

A Shop in Knighton High Street The Family Business of WE Price & Son and How It All Began

WE Price & Son was first established in 1930 after William's father had an accident while working at the gas works in town. There was an explosion and Mr Price's life was saved by a door which fell on him. He received £250 compensation and, with his wife and daughter Doris, took £100 to Manchester where they bought fabric, which Mrs Price and Doris then made into garments and other items that they sold from a small garden shed.

Seven years later Doris headed off to Yorkshire, William remained at home in George Road and spent several years travelling by horse and cart to local villages and towns, including Clun, Newcastle, Felindre and Presteigne, selling drapery and clothing before buying his first shop, a clothes shop, in 1947.

Two years on, he married Muriel and their first child Raymond was born in 1953. Their second shop, a toy shop, was bought in 1955, which was run by Muriel and three years later their second child Susan was born. The couple then went on to buy their third shop selling furniture in 1963, which formed an integral part of Knighton's High Street. William also owned a shop in Clun for many years.

Raymond and Sue slowly took over the running of the shops but William kept working well into his 90's. He would tell many tales of his many years in retail, the tale of his second horse who ran away on two occasions and of the first vehicle which he purchased for £35, his beloved 500cwt second hand van, used for deliveries.

WE Price & Son will soon have been part of Knighton life for nearly a century and, as in the past, continues to serve its many customers from the town and surrounding area.

SLY (Fox) GIN

At our June meeting sixteen New Radnor WI members welcomed Duncan Fox from Haven Distillery to tell us about SLY GIN. Duncan began by explaining the ancient history of the spirit, which was considered to be the "eau de vie" when water was filthy and often the source of disease. During the time of plague, the Plague Doctors wore beaked masks packed with gin-soaked wool, because they recognised the antiseptic properties in the liquid.

Duncan's talk was packed with historical facts which brought us right up to the present day. Currently he and his wife distil Sly Gin at their home near Dilwyn, using herbs from their garden and other traditional botanicals. Members then sampled three Sly Gins: London Dry, Lemon Verbena and Pink Grapefruit (but only a tiny sip of each! Honestly!)



Other items on display include a Roman urn from the Castell Collen fort, dating from AD75; the Knighton whipping post, a frightening sight dating from relatively recently; a silver hawking whistle from the mid 1700s; and a sampler sewn by a 12 year old girl in 1747 depicting Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. Coming shortly will be a hoard of Roman coins found in Llanelwedd. Julie thanked Lorna for a most informative talk.





News from Knighton and District Community Centre

A well-attended **Fashion Show** held at the Community Centre raised a substantial sum of money, around £700, to support the very popular "Women's Hour" project, which is held at the Centre **every Tuesday** between 11.15am and midday. This will offer added attractions!

Pilgrimage of Song - June 2024

Now in our 21st year! We numbered about thirty, the biggest group for a long while! Sarah Green organised it all brilliantly, in spite of having a painful broken ankle which has stubbornly defied healing.

We were given a warm welcome at Beguildy, and Llanfair Waterdine on Friday 31st May and again on Saturday 1st June at Colva and Gladestry. Our hearts were left at Colva, one of the highest churches in the land. Our walks, both from Beguildy Church and Colva over the hills, were well exemplified by the Wilderness theme.

Our thanks especially to Sarah and Geoff for organising and leading our worship, and also to Annie Ballard who prepared the Liturgy around the Wilderness theme.

The Clock in St. Edward's Church Tower, Knighton

The heritage clock in St. Edward's church tower returned home on the 31st May 2024 following refurbishment. The clock had not been working since February 2020.

It is an interesting clock with an intriguing mechanism. It was built by John Moore and Sons of Clerkenwell and donated to the town of Knighton by Henry Miles of Downfield, Kington in 1857. Henry was born in Knighton.

Following a special appeal, funds were raised from many generous donations both locally and further afield. This allowed us to engage Timsbury Clocks of Bath. Symon Boyd collected the complete mechanism on the 25th March 2024 and took it away in pieces for refurbishment within his workshop. This included a thorough clean, painting and reassembly with associated repairs and testing.

Just prior to the clock's return, local resident Jim was sitting on his familiar bench outside the church and enquired how the clock was progressing. Jim, who has lived near the church for 20 years, explained how much he had missed the clock working together with hearing the chimes over the last 4 years.

Members of the clock appeal group, Peter and Margaret Joyce, Lynne Conway and Simon Gill, helped by Ian Thomason, unloaded Symon's car. The clock pieces were then hoisted to the 2nd floor of the church tower via access panels in the floors using an electric hoist.

The clock room had been cleaned out in advance. Earlier in the year, new safety handrails had been installed, together with lighting and electrics.

Symon immediately got to work with Ian assisting with the assembly of the frame and mechanism. He then continued working throughout the day, including the installation of 2 autowinders.

At 4pm in the afternoon, the clock started to work and chime. The hands of the clock had been at 12 o'clock for 4 years. This was to the delight of onlookers. Symon finished his work at 6pm and after expressing our thanks, he returned home to Bath.

Unfortunately, there were some teething problems which were dealt with and rectified. Chris Pickford, a local clock enthusiast, provided some assistance.

We are now pleased to say that the clock is working and chiming! We will continue to liase with Timsbury Clocks who will be undertaking an annual service of the clock.



Celtic Saint of the Month St Cewydd of the Rain - 1st July (or 15th July)


This month we have a saint that we know hardly anything about, except that there are several Welsh churches dedicated to him, including two close by to us in Radnorshire. In south Wales he is celebrated on 15th July, the old 2nd July before the Julian/Gregorian calendar change. He is known as the "rain saint", like St Swithun in England. If it rains on 15th July it will rain for another forty days.

Legend has it that Cewydd's father was Caw, king of Prydyn (now Strathclyde in Scotland), who moved with his many saintly sons to Edeirnion in Wales in the early 6th century. Edeirnion still exists as a region of Denbighshire, around Corwen and Llandrillo.

Near the road between Howey and Newbridge-on-Wye is a place called Disserth, in a loop of the river Ithon. It is now the location of a holiday caravan park, but the word Disserth means a desert or wilderness place and was the word often used for a remote area where a monk would set up a hermitage or retreat. And this is where there is an ancient church dedicated to St Cewydd. It is one of the few Radnorshire churches that avoided being restored by the Victorians and still has wall paintings and early Georgian box pews.

(Cewydd's Rock) on Aberedw Hill. There is another possible hermitage at Cewydd's Retreat, Cil Cewydd, in Llanfihangel Bryn Pabuan, and his hill-slope, Rhiw Gewydd, is a mountain track above Llandilo Graban, perhaps leading to his brother Meilig's home in Llowes.

South Wales has a few St Cewydd's churches as well. There is a St Cewydd and St Peter's church at Steynton near Milford Haven. Llangewydd, Glamorgan, has lost its original church, sited in a field still called Cae'r Hen Eglwys (the Field of the Old Church). Cusop near Hay-on-Wye is believed to derive its name from Cewydd, though the church is now dedicated to St Mary. There is also a deserted village in a loop of the river Wye, north of Chepstow, called Lancaut (Llan Cewydd), where the only remaining building is a ruined church. Offa's Dyke passes close by, along the edge of an Iron Age hillfort, known as Spital Meend.

So even obscure saints we know nothing about can spread the Gospel and found Christian communities where the faithful have worshipped down the centuries.







The Flower Arranger's Garden - Summer

For the gardener, this time of year evokes the image of the deckchair, straw hat, good company, a glass or two of the best and free entertainment from droves of busy bees. July and August provide an abundance of colour in the garden: roses, sweet peas, pinks, antirrhinums, lilies, gladioli and dahlias, just to name a few, many in exotic colours and giving a delicious scent. It is that delicate charm of the annuals, such as cosmos and lavatera, with their fragile petals, and the glorious variety of foliage plants and shrubs, that make flower arranging such a joy.

Butterflies and bees are now in a frenzy of activity with so much choice of plants to visit, attracted by colour and fragrance. Dahlias continue to make a big drama at all summer shows and give splendid impact in the borders. There are singles, doubles, anemone type, cactus and pompom, all in a rich tapestry of colours. It is interesting, I think, that along with many favourite flowers, they were introduced to this country by women, the Marchioness of Bute in 1798 and more in 1804 by another enthusiast, Lady Holland.

There is a lot to be gained and enjoyed at this time of year by visiting gardens open to the public to appreciate other people's planting schemes, not only plants, but containers, features, tubs, patio pots and garden furniture, all look so much nicer when you see them in situ. The recent Chelsea Flower Show programmes on TV featured lots of artistic flare in the main avenue, cottage style planting again very popular, with wild plants and lots of grasses, informal and natural. Did you know that the first prize for the most hated pest in the garden is shared between the slug and the snail. Seedlings reduced to stalks, hostas left in tatters and silvery trails leading to the scene of crime are sure signs that slugs and snails have been busy during the night. Penoffa Paw Paddock

What is it?

Penoffa Paw Paddock is a purpose built, safe and secure dog walking / training field of one acre at Penoffa Farm. Around the entire edge of the field there is 6ft fencing with additional 2ft buried fence wire to ensure dogs can be off the lead and the owners can feel relaxed.

Where is it?

Penoffa Farm, Beggar's Bush, Evenjobb, Presteigne, LD8 2PB.

Use what3words: puppy.ideal.amicably.

It is located up a private drive and situated on a hill with beautiful views.

What is there for dogs?

In the acre field there is a variety of dog agility equipment: a horseshoe ramp with alternating levels, a see-saw, weaving posts, simple half-moon jumps, a tunnel, a bridge and two mounds to climb on. There is also a tap with water bowls and lots to sniff! Don't forget the dog waste bin, helpfully placed near the entrance / exit gate.

What is there for the owners?

The shed offers perfect shelter from the inclement weather, as well as a place for eggs and plants sold by the owners. As well as a box with some balls and tug ropes, there is a bench in and recycling bins. In addition, the beautiful views towards Pen y Fan and Brown Clee can be enjoyed as you walk around the paddock. It is a tranquil setting, a good 'away-from-it-all' location where visitors have said they are able to relax and enjoy watching their dogs running free.

What about parking?

There are two secure, fenced and gated parking areas, which visitors use alternately. It is accessed with a padlock code and allows visitors and dogs to exit their cars while being in a safe and relaxed environment. When one person's hour has come to an end the next person can park, whilst the previous people are back in their secure car park. The booking system directs the owners to the correct car park.

D-Day 80 in Llangunllo

Thursday, 6th June 2024, 80 years since Allied forces landed on the beaches of Normandy, signalling the beginning of the end of WWII.

At 8am in Llangunllo, the bells of St Cynllo's Church rang out as the flags (including a special D-Day 80 flag) behind the cenotaph, were raised in respect of all those who fought, and the many who paid the ultimate sacrifice and never returned home. Whilst the flags flailed in the breeze, plans were afoot for the continuation of the commemorations, organised by The Llangunllo & Bleddfa Community Council, with an Afternoon Tea at Llangunllo Community Hall on Sunday 9th June.

At 3pm visitors started arriving, carrying plates, tins and dishes containing delicious food to share, filling the tables with a mouthwatering spread for everyone to enjoy within The Hall, decorated with bunting and flags of The Allied Forces. As always, tea and coffee were readily available.

Jonathan Protheroe gave a welcome speech and asked everyone to reflect on the important significance of the occasion, of those soldiers who went off, bravely, into the unknown, with many never returning home to their families. He then invited those gathered to view the exhibition of memorabilia, artefacts, books and ephemera on display in the conservatory.

There was a magnificent array of personal treasures to look at, including: family histories, ration books, certificates and photographs, medals, empty ammunition shells, head gear, an A.R.P tin and a Local Home Guard display, showing a photo of the men from the surrounding area, which included Bev Wilding from Llanbister Road, whose Home Guard cap was exhibited by his niece, Chris Pugh.

The children were fascinated by an original wind-up air raid siren and took the opportunity to turn its handle to hear the haunting sound rise and fall. Also making a very special appearance was a 1940 Royal Enfield WD 346cc motorbike, which had been supplied to the Fire Service in Rhayader for use during the war, but was still used occasionally until the 1960s.

Whilst we sat down to enjoy the fabulous buffet, there was time to watch the poignant scenes and pick out the film stars from "The Longest Day," shown on the screen with the soundtrack muted, and listen to wartime songs playing on CD. Then, it was time to have fun attempting to answer the tricky questions of the D-Day quiz, with the winner acquiring a commemorative mug.

A photographic portrait of King Charles III, sent to the Community Council for displaying in The Hall, was also unveiled.

It was a fitting and memorable afternoon for all ages of the community to get together and remember all those who played a part in such a momentous time all those years ago. Many thanks to Jonathan Protheroe, Rebecca Twyman, The Llangunllo and Bleddfa Community Council and everyone who helped.

New Roof at Colva Church Blessed by Bishop John

After two hectic years of reports, surveys, planning and fundraising St David's Church finally got its new roof. Thank you to Rev'd Rachael Storer for overseeing the project, the local community for their support and donations and The Benefact Trust, CADW, The Diocese of Swansea and Brecon, The Garfield Weston Foundation and The Welsh Community Fund for their generous grants.

Although the work was completed at the end of March, we decided to wait for better weather to hold a blessing service and celebration and this happened on Sunday 19th May. The service was conducted by Rev. Rachael with a homily and blessing from Bishop John. It truly was a beautiful day and the service was attended by many of the people who worked on the renovations, together with the local community. Renowned classical cellist Sonia Hammond gave a beautiful performance of three pieces from J S Bach cello suites. Afternoon tea, provided by the congregation was much enjoyed out in the sunshine.

The difference to the atmosphere is noticeable now there are no more leaks, the damp carpet has been removed and it is even warmer! At over 1200ft the 13th century Church of St David is one of the highest churches in Wales and listed Grade II*.

The work involved ecologists (Just Mammals) – of course there are bats in the church; conservation architects (Hook Mason); archaeologist (Leon Bracelin) and conservation builders (Jenkinsons). The work was regularly inspected by CADW and Powys Built Heritage Officer. We were very lucky in that when the cedar shingles were removed and the roofing timbers inspected they were in very good condition and required very little repair. This meant we did not need to spend all of our budget and so the funders allowed us to use the spare money to put in a totally new pathway up the church, making it more accessible and much safer to navigate.

There are exhibition boards at the back of the church with information and photographs of the renovation process. Colva Church is always open and is in a beautiful setting. Please do visit, there is much to see and lots of information inside including burial records from 1663. The church is on the old drover's road between Gladestry and Glascwm: HR5 3RA.



D-Day Remembrance, Gladestry

On Thursday 6 June 2024, a specially made Binder, containing information about local men lost in two World Wars, was presented by Mr Phillip Jones, (an aviation and military researcher) to St Mary's Church, Gladestry. Mr Jones gave a very interesting talk about D-Day and shared the facts he had unearthed. The attached is a condensed report.

The Gladestry & Colva War Memorial, sited in St Mary's churchyard, is rather unique in that it was the first to be unveiled and dedicated in Radnorshire, under the guidance of Rev A Biggerton-Evans, who was Rector at the time. An interim memorial had been set up in the form of an Oak frame draped in the Union Jack, which was placed in the north aisle of the church. The Bishop of Swansea dedicated the War Memorial, Easter 1919. After the unveiling by Lady Clementine Walsh, Mrs Welson, who had lost a son in 1917, unveiled a stained glass window. Oak gates, a personal gift of the Hon Sir Arthur Walsh, Lord Lieutenant of Radnorshire, were opened on the same day. The War Memorial we see today was re-dedicated on the 7th May 2006 after restoration work had been carried out.

It was fitting to hold a Remembrance time on the 6th June as this date marks the 80th Anniversary of D-Day and it was appropriate to pass on the Binder containing the names and details of all those commemorated on the War Memorial, especially two men who were Killed in Action during the D-Day operations of June /July 1944: Evan William Griffiths and Graham Hugh Lloyd.

Evan William Griffiths was born on 22nd January 1920, the son of Thomas and Jane Elizabeth Griffiths of the Cwm, Gladestry. In 1939 the family moved to Upper Gwernilla. 80 years ago today Evan along with 3 commando, as part of the 1st Special service brigade landed in Normandy. On the 7th June 1944 Evan was posted missing in action.

Graham Hugh Lloyd was Killed in Action just under a month after Evan Griffiths.

He was born in Cardiff in 1920, the son of Hugh and Frances Edith Lloyd. Hugh became a motor mechanic and on the 5th May 1939 he joined the 1st Battalion the Herefordshire Regiment in Kington, giving his place of residence as the Post Office, Newchurch. Graham and the Hereford regiment were also part of the D-Day operation. Graham was killed in action 1st July 1944.

It is good that the church now has some background knowledge in the Binder about Evan and Graham and their comrades, whose names are also on the War Memorial.




Kath Poole's 80th Birthday

Visit to JP's

Members and partners enjoyed an afternoon visit to our local stonemason Jonathan Protheroe's home and workshop. Jonathan is a traditional stonemason, whose family business began in 1812 in central Birmingham during the Industrial Revolution. The business was first registered at Company's House in 1848 and was started by two brothers working on new buildings in the city and memorials. From then the business and its skills has been passed from father to son.

On his 4th birthday Jonathan was given his first hammer by his father and his journey to be a stonemason began. He told of his apprenticeship and training when leaving school aged 15, showed his "special hammer" received the previous year which he still uses today and his first job on the Neville and Joseph Chamberlain Memorial in Birmingham. As a traditional stonemason his work consists of designing and hand carving memorials and restoration work, via Cadw and English Heritage, particularly on churches and war memorials, many local. His workshop houses the tools he uses, including a range of hammers, mallets and chisels, all homemade; pieces he has exhibited; commissions undertaken and the range of materials used from granite to limestone, sandstone to Welsh slate.

Later in his career Jonathan gained a degree in Fine Art and also spent time teaching restoration skills to young craftsmen in Romania and Hungary after the fall of Communism. He relayed many amusing stories along the way and those he had undertaken commissions for, including Elton John. Talk complete, tea and cake were served alfresco in the late afternoon sunshine.

Would You Believe It?

It's around 50 years ago that these iconic pop groups played to thousands of young people in a large barn near Knighton. To many of you reading this it may seem incredible that these top groups of the time would perform in such a rural setting. These were not your "yee hah" type Barn Dances, but the forerunner of pop concerts and festivals and were organised by the members of Knighton Young Farmers Club with the assistance of parents and advisory members.

The first Barn Dances were held in the late 1960's at Pilleth Court by the kind permission of the Hood family, but the success of this venture soon meant that a larger barn was required, and so, in 1972 the event was held at the Blaen-y-Cwm Farm, between Monaughty and Knighton, by kind permission of Jack and Ruth Wilding and the family. The first group to headline there were "The Equals", famous for their record "Baby come back", who attracted a crowd of 1100 young people. And so, the stage was set for bigger and better things. We were fortunate at that time to have a great contact in Mike Davies of The Cambrian Entertainment Agency who had inside knowledge of which groups would be releasing new hits for the summer.

In June 1973 we were able to book "Mungo Jerry" who had a hit with "In the summertime" and they were supported by the unlikely combination of St. Christopher's Steel Band! But in 1974 we had "The Bay City Rollers" who had the song "Shang A Lang" at Number 2 in the record charts when they appeared at the Blaen-y-Cwm and they attracted 2,500 people, and were supported by "Love Affair" who had just charted with "Everlasting Love".

Then, for our final large Barn Dance, we had the great "Showaddywaddy" who had just jumped into the top five spot in the charts with "Three steps to Heaven", an all time classic, and the supporting band that night was none other than "Shakin Stevens and the Sunsets" who were just starting to make the big time. Also on the bill was a group called "Pleasure" and our local "Brutus Road Show" Disco. This night also attracted 2,500 followers, with people arriving by train in Knighton from the Midlands to see this chart-topping group.


The Young Farmers and helpers built the stage using railway sleepers and 7"x3" roofing timbers that were loaned by Wozencraft Bros. builders in Knighton. The stage was substantial, but I remember one of the groups' roadies thinking that it was not, a worrying moment. Showaddywaddy had loads of equipment, lights, amps and smoke generators, in total about 4 tons, and we also had to hire in a 3-phase generator to power it all as the local supply was not enough. The admittance cost was £1.20, and money was collected as fans walked through a number of cattle crushes! The cost of Showaddywaddy was £1200 and I remember after the event three of us taking £1200 in cash down to a room at The Norton Arms Hotel where they were staying, to pay them. The on-site money security was to be found in the bottom of Ruth Wilding's deep freeze, under the frozen chickens! There was a lot of organising as you can imagine and advertising by car stickers, posters and all the local papers for weeks before, no mobile phones or Facebook then to promote the events. It was all stewarded by the Young Farmers past and present and parents, paid professional stewards were not even available, but the Police were always around the premises. The bar consisted of wooden trestle tables and some catering, namely pickled eggs and crisps were sold by the Young Farmers, this was pre burger van time.



Everyone in the community supported these events, we even borrowed the piano from Llangunllo Village Hall for *Showaddwaddy* to use, I'm not sure that it ever had quite the same tone afterwards!

These Barn Dances were wonderful events in the countryside, and other Clubs soon followed, Penybont YFC had "Chicory Tip" and the legends "Status Quo", who had their record "Down the dust pipe" in the charts at that time. And "Shakin Stevens" later returned to top the bill at Teme Valley YFC's barn dance at Bryndraenog. It is sad to think that these events will never return to our rural areas as rules and regulations now make any such dance uneconomic, and the top groups in the mid seventies started to have an uplift clause in their contract, so if they had a record in the charts, you were charged more. You now have to travel to large venues and pay exorbitant prices to see the Stars of today. The Barn Dances were great events with many memories and friendships made there and are still fondly remembered by those of a certain age.

About the Cover – Mary Magdalene

The cover image shows Jesus appearing for the first time after his resurrection from death. His hands and feet bear the marks of the nails. He wears white in contrast to the red of Mary Magdalene, who mistook him for the gardener. She kneels before him entreating him to tell her where the body of Jesus has been taken. When Jesus calls her by name she instantly recognizes the voice and calls him "teacher." [John 20.16] The encounter takes place in a garden with a twisted tree behind, reminding us of the cruel cross.

Mary is portrayed in popular culture as a "scarlet" woman; however the gospel account only tells us that Jesus cast out seven demons from her [Mark 16.9 and Luke 8.2]. She must have been an important follower to be the first witness to the resurrection.

Mary Magdalene's special day is 22nd July. It is celebrated at Bleddfa Church where she is the patron saint. The image comes from Leintwardine Church, also dedicated to Mary Magdalene.

A service of morning prayer either CinW Contemporary or Book of Common Prayer (BCP)

MW - Morning Worship

A less formal service based on MP

EP - Evening Prayer

A service of evening prayer either CinW Contemporary or Book of Common prayer (BCP)

Morning or Evening Worship/Praise - A less formal service. Sometimes with a theme eg harvest.

Compline - A short Night Office

Set readings and prayers for night time.

Compline Plus - A service of hymns and reflection based around the liturgy of Compline.


Holy Communion/Eucharist - A service that includes the sharing of bread and wine as directed by Jesus at the Last Supper. This can be with hymns or said without hymns. The Liturgy will be CinW 2004, BCP or occasional Celtic.
