# About the Cover: St Michael, Feast Day 29 September

This quaint and curious picture of St Michael dates back to 1330-5. It is from Eaton Bishop, a Herefordshire church famous for its fine medieval glass. During World War 2 the glass was dismantled and removed for safe keeping, but when they re-assembled it, they goofed. Hence one wing and a foot are all wrong. It all adds to the delight.

St Michael, one of the archangels is usually shown holding a sword and fighting the devil as he is the defender of the faith. But here he holds the scales of Justice, weighing the souls of the departed. He points to the poor man who is sadly tipping the scale downward.





# **Dads and Shared Memories**

These were very much part of our Fathers' Day service in Llangunllo when we gave our thanks for fathers - for what they are and all the things they do.

We also thought about how God is Jesus' father as well as being our Father in Heaven. The reading from Romans drew our attention to the fact that life isn't always a bed of roses, but that those difficulties are all part of life's lessons and having a father's support, be he earthly or otherwise, can help us to get through.

In our prayers we remembered many different kinds of fathers, some very far from the idealised, cosy image, but fathers nevertheless, with all the challenges that entails.

A light hearted poem, "My Dad and I" delivered by a very convincing adult who had to pretend to be a 10 year old – actual children being rather too busy working at the back of the church – brought us nicely to the part of the service where memories were recounted of shared times and lessons learnt with Dads.

A picture was painted of a young man having to tell his Dad that he had just crashed the car that they had both put all their meagre spare cash towards buying. His father's reaction of immediate concern for his son rather than the car speaks volumes about what is more important in life. Some rather younger people plucked up courage to come to the front with their Dads to tell us about learning how to back a trailer and another's time shared with Dad whilst Mum was away and managing to cook an egg as a surprise for him. The industrious children then brought forward the products of their labour decorated envelopes, one for each of the gentlemen present, containing a single large button threaded onto a loop of twine. We called them whizzers. Maybe your Dad made one for you when money was short for buying toys! Anyway, the novelty of them fascinated the children and took the rest of us down Memory Lane, talking about other home made amusements whilst we did our best to demolish the ample refreshments laid on after the service.

If you've never heard of whizzers I'll leave you to find out what they are and how they work and maybe you remember other similar things you could share with Radnor readers. Pam L-L

### Summer Racing at Llangunllo

At the beginning of July, the Wales and Border Counties Harness Racing returned to Llangunllo for the second year.

The scenic course at Griffin Lloyd Farm, provided an afternoon of entertaining and competitive racing, where the tight track highlighted the old adage "horses for courses" so picking winners was not always straight forward. Many spectators cheered on those racing and in the heats and finals held, horses from the local area, South Wales and Herefordshire gained victory for their owner, trainer and rider.

The day before, horsepower of a different kind was seen in the Llangunllo and Bleddfa area, particularly at Lea Hall Farm, as motorbikes competed in a stage of this year's Welsh 2 Day Enduro. A large crowd was present to watch and enjoy the action.

First held in 1952, this motorcycle time trial has become an annual event, as riders from all

over the world take to the roads, hills and forest of Mid Wales. Many charities and organisations throughout the area benefit from donations given by the committee.

Racing concluded the following weekend with Knighton Motor Club staging their 2023 Pacemaker Road Rally. A short, but demanding road race, the final section included the loop from Llangunllo Station, Dolyfelin and Creignant. The later part of this loop claimed the long-time leaders who went off the road and their Ford Escort car left stranded. Sixty vehicles took part over the seventy - nine miles course in three hours of virtually non- stop competition.

Bleddfa church organised the first genuinely missionary event in our group if not Radnorshire for a very long time and Bleddfa can be proud of that. They had three significant speakers who enthralled us with their personal stories and hopefully ignited a sense of renewed faith in the lives of those who came to listen. Bleddfa church looked lovely for these talks, both inside and out, despite the very small numbers of those who attend.

At the last "Ignite Me" Bishop John told us the fascinating story of how he was ignited for God. After a grudging background as a choir boy he first came to know God as a young man in the navy, while stuffed into a very confined bunk space. Suddenly God was real. Over the years that knowledge grew into commitment when "coincidences" meant he couldn't ignore the call. After his naval career he worked as an aircraft engineer solving problems. He could fix anything that was broken. God used that 'fixit' mentality to help John lead a broken church. They decided to try again; determination paid off. The congregation and the life of the church grew out of all resemblance to previous times. Bishop John's story moved on from there.

We were all inspired by Bishop John's excitement for the gospel, his down-to-earth language, his practical approach to problems, and especially for his good humour.

# East Radnor Ministry Area Council Meeting Monday 10<sup>th</sup> July @ Whitton Church 7.30pm

PG welcomed everyone and opened the MAC with prayer.

•Dr David Evans has been ratified at the MAC chair Proposed Colin Pugh, Seconded Christine Gould, all present agreed with the motion.

The chair will keep order, time and control digressions in the meeting. PG as the MAL will meet with David to agree the agenda and any matters that need to be raised to be emailed to DE, PG or RDS at least 2 weeks before the MAC meeting.

• For a MAC meeting to be quorate 9 members of the MAC need to be in attendance for the meeting to proceed.

• For any decisions to be made or faculties etc to be passed a majority needs to be agreed on. This will be discussed at the next meeting

• The **DRAFT MINIUTES** will be distributed to all MAC members for them to correct any errors within 7 days of receiving them. Please let RDS know of any changes by Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> July this time, thank you. Once the minutes have been ratified by the chair, a copy will be emailed by the secretary to PG, RDS, all MAC members and sub wardens. The minutes will need to be displayed on each church notice board and the secretary will email a copy to the Radnor editor. Any comments relevant to the published minutes need to be given to the church MAC member for inclusion in the next available meeting. All present in agreement on how the minutes are to be distributed.

• Colin Pugh has been ratified as the first ERMA Warden and this was agreed by all who were present. The second warden post remains vacant at this time.

• The treasurer post remains vacant. PG will approach Howard Dean to see if he is willing to take up this post.

• For the charitable status to be put in place a treasurer needs to be in post and all the MAC members need to complete a trustee form. PG will find out information on what this entails for the MAC members. SR asked what type of charity will the ERMA be, PG will look into this and will advise the MAC members when she has a definitive answer from head office.

• **ERMA Administrator post update:** The job spec has not changed and still doesn't include a person spec for the job. Also, it is imperative that PG & DE be included on the interview panel for this

role. SR & PG to discuss a way forward for this matter. We are still waiting for a site visit to inspect the 4 available office spaces in Knighton, PG to chase up for a date for this to happen.

Site 1: The Old Post Office (Private house with a private gallery). It has buzz in security, a member of the household in the building, a private workspace in the gallery with lockable filing cabinets and cupboard, private use of a kitchenette and bathroom.

Site 2: Watsons Ale Bar Site 3: Knighton Hotel Site 4: The Community Centre

• The agenda for the next MAC meeting to be published and distributed 4 weeks before the meeting, giving a chance for each church to meet to see if any matters need to be brought to the MAC meeting. All present agreed on this proposal

• **Sub Committees:** we need to see what skill sets people have in our churches for them to be part of the subcommittees. PG to check if they need to be on the electoral role to be members. A MAC member can oversee the work of the subcommittee and report back to the MAC meeting.

• **Safeguarding:** The MAC Safeguarding Officer Carolynne Conway has been ratified into this post. Proposed SR, Seconded RT, agreed by all members present.

• Swansea and Brecon Leading your Church into Growth conference will be held at Swanwick Conference Centre, Sheffield 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> October. This will be free of charge as Bishop John has facilitated this for the diocese. RDS will be the clergy member going from the ERMA and CG & DE have expressed an interest to be part of the team from here (3 laity spaces available). Please ask members of your church if they would like a place on the team by the 30<sup>th</sup> July and let RDS know, thank you.

• Faculty application for the refurbishment of St Edward's Church, Knighton tower clock. The total of  $\pounds$ 9,900 to date has been raised for this project, to go ahead in the autumn, hopefully. Faculty has been agreed to go ahead: Proposed CP, Seconded SR, all present in agreement.

• AOB: The ERMA bank account details are to be sent to the church treasurers so that they can pay in their Parish Share and MA contribution.

• Any sundries, eg candles, paper etc will be held in the administrators office to be collected when required. A bill will then be sent to the relevant treasurer for the supplies taken.

• The Parish Profile is with Archdeacon Peter Brooks for compilation. As soon as it is received it will be emailed out to the MAC members ready to be discussed at the next meeting. PG to action.

• The next MAC meeting will be on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> September, 7.30pm at Whitton Community Hall.

DE closed the meeting with prayer.





## The Flower Arranger's Garden

For most of us summer is the favourite season in the garden. Everything looks so bright and pleasing with warm days and blue skies. The pleasure of sitting out in the evening, enjoying the exquisite scent and admiring your hard work is rather satisfying. So far this year it has been disappointing with the weather so changeable; wet days encouraging the weeds, slugs and snails. However, we do have so much to be grateful for. The news of devastation, caused by terrific heat and flooding with the loss of so many lives and homes, should make us thankful to live here in the UK.

We are often reminded of the big decline in butterflies in the garden; their delightful bright colours and fluttering flight make them the most pretty and welcome guests in all gardens. We are encouraged to plant more nectar rich flowers for them to feed on: verbena, stonecrop, red valerian, buddleia and so many others. This month it is worth a visit to the garden centre if you are looking for pollinators and cheap plants. They often have a sale of surplus stock. As the faded summer borders need tidying up, do keep back some of the lovely seedheads. Collect them when the weather is fine and store in a dry place ready for your winter decorations. They look attractive in their natural colour, but spray painting and gilding will add something special to your Christmas arrangements. Many of our small birds also enjoy seeds, so do leave some for them.

Flower arrangers cut and use many items of plant material which are not actually flowers or even look flower like. It is a matter of developing an imaginative eye for shape, character, colour and texture to create your design and hopefully appeal to the viewer and judge in the competitive show. I believe it was the American inventor Thomas Edison who said, "To invent you need a good imagination and a pile of junk."

September is the month when evening classes commence. Flower and gardening clubs have everything in place for a busy and enjoyable programme for the months ahead. Do check what is on offer locally. There is still a lot of colour in the garden for us to enjoy and I am sure there will be some lovely warm days to tackle the many jobs waiting to be done, with so many changes as one season is ending and a new one begins.





He was assisted by Rev'd Rachael Storer. Worshippers joined from other churches in the East Radnor group.



On Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> July Colva hosted an evening of talks for the Painscastle History Group. People gathered at Colva Farm. Ros Tarrant informed everyone about past inhabitants who ran what was then the Sun Inn. Rev'd Francis Kilvert noted in his diary the day he visited the church and enjoyed a glass of beer at the pub, having walked from Clyro. Many properties and farms were rented from the Ormathwait estate until it was dispersed in 1945. Mr Robert (Bob) Davies, a former tenant, purchased Colva Farm and continued farming it with his father Richard (Dick of Colva). They were both well known for their singing voice.

The group then proceeded to the church where Jas Grassey gave an account of an extraordinary event in April 1912 when Denis Corbett-Wilson was forced to land his Bleriot plane in a field in sight of the church near Pentwyn. It caused a lot of excitement and people ventured from all round to view the aircraft. Denis eventually headed for Fishguard and successfully crossed the Irish sea, only to crash land again at Enniscorthy, County Wexford.

To conclude the evening Jill Fieldhouse gave an interesting account of the history of the church and its unique wall paintings and other features. The church, according to CADW, is Grade II\* and 'retains considerable unspoilt character from medieval and later periods'. Jill has produced a chronological list of burials from 1666 to date, which is available to view in the church.

People then had an opportunity to view the various books and photographs, before enjoying refreshments provided by the local ladies. We are grateful to the group for their generous donation to the church restoration fund.





### **Dol-Llugan Diary Snippets**

#### John's weather reports

In **1967** a particularly mild spring until February 9<sup>th</sup> "the last of the nice and warm" when wintry weather set in 'til April 14<sup>th</sup> "the first nice warm day" but then May 1<sup>st</sup> "cold again". Then less detail 'til 18<sup>th</sup> "snow in December that was all gone the next day".

No weather in **1970** except a lovely day in March, some rain in July and snow on the hills in November with a comment on 30<sup>th</sup> "Nice mild so far this autumn".

**1980** starts wintry, getting milder towards the end of March with some rain but then an extended dry spell leads to May 15<sup>th</sup> /16<sup>th</sup> "very hot" and 20<sup>th</sup> "first rain for weeks". By 3<sup>rd</sup> June "too hot to work", then swinging from warm and humid to cold with heavy showers and thunder storms on and off through to August 15<sup>th</sup> "first fine day for weeks" (Note: snow forecast in Scotland on 20<sup>th</sup> July) Rather finer then until October 6<sup>th</sup> "Harvest Thanks Giving – bad rain and wind".

1990 5th January "like a summer day" but by 24th "all covered in snow" with "very wet and windy, a lot of damage" the following day. More snow, heavy rain and floods until March 17th "warmest day for years". Snow on hills and frost in April, then fine and mild and, by May 3<sup>rd</sup>, "hot with 82 degrees". Hot and humid, hail and thunder storms lead up to very hot in July and August with temperatures in the 90s reaching 98 - the hottest ever recorded - with grass scorched and banks burning. September saw "Brook dry all the way up the Bottom Meadow to Long Pasture". Later cooler and wetter with wintry conditions towards the end of November leading to Saturday 8th December "Worst day since 1982". "Gillian Morgan's after wedding party. Liz invited. But oh the snow and ice, the wind, the gales, all the phone calls. But no Joy. What a pity, what a shame. Oh dear, oh dear, oh dear!"

At our meeting on 3<sup>rd</sup> July, Libby welcomed Debby and Alison who led us through some





### Celtic Saint of the Month St Adomnán of Iona 23<sup>rd</sup> September died 704

The most likely reason most of us have heard of Adomnán is that he is the author of "The Life of St Columba", our earliest Celtic hagiography and one of the few written within living memory of the subject, for there were still people alive who remembered



Columba and were able to pass their memories on.

But who was Adomnán? And what else did he do? He was born in Donegal c. 624, twenty seven years after the death of his distant cousin Columba. As a teenager he joined one of Columba's family of monasteries in Ireland, probably Durrow, and received a high level of education, which was continued when he joined the Iona monastic community about ten years later. In 679 he became the ninth abbot of Iona.

As abbot, Adomnán travelled extensively in what is now Scotland, Ireland and Northumbria. He is commemorated in churches on the west coast and also east of the Grampian mountains, under various spellings of his name. He is well known in Donegal also, where he is known as Eunan. He was responsible for all the Columban monasteries, was a diplomat, a friend of kings and a poet.

Did you know that he wrote two more important books? A Gaulish bishop named Arculf made landfall on Iona and told Adomnán about all the holy places he had


visited. Adomnán wrote "De Locis Sanctis" (The Holy Places), based on Arculf's account and embellished with his research in the library of Iona and it became well known throughout Europe. He gave a copy to the king of Northumbria in Jarrow, where he also met Bede, a teenager at the time, who later used Adomnan's book as a basis for

his own book on holy places.

Adomnán's third book the "Cain Adomnáin" (Adomnán's Law) is generally known as "The



a stake in society. It was signed by forty church leaders and over fifty kings of Ireland and Scotland. An impressive legacy indeed.








# **Exciting News from New Radnor Hub**






