Open the Book

It is a great privilege to be able to go to Knighton Primary School on Thursday afternoons to present Bible stories to the children under the aegis of Open the Book. It was several years ago that Rev'd Melia Cope brought the idea to Churches Together in Knighton and District and she inspired people from the Knighton churches and others in our ministry area to join the project. There were so many of us that we had enough people for two groups, going into school on alternate Thursdays. We have built up a wonderful collection of costumes and props to help us dramatize the stories and the children love to join in. We try to involve a few children each week, dressing up as characters in the story and even saying a few lines of the story. During Covid we were able to tell stories on Zoom, which the teachers enjoyed showing to their classes during the week. After the lockdown we got back together and videoed the stories to send into school. You can see some photos opposite of our antics in the Methodist Church as we tried to be film stars.

By the time we were able to return to school, several people had moved on to other things, for various reasons, so now we only have a small group to present the fortnightly story. You can see some photos of us back in school and some of the children who help us. The stories are written by Bob Hartman, under the umbrella of the Bible Society, and we always finish with a thoughtful time and a prayer for the children to say Amen if they want to make it their own prayer.

If you think you might be interested in taking part, you can come along on a Thursday to see what we do. My contact details are below and I can explain about training and safeguarding. We would love to have someone to take charge of the costumes and we also need a photographer. Laura Woodside-Jones used to take wonderful photos and she would get permission from the parents to allow the children's photos to be published in The Radnor.

Another thing that we need is people to pray for us and our school. Here is a prayer from an organisation called Pray for Schools: *Father, please pour out Your blessings upon our whole school community so that everyone grows in the knowledge of Your truth, love, wisdom and peace. In Jesus name we pray. Amen.*

About the Cover – Jesus, the Good Shepherd

At this time of lambing *"The Lord is my shepherd"* (Psalm 23) resonates with all in the farming community. One of the names we have for Jesus is the *"lamb of God."* In the stained glass image Jesus is carrying two lambs and surrounded by sheep. The Brecon Beacons are behind with a tree (reminiscent of the cross) and spring flowers. His robes are vivid red, for martyrdom, and despite their elegant trim, he is barefoot in humility.

Over and over we see Jesus as a good shepherd, tenderly caring for the sheep. In Matthew and Luke's gospels the good shepherd leaves his 99 sheep to find the one who is lost. In John's gospel Jesus says that he will lay down his life for the sheep. That divine care appears repeatedly in the Psalms; God *"led out his people like sheep and guided them in the wilderness like a flock. [78.52]"*

The window is probably by Taylor & Clifton from the early 20th Century. It was given in memory of David and Elizabeth Thomas by their children.



Celtic Saint of the Month - St Brynach - 7th April

Brynach, like his contemporary Brychan Brycheiniog, one of whose daughters married Brynach, was of Irish extraction. He may have been born in Ireland or, more likely, in West Wales, where there were many Irish settlers. Traditionally he was known as Brynach Wyddol (Brynach the Irishman).


After a wild time as a youth, he settled down to follow where God would lead him. It is said that he went to Rome, where he slew the obligatory evil serpent, then passed through Brittany on his way back to Wales, landing at Milford Haven. He was friends with St David, who often visited him at his best-known foundation, St Brynach's, Nevern. Nevern

is famous for its tall Celtic cross, decorated all over with interlacing patterns. It is called St Brynach's Cross, but dates about 400 years after him. However there are two memorial stones from St Brynach's era, one standing in the churchyard and the other laid on an inside windowsill, both with ogham script.

At Pontfaen is another church dedicated to Brynach and from there you can see Carn Inglis, a hill that he used to climb for meditation and to meet with angels. While Brynach was living there with his fellow monks, he owned an extra large cow and a wolf. The cow was precious as it gave more milk than other cows. The wolf took the cow out to pasture in the

morning and brought it in again every evening. The cow came to a sticky end due to the antics of a local king, Maelgwn, who demanded that Brynach provide him with a banquet. With no banquet forthcoming, he stole the cow, chopped it up and put it in water to boil. But the water remained cold! Believing this to be a judgement from God, Maelgwn repented and returned to Brynach for forgiveness. Brynach resurrected the cow and returned it to the wolf's safekeeping. The monks gathered wheaten bread from an oak tree for Maelgwn and his starving men.

There are seven churches dedicated to Brynach in south west Wales and a few in south east Wales. Their connection with the distribution of ogham stones continues the Irish influence.

It is possible that eventually Brynach sailed back over the Severn Sea to north Devon. The church in Braunton is dedicated to St Brannock, who could well be the same person, and that is where he would have died.

What does a Ministry Area look like?

From the website of the Diocese of Swansea and Brecon

We seek to be faithful to our Lord, to gather as God's people, grow in his image, and go out in his power. The new Ministry Area model provides an organisational structure designed to reduce administrative hurdles. There is one design, but each Ministry Area will have a unique look and feel.

Context

We now live in a post-christendom society and our diocese needs to respond to the changes which have taken place. The diocesan vision is to see growing and flourishing local churches. The structures and systems which have been inherited are no longer the best framework to enable this mission and ministry to develop.

The aim of Ministry Areas is to reduce the obstacles that hold back being a stronger and more lively Christian presence. Fundamental to the concept of Ministry Areas is that they are rooted in teamwork.

Very simply, a Ministry Area is a gathering of churches which provides the opportunity to streamline administration and expand the ability for mission to take place. By working together in a collaborative way churches and their people can share knowledge, skills, resources and talent to the glory of God.

Each Ministry Area will have an appropriate stipendiary presence shared with other licensed ordained and lay ministers.

Governance of the Ministry Area

The model this diocese is moving to will be:

- Diocese
- Archdeaconry
- Ministry Area

(which will also take the constitutional role of the Deanery and the Parish)

Local Church

The current Benefice / Parish boundaries within a Ministry Area will be removed. The Ministry Area will have a single Parochial Church Council. Each Ministry Area will also, in time, become an unincorporated charity, with the members of the Parochial Church Council also being trustees of the charity, so long as they are eligible. The removal of legal boundaries within a Ministry Area will mean that the right to marriage, baptism and burial will extend to the Ministry Area.

Ministry Area Council

The Ministry Area Council will set the strategic direction of the Ministry Area. It will have the powers of both the former Parochial Church Council and Deanery Conference and will promote the mission and ministry of the Church. It will identify and review the needs of the Ministry Area in respect to people, finance, buildings and property. Two Ministry Area Wardens will be elected by an Annual Parochial Meeting of the Ministry Area. The Ministry Area Council

will elect a Chair from its membership. The membership is governed by the Constitution of the Church in Wales. Each Ministry Area will define its own mechanism for local representation. Each Ministry Area Council is invited to provide representation to Diocesan Committees. Other sub-groups may exist but are not part of the governance structure, e.g. fundraising group, prayer group etc.

Local Churches

Each church or group of churches within the Ministry Area should have a church committee and appoint church (sub) wardens. This group will be responsible for matters of local concern.



Prayer Walking In Our Community

Prayer walking is just what it sounds. You pray as you walk.

What is the point? Think of it as stepping out as God's children, to intercede for those who are living in your community. Be intentional about praying for God's blessings on what you see and feel.

Simply praying: "Your Kingdom come, your will be done..." is an excellent start.

Prayer walking is NOT about being seen to be praying, you are not doing it to 'show off'. It is about seeing your neighbourhood with compassion, and then praying for God's mercy and blessing to be upon it.

So, as you go along, you can pray quietly, or in silence. If you do want to pray out loud, take a friend along, so that it will seem merely as if you are chatting. In fact, when you do a prayer walk, it is best not to do it alone. Always try and go with someone else. After all, Jesus sent His disciples out in pairs.

On your prayer walk, try and be aware of what God is saying to you as you move around the community. As the former Archbishop of York, Lord Sentamu, once advised: "If any Bible verses pop into your head or if you have any pictures, visions or words of knowledge, turn these into prayer."

At the end of the prayer walk, share with others what you prayed for, and heard from God. Write any impressions down, so you can keep track of how you have prayed for your area.

Again, to quote Lord Sentamu, "If you feel that God has highlighted specific needs or challenges, think about how to take action. Could you or the church be part of God's solution practically, as well as prayerfully?"

1st April - All Fools' Day

In years gone by, the rules surrounding April Fool were this: between midnight and noon on 1st April, everyone is 'fair game' to be made a fool of. It is the morning of the practical joke. But the aim is not just to discomfort the victim: he must be tricked into taking action himself, sent on a 'fool's errand'.

And so children would be sent to the dairy for a pint of dove's milk, or to the bookseller for The Life of Eve's Mother. Practical jokes on a bigger scale were played: in 1860 a vast number of people received an official looking invitation to the Tower of London that read: 'Admit the Bearer and Friends to view the Annual Ceremony of Washing the White Lions.' Precisely the same trick had been played in 1698.

Then, on the stroke of noon, tradition decrees, April Fools is finished. If anyone attempts devilry thereafter, even while the clock is still striking, it recoils on his own head. A child would then race through the sing-song formula: 'April-FoolDay's-past-and-gone-you're-the-fool-and-I-am-none!'






The Late Roger K.T. Bright







Welsh Hymns 2 - Tydi a roddaist

Tydi, a roddaist liw i'r wawr, A hud i'r machlud mwyn; Tydi, a luniaist gerdd a sawr, Y gwanwyn yn y llwyn: O! cadw ni rhag colli'r hud Sydd heddiw'n crwydro drwy'r holl fyd.

> Tydi, a lunaist gan i'r nant, A'i su i'r goedwig werdd; Tydi, a roist i'r awel dant, Ac i'r ehedydd gerdd: O! cadw ni rhag dyfod dydd Na yrr ein calon gan yn rhydd.

Tydi, a glywaist lithriad traed Ar ffordd Calfaria gynt; Tydi, a welaist ddafnau gwaed Y Gwr ar ddieithr hynt: O! cadw ni rhag dyfod oes Heb goron ddrain, na chur, na chroes. Amen. O Thou who gave the dawn its form And gently set the sun. O Thou who formed the song and scent Of sylvan springtime green. Oh! save us lest the magic goes That every place in this world knows.

O Thou who gave the brook his song And murmuring green forest made; Who gave the breeze its biting tongue The lark its serenade; Oh! save us lest we see a day That cause our heart's song go away.

O Thou who once heard hesitant steps On Calvary's hill of shame; Who saw the blood in trickling drops From Man on path so strange; Oh! save us from our future loss; No crown of thorns, nor pain, nor cross. Amen


Tydi a roddaist is a well- loved hymn with an interesting history, the words by T. Rowland Hughes who was born in 1903, the son of a Llanberis quarryman and lay preacher. He went to university and worked as a teacher before being recruited to the newly established BBC Wales. Originally the BBC had a 'West and Wales' region, but following protests a Wales only region started in 1937. The historian John Davies argued the establishment of the "Welsh Region" was an important concession to nationalist sentiment and compared it with the disestablishment of the Church in Wales from the Church of England in 1920. These events enhanced a sense of nationhood and a belonging to an entity called "Wales". The Depression of the 1920s and 1930s was a difficult time for Wales with mass unemployment, near starvation and mass migration. Rowland prepared a programme for St David's Day 1938, wanting to look at the experience of the Depression and to express hope for peace for the future. He composed Tydi a roddaist as a poem to end the programme. One of his colleagues at BBC Wales was the composer Arwel Hughes, the son of a miner from near Wrexham and later Head of Music at BBC Wales. Both Rowland Hughes and Arwel Hughes were deeply rooted in Welsh non-conformism. He asked Arwel Huges to compose the melody, which he did at Shrewsbury Station in 20 minutes, whilst waiting for a connection. His son Owain, the conductor, unveiled a commemorative plaque in 2004.

The hymn is a very lyrical description of creation. Use of highly naturalistic imagery is a characteristic of Welsh language poetry since medieval times. Rowland Hughes had recently developed multiple sclerosis and the pain of this is also in the poem, as well as the tragic situation of Wales after two decades of Depression. T Rowland Hughes sadly died in 1949 at the very young age of 46. Arwel Hughes died in 1988. There is a very good version of the hymn by the Treorchy Male Voice Choir on YouTube.
