



Jackie and Jean would like to say how much they appreciated the help of all who willingly gave of their time and talent to make the weekend a very special one.



The disciples on the cover are celebrating Pentecost (also called *Whitsun*). As its name, Pente, suggests, it is 50 days after Easter. In his last Resurrection appearance Jesus told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem for the Holy Spirit. This is that event. They were all together praying and the Spirit came upon each one, like tongues of fire. They were now able to speak the languages of visitors to Jerusalem, and Peter's sermon resulted in 3,000 converts. The disciples are jubilant; with the Spirit they can go everywhere to preach God's word.

The window is in St Peter's church in Cockett, Swansea. This year Pentecost was celebrated on 28th May







During his retirement in Llangunllo he was always interested in, and played an active role, within and beyond our community.

Bob's funeral took place in April at Hereford Crematorium, where family and friends shared their memories of him. As a community we will also be able to remember and pay tribute to him at our church service on May 21st 2023.

My first encounter with Bob was when I pulled up to visit the house I had just bought in Llangunllo. I wouldn't say that I was being vetted, but a few well placed questions to me, finishing off with did I like good food and wine appeared to qualify me, in Bob's eyes at least, to become an acceptable neighbour. From that day on I couldn't have wished for better neighbours, as both Jenny and Bob became not just a couple I shared a boundary fence with, but good friends. I have happy memories of them both, whether it was listening to them singing to each other whilst gardening, or an unexpected phone call telling me to come over as lunch was being put out and getting cold. It was down to them that I found myself getting involved in village life and the WI.

Oh and the chilli sauce and jam, all my family will miss those, we had a good deal going, I grew chillies and Bob made the sauces, the hotter the better.

Bob gave so much to the community, the church and his friends, but for me he wasn't just a good neighbour he was a wonderful friend who I miss dearly. I cherish the many happy memories of him that I have, the snappy dresser, the wicked sense of humour, popping round after his shopping trips with a bunch of flowers or the odd punnet of strawberries, but most of all I miss him just being Bob.


Coffee Morning/Table Sale

Coronation Celebrations In Llangunllo

The bells of St Cynllo's Church rang out, joyfully at 1.30 pm on Sunday, May 7th, as the warm sunshine illuminated the beautiful leaves of the magnificent copper beech tree, which was planted in the grounds of Llangunllo Community Hall to commemorate the Coronation of our dear, late monarch, HM Queen Elizabeth II, in 1953.

Around 2 pm, visitors, mostly wearing clothing coloured in red, white and blue, started to gather at the hall decorated with bunting and Union Flags, ready to enjoy the 'Big Lunch' celebration party, marking the Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla, the previous day.

A splendid afternoon tea, prepared by The Black Sheep Cafe in Knighton, was laid out inside; a tempting feast for visitors, arriving steadily. Outside, an array of games, including: a giant Jenga, table football, skittles, pin the ears on king charles, splat the rat and, especially for the children: a bouncy castle, which proved very popular indeed!

In the conservatory, Henry Morgan delighted onlookers with a collection of old photographs from past Coronations and Jubilees, taken from his wonderful collection.

The first event to commemorate the King's accession to the throne took place outside. A healthy-looking "King's Grace" apple tree sapling, kindly donated by Dale Edgar, was placed and planted by David Pugh and Hall Chairman, Debbie Jones.

At 3 pm, a regal fanfare, played with precision on trombone by Trevor Head, heralded the official welcome, jovially delivered by Master Of Ceremonies, Jonathan Protheroe. This was followed by the royal toast, a rousing rendition of the national anthem and a hearty 'three cheers' for His Majesty.

Next, came the presentation of commemorative metal lapel badges by Counsellor Chris Morgan to all children of primary school age and under.

Visitors were then invited to partake in the delicious buffet tea, whilst watching footage and photos on screen, of King Charles' life, "The Road To The Throne," compiled by Trevor Jones, and answer Royal-themed, fun quizzes, collated by Karen Edgar and Lynn Clark and placed on every table. Tea, coffee and soft drinks were also available, free of charge.

Once everyone had eaten, the children were encouraged and had fun searching for the hidden, chocolate, gold coins from "The King's Treasure" in and around the hall.

Finally, "King Charles' Gold Quack Race" was run in the River Lugg, accessed from the field at the rear of the hall. A stream of eager racers filed down to the river, hoping to hold the winning ticket, one from 100 ducks! They all swam off to a quick start, with a few heading the lead, but a few stragglers were left behind & failed to finish. When everyone had returned to the hall, the race victor, number 20, was announced by Isabel Morris. The winning duck belonged to Shirley Brown, who received her Royal Duck prize with the biggest smile and much cheering.

At this time the answers to the quiz were given and the competition cakes, "Fit For A King", were declared joint winners.

Jonathan rounded up a wonderful and fitting celebratory day by thanking everyone who had attended and all those who had worked so hard to make the afternoon another super success in Llangunllo!

Huge thanks to all the volunteers, who gave their time and expertise so generously and helped in so many different ways: The Black Sheep Cafe, Mid Wales Bouncy Castles & Soft Play Hire Ltd, The National Lottery for the grant, gratefully received, which funded the tea, bouncy castle and gazebos, Chris Alderson for carefully repairing and repainting the copper beech tree seating and to Mark Vaughan for the kind permission to use fields for the duck race & parking.



Flora and Fauna

June is probably the month that gives most satisfaction, and flower arrangers plenty of scope. Long hours of daylight and, hopefully, increasing sunshine will give the plants necessary energy for rapid growth and flower production. This month we see daily changes in the garden, with flowers and vegetables all bursting through the warm soil. June is the month of the beautiful bearded iris, yellow with lacy edges to the petals, green flushed softly with crimson, and maroon with a blue beard: such a variety of delightful colours to make fantastic arrangements. Many iris carry the scent of vanilla, a real joy to have in the home.

Roses are the favourite for all who have the pleasure of a garden, full blown hybrids, sprawling clusters of the old-fashioned variety damask and moss roses, not forgetting the wild dog rose in the hedgerows, so delicate. Our lives are filled with references to roses. It is a symbolic flower shape which is found in heraldry and church windows. The Romans

loved roses. They were probably responsible for bringing the first ornamental roses to Britain, but it was not until Plantagenet times that roses were brought to national attention when the Houses of York and Lancaster chose white and red roses as their symbols, a lovely piece of history.

Tender plants that we have been taking care of indoors can now be planted out in the garden – dahlias, nerines, geraniums and bedding plants, to name but a few. The soil often dries out this month very quickly, especially baskets and tubs, so it is essential to give nature a helping hand by feeding and watering regularly; sweet peas and tall plants will require staking; weeding and deadheading are a few of the most hated tasks in the garden, but a few simple techniques and a little forward planning may mean we will be able to spend more time relaxing in the sun and enjoying the garden.

How much do you know about the new arrangements in our **East Radnor Ministry Area?**

The Ministry Area is now the parish, with the Ministry Area Council (MAC) now legally taking over from our local Parochial Church Councils (PCCs), so what is the position of our local churches? Here are some extracts from the diocesan website:

https://swanseaandbrecon.churchinwales.org.uk/en/ministry-areas/

Local Churches

Each church or group of churches within the Ministry Area should have a church committee and appoint church (sub) wardens. This group will be responsible for matters of local concern.

Does the MAC overrule the local church committees - does all the power lie in the MAC?

The MAC is the legal governing body of the Ministry Area and is responsible for reviewing and approving large building projects to ensure that there are sufficient funds and also to ensure that the correct Safeguarding and Health and safety procedures are carried out. However, each church has control over its own matters of outreach and mission to its community, its fundraising and the management of its own ringfenced finances.

Will the PCCs remain or how will their function change?


The current PCC's will be dissolved. The new legal body will be the MAC. Local Churches will each have a church council to deal with the day to day running of their churches and their local outreach into their communities.

In the future will there just be one Annual Vestry meeting and report?

Yes there will be one meeting and one report as each Ministry Area will be a single benefice unit and will in due course be registered with the charity commissioners; therefore a single report and meeting will be required. Churches will need to have their own meetings to choose people to be their officers and church council members.

What is a Men's Shed?

Men's Sheds (or Sheds) are similar to garden sheds – a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter.

Activities in Sheds vary greatly, but you can usually find woodworking, metalworking, repairing and restoring, electronics, model buildings or even car building in a typical Shed. Sheds typically attract older men, but many have younger members and women too. Whatever the activity, the essence of a Shed is not a building, but the connections and relationships between its members.

Sheds are about meeting like-minded people and having someone to share your worries with. They are about having fun, sharing skills and knowledge with like-minded people and gaining a renewed sense of purpose and belonging. As a by-product of all of that they reduce isolation and feelings of loneliness, they allow men to deal with mental health challenges more easily and remain independent, they rebuild communities and, in many cases, they save men's lives.



The bunting was out in Knucklas on Saturday for a party in the orchard below the Castle, with tea, cakes and the odd drop of local cider, all to celebrate a great achievement - after 14 years of fundraising the Knucklas Community Land Project finally owns the 21-acre site that includes the remains of Knucklas Castle, the hill, orchard and allotments.

Despite a late downpour, the event attracted over 100 people, some returning to the project after many years, all delighted that the vision of the instigators had been finally realised.

There was a display detailing the history of the site and the work of the volunteers who have worked tirelessly to create this very special place. Other attractions included live traditional folk music and walks on Castle Hill with expert guides to the local flora and fauna.

For the children there were activities provided by 'Branching Out - Forest School', who taught them about the wildlife of the surrounding area and even encouraged the children to make their own bows and arrows.

Founder member Lottie O'Leary said 'What a wonderful celebration! Thanks to all those who have helped over the last 14 years raise the $f_{...86,000}$, so that Knucklas Castle Community Land Trust is now debt free. It means we can concentrate on the future of the hill, the archaeology, reconnecting with nature, planting trees and growing food together.'

Celtic Saint of the Month

Wouldn't it be wonderful if we had an evangelist as energetic as Moluag in our ministry area. He was trained in the great monastery of Bangor in Ulster and was a contemporary of St Columba. His Irish name was pronounced Lua and the 'mo' at the beginning and the 'ag' or 'oc' at the end were terms of endearment, so Moluag means 'my dear Lua'.

Columba and Moluag both wanted to settle on the Isle of Lismore, off the coast of Argyll, near Oban, so they had a race and Moluag won. He founded his first monastic settlement on the north of the island. His original church eventually became a cathedral, but now it has been rebuilt as the parish church.




The parish church, built on the site of Lismore Cathedral, within the original monastic settlement.

Another of his churches, on the Isle of Lewis, is still locally known as 'the cathedral'.

From Lismore Moluag and his disciples set off across Scotland to convert the Picts. Avoiding the areas where Ninian and Columba had already been, he founded two more major monastic settlements, at Rosemarkie on the Black Isle and Mortlach near Dufftown (now famous for its whisky

distilleries). From these three centres Moluag went on to found over a hundred other church communities, even as far south as Alyth in Perthshire, throughout the Inner and Outer Hebrides, and there is even one on the Isle of Man.

Moluag died on 25th June 592, the day of a solar eclipse, which is interesting as the name Lua means 'clear shining light'.

The Martyrology of Oengus remembers him with these words:

> "The pure, the bright, the pleasant, the sun of Lismore; that is Moluoc. of Lismore in Alba".



The Bachuil Mor is Moluag's staff, made of blackthorn wood and still in the care of the Livingstone family. Moluag's bell was lost, but this one discovered recently could be his.



4th June Trinity Sunday, Celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. Luke 24:49 manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'



Evancoyd is 'Evan's Wood'.



It may have something to do with mael, meaning *prince* or *lord.* There are other possibilities also, for instance it could be a personal name as in Maelienydd Does anyone have any suggestions?

Maesyfed is the Welsh name for New Radnor. It means Hyfaidd's open field. We don't know who Hyfaidd was, but he is mentioned in other place-names too. So Radnorshire is Sir Faesyfed.

He was such a singular person. Not one to forget. I first became aware of him one winter when I noticed a small tent hidden behind the hedge up the lane. There was some bad weather on the way and soon it began to snow: the tent was still there...

So I went along to the field gate and said would he care to sleep in my workshop? Not a warm place exactly, but dry and a lot more comfortable than the tiny tent.

He stayed a few weeks, only coming to my door for drinking water each day and a few brief words, never much conversation. He did say he lived in Birmingham and how he hated being there, so I asked why he didn't move away somewhere, to Knighton maybe. 


Open the Book at Knighton Primary School

From a humble start in a small North Wales village, to boosting food supplies during both World Wars. and groundbreaking campaigns on equal pay and AIDS awareness and a spectrum of subjects including mental health and climate change, the National Federation of Women's Institutes has a long-standing history of undertaking educational work and campaigning on a diverse range of issues. It was established to ensure that women are able to take an effective part in their community, to learn together, widen their horizons, improve and develop the quality of their lives and those of their communities and together influence local, national and international affairs on issues that matter to members.

We are not just about crafts, making tea, or 'jam and Jerusalem'. The WI has a tradition of actively and successfully campaigning on a wide range of issues, for over 100 years bringing women together to take action on local, national and global issues that matter to women. The groundbreaking issues are diverse and The WI has brought about real change.

WI members have taken the unique opportunity to turn a concern into a national campaign every year, backed by the whole of the WI. Every issue that we campaign on stems directly from a resolution put forward by members and adopted at the National Annual Meeting.

Make a Match This campaign seeks to promote registration to the aligned UK stem cell registry to enable more people to receive potentially life-saving stem cell transplant

Climate Change The WI has a proud history of taking action to protect the environment. As a founding member of **The Climate Coalition**, the WI movement works to urge policymakers to take decisive action to tackle climate change, and to encourage community networks to come together on climate action projects in their local area.

End Plastic Soup Our campaign explores the scale of the microplastic fibre pollution and calls on the government and industry to develop solutions to the problem.

Food Matters Our campaign to reduce food waste and tackle food poverty.

SOS for Honeybees Since 2009 we have been campaigning to raise awareness of the plight of bees and how we can take action to decelerate the UK honeybee population.

Link Together to Alleviate Loneliness We are working alongside health and social care providers and raising awareness of the causes and impacts of loneliness.

5 Minutes that Matter Our campaign seeks to raise awareness of the importance of attending routine cervical screenings, and support more women to make an informed decision about whether or not to take up their invitations.

Make Time for Mental Health We are working to improve the way people view mental health and are calling for better support for those who need it.


Get on Board We are seeking to raise awareness of the importance of local bus services and to empower members and WIs to make the case for buses in their local communities

New Radnor WI

New Radnor WI enjoyed an informative talk on May Day by DESNA McALL, entitled "Dogs for Good", a charity founded by FRANCES HAY 40 years ago. The same training techniques as those devised by Frances Hay are still used today.



These wonderful dogs help adults and children with disabilities.

There are several charities, Canine Partners, Medical Detection Dogs, Guide Dogs for the Blind, to name just a few, and they receive no funding from government. The Lottery provides some financial support, but most comes from bequests in WILLS. (22,000 is the cost of an Assistance Dog from puppyhood to retirement.

Most work is done by VOLUNTEERS, with only DOG TRAINERS and MANAGERS receiving regular salary.

Desna explained how the dogs are very specifically bred, usually from Labradors, and looked after by an ASSISTANCE DOG VOLUNTEER in the volunteer's home whilst the training period is in progress, trained from birth in socialisation with people of all ages.

The Labrador breed is *soft mouthed* and will help clients, children and adults, get dressed and in many other ways too. The company, friendship and independence the dog provides is life transforming.





In a different setting, it was as if we were seeing them for the first time and we commented on what quality had been achieved, mostly during lock down. It was great to see them up close and so well lit. If you don't get over to Llanidloes to see these works of art, they will soon be back up in the Hall at Whitton.

Stowe & Stanage WI

We were delighted to welcome Desna McCall from the *Dogs for Good* charity to our May meeting. Desna told us about assistance dogs that are trained and supplied for all sorts of needs. They are bred in-house and at seven to eight weeks are placed with a voluntary socialiser, who takes them to all those places that people might need to access. This builds an indication of the dog's character.

Labradors and retrievers are most commonly used and training is carried out at the centre.

Assistance dogs are particularly in demand for disabled adults and children, those with autism, and can help to rebuild people's confidence and enable them to venture into the community. There is continuous assessment of where they would be best placed. They are trained to walk behind a wheelchair; to push to switch on a light or open automatic doors, to shut a door or drawer. They learn to pull and let go so that they can open doors, drawers, put things into a washing machine or basket. They retrieve, pick things up, and learn a one-off bark for help. The trainer then works with the proposed owner to match their needs.

The dogs are usually retired at ten years. The cost to the charity of training and looking after a dog for its lifetime is about $f_{,22,000}$.




