church Street]

- GLOBE INN, Broad Street, stood on site now occupied by Mr. Phillips, Chemist Shop and Messrs. Eadie's Boot Shop. [Barclays Bank Bldg]
- STARS INN or SEVEN STARS INN, Broad Street, where the Town Hall stands. [Flower Box]
- PLOUGH INN, Market Square, now a dwelling house. [Back to being an Inn now]
- WINE VAULTS, The Narrows, now a shop and dwelling house. [17 High Street]
- \*WINE VAULTS Russell Street and corner of Back Lane, now a dwelling house. [LAMB INN, The Narrows, now a dwelling house. [18 High Street]
- BARLEY MOW INN, Market Street, now a shop and dwelling house. [Hengoed House behind RAFA Club]
- KING'S HEAD INN, Market Street, now a shop and dwelling house. [Opposite Fleece]
- ROYAL OAK INN, top of Market St, now a lodging house. [Set back below 43 Market St]
- BEAR INN, High Street, now a Butcher's Shop. Mr. Wm. Rogers says there was in Knighton, 75 years ago a family named Price who were known as the Bears and were reported to have lived at the Bear Inn. [The Headmaster]
- THE CONJURORS INN, on Conjurors Barn Bank. [Top of Knucklas Road]
- THE WINE SHOP, Broad Street, now occupied by Mr. Cartwright.
- HALF-WAY HOUSE, situated about half-way to Knucklas, now a dwelling house. It was a fully licensed Inn.
- SALUTATION INN 19-22 High Street [Something to Love]
- DUKES ARMS Bridge Street
- \*Also named the THREE HORSESHOES [at the corner of Russell Street and Piggy Lane] . From Jim Morris

## Malthouses in Knighton


*(Continued from page 30)* In 1941 Mr. R. Tench listed the four Malthouses in Knighton.

1) One in Broad Street, belonging to Mr. John P. Davies, sold about 1896 to North and South Wales Bank, then Midland Bank Ltd.

2) One was in Station Road where now stands Mr Oscar Medlicott's house 'The Chestnuts'.

3) The third stood in Bridge Street nearly opposite the Swan Hotel.

4) The fourth was situated in Church Street, now occupied by Messrs. Abley & Sons as a warehouse.



## Restoration of St Mary's Pilleth

Thanks to Peter and Heather Hood's collection of news items, we can re-tell how Pilleth Church was restored.

C t Mary's Pilleth has a fiery history. It was Utorched and gutted by Glyndwr after his victory over Edmund Mortimer's army in 1402, one of the biggest military victories for the Welsh. Many who died in the fighting lie buried in the churchyard, marked by Wellingtonia trees. In 1894 a fire left only the shell of the 16th century walls and earlier tower still standing. It was re-built, and in 1911 Mr Tapper installed a temporary roof of asphalt and plywood. He put all his efforts into the magnificent steps, funded by the owner of Nant-y-Groes. However, by the 1990s the church was in a sorry state; the roof was in dire need of replacing.

When Peter Hood (churchwarden) and Heather along with Albert and Sheila Ward of

Rock near Bewdley as well as the church community opposition started working towards a

restoration project they The Lottery faced strong opposition. commission made an unprecedented visit during 'Foot and Mouth' and saw for themselves the damp and damaged church. They fully supported the group who also won their case at a Consistory Court.

Then began the 10-year process of raising funds and restoring St Mary's. Here are some snippets of that 10- year process.

Hugo Mason of Hereford architects Hook Mason, outlined the work that was going to be done. This included repairing all walls, windows, lime washing the interior, restoring the weather vane, making the unstable bell tower secure and improving access to the church. But the main job would be a new roof (the roof then dated to 1911), using natural

slate to return the church to its former glory.

Mike Gammon was the builder

of Pilleth The Friends inspired the raising of 4.80,000 (25% of the cost)

£80,000 within the local community. The total was more than  $f_{300,000}$ . It took 10 years.

Albert and Sheila Ward, (Albert was chair of the Friends) visited the church as amateur historians and fell in love with it. They ran a Pilleth church stall at the Eistedfodd. They devised a fund raising project, 'Buy a Slate'.

At the launch Father Tim Williams said: "This is a memorable occasion for this church up on the hill that has over the years been plagued by fire, vandalism and theft [a sword, breastplate and set of spurs reportedly belonging to Sir John Price were stolen in the 1990s]. We are here to launch a new phase and what better time to do this than the Millennium." He also described Pilleth Church as "a powerhouse of prayers". Earl Lloyd George of Dwyfor, grandson of Lloyd George was the special guest at the launch of the restoration appeal.

In May 2000 there was an art exhibition of small paintings, drawings and prints - some by artists of international reknown -- at Pilleth

Court. Peter and Heather cleared out everything in the downstairs rooms of their home to make the exhibition possible. It was held over Easter weekend

## £10,00 worth of paintings

and  $f_{10,000}$  worth of pictures was sold, raising  $\frac{1}{2}$ ,000 for the restoration.

The book "Owain Glyndwr, The War of Independence in the Welsh Borders" by Geoffrey Hodges was sold during the Art Show. (cont on page 37)



The Friends of St Cynllo's Church held an L Italian Night in the Village Hall on Friday 13th May.




