The Stores - New Radnor

Historically there have been many shops in New Radnor, including a dressmaker, grocery, butchery, bakery, forge, cycle shop, draper, cobbler and also dentist, hairdresser and doctor. There was nothing, it would seem, that you could not get in the village. The Stores was reputed to be the oldest of them all and I believe it was established circa 1871. From the earliest records, in 1920 The Stores was purchased from the Duff-Gordon family, by a Mr and Mrs Shewell. Then in 1924 Arthur Williams paid the princely sum of £750.00 for the 'business of grocer, provision merchant, draper and general iron monger'. Latterly, it was then taken over by his two sons Reginald and Richard Williams.

David 'Dai' Price who has lived in New Radnor his whole life well remembers helping his Uncle Reg doing deliveries around the local farms. Dai would be perched on top of the big cans of paraffin in front of the delivery van. At one farm they had to carry deliveries across two fields to get there. He thinks his Uncle really wanted him helping so that he could open up the many farm gates they encountered. He was taught how to charge up batteries for the old wireless sets as a young child, even topping up the battery acid in them from large carboys. But he's lived to tell the tale, thankfully. He also remembers burning cardboard boxes in the garden and filling and weighing bags of currants and sugar. Dai enjoyed many a drink of milk and some cake at the farms, which left his Mother wondering why he had no appetite for his dinner. Big empty cider bottles were left outside the backdoor for collection, but Dai and his mates would sneak them back into the shop to collect the penny or two deposit on them. The same bottles went round until they were eventually rumbled and that put a stop to their game.

The Stores changed hands a couple more times in 1970 and 1976, the price in 1970 was £6,000, but then in 1981 it sold to John and Cynthia Cooper for £50,500 indicating how vast the property boom was back in the 70s. Cynthia tells of their first Christmas there dressing the turkeys and getting all of the Christmas orders ready when they worked all through the day, night and following day with no sleep at all. They successfully carried on running the shop and butchery for another seventeen years. In 1998 John and Cynthia retired and a couple bought the shop off them, but they didn't stay long and it was soon on the market again.

In 1999 my husband Phil and I bought the stores. I had previously been a nurse, so it was a steep learning curve to become a butcher and shopkeeper. But we got by with much help from our able assistants. Phil did deliveries to local houses and farms bi-weekly, with Friday being the busiest day with up to thirty-five deliveries. We had many comical moments; too many to recount them all. One lady came in and read the sign on some potatoes that said 'Egyptian new potatoes' and asked 'where they from then?'. Another was a phone order for 'lotus teabags and some of that bric-a-brac', which translated to 'Londis teabags and barabrith'. In all we had a good, if tiring, few years until we retired in 2006.

Sadly the new owner was not successful in running the shop and it closed a couple of years later. This was very sad as I felt we were all merely custodians of The Stores until it was handed over to the next owners in its long history. The building has now been converted into two houses.

But like phoenix that rose from the ashes, Hedley Simcock our local coal merchant, started selling some basic groceries from a trailer in his driveway, directly opposite the original shop under the cheeky name of 'Esco's'. Sadly his health declined and he passed away not long afterwards. But determined that it would carry on, his daughter Sharon took up the mantle and Esco's remains a thriving shop housed in the old townhall in New Radnor. It has gone from strength to strength selling all sorts from samosas to local ciders to fresh bread, meat and fish and a wide selection of fruit and veg.

About the Cover - Mary Magdalene

September 29th marks Michaelmas when we celebrate the Archangel Michael and all Angels. The cover image shows Michael slaying the dragon with his sword. The dragon represents Satan (the devil). He wears bright crimson robes with gold decoration and his head is surrounded by a halo with the cross of Christ. His wings help us to know he is the angel St Michael and not St George. George also fights a dragon but he is a human – no wings. The window is the central light in the east window of Middlewich church in Cheshire, dedicated to St Michael and All Angels.

Many 11th Century churches in Radnorshire have the same dedication. They form a ring around the Radnor Forest where a dragon lurked. They prayed that their patron, St Michael, would protect them. Beguildy Church is one of those.





Kilvert, a country clergyman, born in 1840, spent much of his time walking lanes and fields of Herefordshire writing in his diary. Only three of his original diaries reflecting rural life are in existence- the others, of which there were 29, were destroyed by his wife and niece. Of the remaining diaries two are in the National Library of Wales and the other in Durham University. Kilvert died in 1879 as a result of peritonitis at the age of 38, only days after returning from his honeymoon.

Ann was warmly applauded for her heartfelt talk about a man who had observed so much relating to the life and times of our area by such a young, devout clergyman.

A delicious supper, provided by members, was enjoyed by all. The competition, 'The prettiest tea cosy' was won by Viv and several members and guests won raffle prizes. It had been a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

Celebrating 100 years of Gladestry WI

The afternoon drew to a close with looking at a WI memorabilia display set upon our cloth, signed by members past and present. We concluded with more photographs, one of present day members; and thanks to all members and guests who had shared our very special 100th celebration.







Informal Volunteering - Helping Hands from The Comm

K&DCC is currently taking part in a pilot project to recruit volunteers who can, on an ad hoc basis, support people in the community who need help on a short-term basis due to illness or injury, such as recovering from surgery or having a broken limb.

An Informal volunteering Officer, Louise Home, has been appointed to co-ordinate the project, and has a target to appoint 70 volunteers by the beginning of next year. Volunteering is always on the basis of mutually agreed activity and support, and might involve such things as -

Resilient Radnorshire Good News on the Community Car Scheme for New Radnor

Resilient Radnorshire is pleased to announce that the proposed New Radnor car scheme has now come under the umbrella of the Presteigne Community Car Scheme (PCS). This means that anybody needing transport in the New Radnor area, for instance to go to hospital, a surgery or appointment of any sort, or shopping in a local centre, should now be able to call on the service. Customers pay a £10 annual registration, with individual journeys subsidised by PCS.

With some residents already interested, what we will equally need to make the scheme work is a few kind New Radnor and area car drivers who might be willing to sign up as volunteers on an occasional rota basis.

Thanks to the PCS working in conjunction with Powys County Council, all driver financial costs are covered. The one requirement on prospective volunteer drivers is a visit to the Presteigne office for a 30-minute induction and a DBS check, the cost of which is paid for by PCS. Drivers do not need special insurance (although they do have to inform their insurance companies that they are doing volunteer driving). More importantly, they can specify what days they are usually available and also the maximum distance they are prepared to go, whether that's Kington, Hereford, or further afield. Once on board PCS would normally contact them by email or phone with a prospective journey, usually two weeks in advance, and which they can accept or reject. Only on urgent occasions might they be asked to assist at shorter notice.

Celtic Saint of the Month St Ailbe of Emly – 12th September – 5th/6th century

Did you know there was a saint called Elvis? If you go to Pembrokeshire, near St David's you will find one of the smallest parishes in Wales, called St Elvis, or Llaneilfyw in Welsh.

Elvis is an anglicisation of the name Eilfyw (in Welsh) or Ailbhe (in Irish). The letters "bh" in Irish (or just "b" in Old Irish) and "f" in Welsh are both pronounced "v". So this month's saint can be spelled Ailbe, Ailbhe, Eilfyw or even Elvis.

Ailbe of Emly is recognised in Ireland as one of the four saints

before Patrick started his work further north. We know very little about him, though he is mentioned in the later accounts of several other saints' lives. The legend is that he was born to a servant girl in the house of Cronan, lord of Eliach in County Tipperary. Cronan wanted the baby disposed of and ordered that

he be put outside and exposed to "dogs and wild beasts, that he might be devoured". A she-wolf found him and nurtured him with her own cubs. Many years later an old she-wolf, being chased by hunters, ran to Ailbe's house. Ailbe rescued her and ever afterwards she and her cubs would come to eat with Ailbe at his dining table.





Anyway, it is said that while baby Ailbe was being looked after by the wolf, some Christian Britons found him and were persuaded to take him to Wales, where he grew up, trained as a priest and was eventually ordained. The stories say that he baptised St David. On returning to Ireland Ailbe founded monasteries and churches. His chief one was at Emly, where his well and an ancient cross still stand in the churchyard. He is known as the patron saint of Munster.





This summer seems to have been busier than ever with a number of events and developments of note. And the village has, I think, seen more visitors than ever before as an increasing number of people seem to be discovering the delights of the Welsh side of the Marches.

In mid-July, as part of an effort to maintain a worshipping community attached to Heyope church, a short service was held, conducted by Rev'd Petra Goodband (soon to be moving on to Wrexham). It was a pleasant event which drew quite a number of people from out of town. The weather was good and the allotments looked productive and nature-friendly. Our annual Apple Day follows in October but, prior to that, in conjunction with Herefordshire Arts Week, and all the various open studios, (7th - 15th September) Kate Mclean will be mounting an exhibition of some of her handiwork; refreshments will be available. This will be at the Community Centre; proceeds to be divided between Community Centre funds and the K.C.C.L.P.

Welcome to Joe (from Presteigne) and Katie (from Glyndwr) as they settle into the bungalow opposite us, previously inhabited by the late Norman Price.

As always, this area has its heartaches and tragedies.

Robert Marpole from Glyndwr has passed away, having been unwell for some time. He will be missed.

Sympathy to John and Lucy Lloyd and the family after their home at Lower Cwm Heyope burned down. It was a dry spell and the fire was so intense that water-bowsers had to visit Knucklas and even Knighton to pick up supplies to help douse the flames and dampen the ground.

It has been with immense sorrow that the whole wider community learned of the accidental death of Duncan Powell. He was a fine family man and a well-respected mechanical engineer who loved socialising with motocross enthusiasts etc. He will be receiving a memorable send-off. We all feel for the family he has left behind.

I think 'Shirgar' may be the subject of a Steward's Enquiry, after nearly causing mayhem on the course by going the wrong way after completing the first lap!

I'm pleased to report there were no injuries to any of the horses. In fact, they all went back to The Greyhound Inn to enjoy a bbq and live music for the rest of the afternoon.


Sandra brought a delicious giant cake to share, as it will soon be her birthday, and Pauline won the competition, so we had a lovely evening as we always do when we get together.

It has been a little while since the beautiful sound of a choir echoed throughout Llangunllo's Church. Fortunately, The Friends of St Cynllo's managed to secure a booking for local singers, *The Dolau Mixtures*, on Saturday 13th July, which turned out to be lucky for us!

The mixed choir has been delighting audiences for over 30 years, and this evening's entertainment was no exception. Expertly led by their Musical Director and accompanist, Catherine O'Rourke, the group treated visitors to a varied and interesting selection of songs, from the best-loved to others that are not performed so often, which was most refreshing.

The evening commenced fittingly, with, "As Long as I have Music", a moving tribute to music and how uplifting it can be. Next, came Carole King's "You've Got A Friend", Bond theme, "Skyfall", made famous by Adele, and "This Little Light Of Mine." While the choir took a break, the talented Duncan Gibbs sang and played his Appalachian Dulcimer, creating a charming and full sound for an instrument with so few strings! A traditional folk song came first, played in the style of Bert Jansch, with "Peace, Love & Understanding", a Nick Lowe composition, previously recorded by Elvis Costello & The Attractions, concluding. The choir returned with a section of inspirational songs, starting with Sting's, "Fields of Gold", introduced by a retired teacher, telling his heart-warming tale (which, no doubt, brought a tear to a few eyes,) of an emotional farewell, when pupils sang the song to him as he left for pastures new. Bette Midler favourite, "The Wind Beneath My Wings", followed and a musical trio from some of Simon and Garfunkel's best, ending with "Bridge Over Troubled Water."

As the choir got their breath back, two more solos followed, sung by gifted tenor, Trevor Morgan; Charlie Chaplin's, "Smile", famously covered by Nat King Cole, and Javert's powerful solo, "Stars," from Schoenberg and Boublil's "Les Miserables".

The final segment began with, "Suo Gan," a touching lullaby, sung partly in Welsh and English, then continued with more jewels from "Les Miserables", including, "I Dreamed A Dream," "Castle On A Cloud" and the rousing, "Do You Hear The People Sing?"

The programme ended, aptly, with, "Ashokan Farewell" written by American folk musician, Jay Ungar. Of course, we wanted more and we got it in fine form, taking us back in time to The Inkspots and the 1940's with "Java Jive."

When the applause had faded from the appreciative audience, it was time to draw the raffle, sending home the happy winners with their choice from a grand prize cache.

As the weather held, everyone was invited into the churchyard for a glass of fizz or soft drink, a tasty and plentiful array of savoury and sweet canapés, prepared by a team of Friends volunteers, and to continue the feel-good factor by chatting and mingling in good company.

Knighton Festival 2024

The Knighton Festival of Books, Art and Music celebrates its seventh year in October with a programme of interesting and thought provoking talks, all held at the Knighton Community Centre from 11-13 October. Over the course of the weekend there will be authors' talks, advice for aspiring writers, a film, an art and book fair and some live theatre too.

The Festival begins with a poetry themed afternoon featuring three outstanding poets: Grahame Davies, Nicholas Murray and John Barnie who will read from and discuss their recent collections. In the evening Flicks in the Sticks will be showing the film *Bright Star*, starring Ben Wishaw as John Keats in a portrayal of the thwarted romance between the poet and his neighbour Fanny Brawne.

On Saturday 12th October there is a full day of talks on a wide range of topics including Monica Macias' fascinating memoir of growing up in North Korea; and Ariane Bankes' account of the charismatic and devastatingly beautiful Paget sisters who overcame a meagre education to take 1930s London society by storm in the 1930s. Jem Poster and Sarah Burton dispense advice on writing and discuss their new Victorian detective novel *Eliza Mace*. Fiona Sampson explores the meaning of place, how we shape it and how it shapes us in *Limestone Country*, while Joe St Clair addresses the subject of spirituality at a time of huge global upheaval, change and uncertainty in *Transcendence*.

On Sunday, astronomer Martin Griffiths, the director of the Brecon Beacons Observatory examines the Celtic night sky in his guide to astronomy and its links to the ancient mythologies of the Welsh peoples. Stand-up comedian turned novelist Ian Moore will be talking about his hilarious series of murder mysteries set in the Loire Valley. The Festival ends with a performance of *Twelfth Night* by the Willow Globe Theatre group.

The Festival is sponsored by Knighton Town Council, Knighton Community Centre, Literature Wales, and Knighton Rotary Club. There is a small charge of £5 for most of the talks, and a discounted weekend ticket available at £25. Admission fees for the film and the play are not included in the weekend ticket.

Flora and Fauna

Once again the weather is the main topic with gardeners and farmers alike. In the garden, the weeds have been encouraged with all the rain, and the slugs and snails have taken advantage, with many of my plants looking like lace curtains. However, lots of these creatures now have new homes out in the open field, despite being told they have a homing instinct. We have seen a decline in butterflies this year and we have missed them, with their delightful bright colouring and fluttering flight, the prettiest of garden visitors. Favourite plants to encourage them are stonecrop, verbena, valerian and buddleia. The buddleia (butterfly bush) is also a good pollinator for attracting bees and other insects. This shrub can become a nuisance in small gardens, but now you can buy a smaller variety which can be grown in pots, lovely colours too: mauve, purple and pink.

For most of us summer is the favourite season, when hopefully we can sit back and relax in the sun and admire the results of our hard work, especially in the evening when the exquisite scent of sweet peas, honeysuckle, orange blossom, pinks and roses is at its best. The odd glass or two adds to the pleasure. We hope this will continue for a few more weeks before preparations start for the gentle arrival of a new season.


Despite the weather, it has been amazing to see the magnificent entries of vegetables and flowers in the local show tents: lots of good gardeners in the area. At the recent Clun Show I was overjoyed at the large class of the most beautiful sweet peas in glorious colours, their fragrance filling the marquee, quite a challenge for the judge.

The brochures have started to arrive, with so much choice of bulbs for early purchase. One which always attracts is the Camassia, an elegant flower in shades of blue, white and claret, on sale now for planting in September. It is a perennial and flowers following the tulips, easy to grow, ideal for containers, good pollinators, slugs and snails do not like them.

Let us all enjoy what is left of our summer 2024 before thinking of our plans for next spring.


