Gladestry Post Office and Shop

The Post Office and Shop were not always together. The Post Office was at the top of the village where the Green is now (adorned with daffodils in the Spring).

Mrs. Margaret (Peggy) Davies was postmistress for sixty years. She married Richard Davies (Dick of Colva) and was mother of Addie Davies.

The daily letters were brought from Kington every morning, by the postman on his bicycle. Mrs Davies would sort them, then her husband and Addie would deliver them round Gladestry and Colva. In the afternoon, Addie, on her Coventry Eagle motorcycle, would take letters to Huntington to meet the Newchurch postman who took them to Kington.

The Post Office had a telephone, the only one in the Parish. It was here you would go to phone, which Mrs Davies did, this would usually be for the doctor or vet.

Once a week Doctor Jobson, New Radnor, would visit the Post Office for anyone to see him. He would leave a few bottles of cough mixture and stomach mixture for Mrs Davies to hand out to anyone who requested them!

Mr. Tom Bufton kept the shop. It would be open until 9pm. In the 1950s the shop was sold. Fred and Addie Davies bought it and the Post Office was moved down to the shop. Mrs Addie Davies was postmistress, she ran both businesses together. It was the hub of the community. It was here that everyone would go to share their joys and sorrows. Auntie Addie, as she was affectionately known, always had a listening ear and a word of comfort. This was the meeting place where you had all the local news, who was hatched, matched or despatched.

You could purchase all the necessary things of life - from medicine, groceries, papers, paraffin, candles and milk when the days of milking the house cow was gone. It was a treat for the school children to spend their pennies on sweets and lollipops. There would be crisps, kept in a big tin and put into paper bags - this was a great treat - also comics! Sometimes the school teacher would send a pupil to the shop for a crusty loaf for his tea.

Many stories of local characters - Tom the Cross would not speak, but they knew what he wanted, ten Woodbines and a box of matches. Another character would ask 'how much them sweets?' - 3d a quarter.

They trusted everyone, left the shop to get potatoes or paraffin from the cellar or cheese from the kitchen. There would be a lot of money in the Post Office but they had no fear. 'What a wonderful world.'

Addie retired as postmistress in 1978. The house was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Bob Pinches with their two daughters. They ran the business very well for several years.

Time moved on and the shop and post office closed and was up for sale. After some months Mrs. Sue Cotton bought it and moved in with her husband and children. She opened up the Post Office and shop. Everyone was overjoyed to have it back.

Sue was a character with a heart of gold. She would help anyone if she could. One day she found a weary walker sitting on the post office steps. She gave him a cup of tea and went to send him up to the Ridge on his way. Sue opened a small cafe within the shop providing home-made cakes and drinks for walkers and locals to share their news.

Times change, around 2014 we had news the Post Office and shop would be closing - this time for good. It was a very sad day for Gladestry to lose this part of the community which had been, for years, such a support sharing our lives together.

There is a plaque high up on the outside wall. It's of a hand and upside down heart. No one knows the true meaning. One theory is 'Welcome to this place with an open heart.' This is very apt as there was always a welcome in this house.

About the Cover - St Andrew

Andrew was Christ's first disciple. He spread the word, first, to his brother, Peter, and later to lands around the Black Sea and Greece where he was crucified on an X-shaped cross in Patras. As the patron saint of Scotland, this cross, called a 'saltire' cross, is shown on their flag.

The stained glass is from the St John Chapel in St Laurence's Ludlow and dates to sometime before 1684, when it was first recorded. The full window shows the twelve



apostles at the Council of Jerusalem c. 50A.D. where each apostle sits at a desk writing their part of the New Testament. They each hold their instrument of martyrdom. The tiled floor shows a masterful use of perspective.

St Andrew's special day is 30th November, the last day of our liturgical year.



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
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
Whitton WI

Celtic Saint of the Month - Columbanus - 21st or 23rd November

The Celtic saints were famous for their wandering, but Columbanus must have been one of the most adventurous. It is calculated that he would have travelled over 4,000 miles, from Bangor in Co. Down to his final resting place at Bobbio in northern Italy. We know a lot about him because one of the Bobbio monks wrote his *Life* less than thirty years after his death and with lots of information from fellow monks. Also Columbanus himself wrote books, poetry and a very strict Rule of Life for the monks in his monasteries.

Where to begin? Well, Columbanus was born c.543 in Co. Leinster in the south-east of Ireland. He was well educated from the start, first at Cluaninis monastery on an island in the River Erne and then to the famous monastery at Bangor, where many saints and missionaries received an extensive education before going out into the world to spread the Gospel.

Columbanus felt called by God to go to foreign lands. In 590 he took twelve companions with him and set sail, first to Cornwall and then across to France, where he travelled to Burgundy. Guntram, king of Burgundy gave them land to start a school at Anegray in the Vosges mountains, but it became so popular that they had to move to a new site. They moved to Luxueil, which developed into a famous monastery, sending missionaries throughout Europe, and then a further monastery at Fontaines.

Columbanus and his companions still followed the Celtic traditions and this brought them into conflict with the Frankish bishops, particularly over the date of Easter. There was also conflict with the Burgundian dynasty after the death of Guntram and his nephew Childebert. The great nephews Thierry, king of Burgundy and Theodebert, king of Austrasia were under the thumb of their terrible mother, Brunhilda. She stirred up more conflict and eventually declared that Columbanus must return to Ireland. They set sail from Nantes, but a great storm arose and the captain blamed it on the presence of Columbanus and the other Irish monks. The storm drove them back to shore and the captain refused to take Columbanus any further.

So, with his companions, Columbanus followed the Rhine and its tributaries to what is now Germany and Switzerland. He was still within the reach of his enemies Thierry and Brunhilda, so he decided to cross the Alps into Italy, where he received a warm welcome in Milan from Agilulf, King of Lombardy. Columbanus needed a place of his own, so Agilulf gave him land at Bobbio, where he and his companions built yet another monastery and that is where Columbanus died on 21st November 615 and his relics are still preserved there in a shrine. Just out of interest, Bobbio is the monastery where St Francis was educated, so the influence of Columbanus continued far and wide.

Just one more fact: in 2002 Columbanus was declared the patron saint of motorcyclists. I wonder why?




Meanwhile, we are sending three teams to the bowls competition at Whitton and some are attending the WI craft club in Penybont.

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Breathwork for Health

The term "Breathwork" may well not be familiar to you. It certainly wasn't to me before I began training as a yoga therapist eight years ago. I had been largely unaware of my breath and oblivious to the idea that I could employ practical breathing techniques that would benefit my physical, mental and emotional wellbeing. This was a pity, given that I had periodically suffered from insomnia and anxiety.

In the last 15 years or so, the evidence base supporting the benefits of slow breathing has been steadily rising. Random control trials point to stress reduction, improved sleep, and benefits for numerous chronic conditions.

In the practical workshop that I will be giving in November I'll be introducing participants to the hows and whys of research-based, therapeutic breath practices.

A key benefit is balancing the two sides of our autonomic nervous system. The parasympathetic branch, sometimes referred to as the "rest and digest" or "tend and mend" and the sympathetic branch which activates our stress response commonly known as the "fight or flight" response.

Breathwork practices can help us move from a stressed state to a more relaxed way of being. Breathwork can also help to raise our heart rate variability. This measurable marker of good health, or resilience, reflects our capacity to respond fluidly to changing circumstances. This also links with a healthier balance between the two branches of our autonomic nervous system, which in turn leads to improving our capacity to cope with stress.

A further key benefit is the development of interoception. Interoception is awareness of our own internal body states, which enables the subjective evaluation of our current condition, or 'how we feel'. This awareness can be linked with mindfulness. Mindfulness, as you may well know, is about paying attention, on purpose, and without judgement to the present moment. The sensation of a raised heart beat is one example of interoceptive signalling. How we are breathing – in terms of the

part of lungs we are using, the rate and intensity of the breath and the ratio of the inhale to the exhale – is another.

On a subconscious level our ever-vigilant brains are constantly interpreting messages from the body in an effort to keep

all our systems working in harmony. The breath is paramount in this and affects not only our physiology, but also our mental and emotional states. By paying mindful attention to our breath and getting to know our breathing patterns and how they affect us, we can make adjustments to support and improve our health and wellbeing. I certainly found this to be true when working with my insomnia and anxiety.


Becoming aware of how we are breathing in our daily lives is the first step towards using breathwork practices for health. If you would like to learn more and try out some breathwork practices for yourself then please do come to the introductory workshop in November. I will be following this up with further, in depth, workshops in the New Year.

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The WI Walk The Lugg

Llangunllo, Whitton and Chatterbrook (Norton and Presteigne) Women's Institutes, along with 5 more from along the course of the Lugg in Herefordshire, joined forces in an adventure with a purpose, walking the length of the river Lugg during the WI Week of River Action. Starting at the source near Llangunllo on 16th September, they passed a sample of water from WI to WI, walking over 60 miles in 5 days to reach the confluence with the Wye at Mordiford Bridge, east of Hereford.

It all started during a hike up to the source of the Lugg when two of us from Llangunllo WI decided it would be quite a thing to walk downstream along the river, to the border or even the confluence. But how much more fun to do it as a relay of WI walkers. And so much more worthwhile to use the walk to draw attention to the health of the river. Chatterbrook and Whitton WIs were up for the challenge and WIs in Herefordshire jumped at the chance to join us. They had been instrumental in proposing the WI resolution "healthy rivers for people and wildlife" that we were inspired by.

In Llangunllo we took following the river literally, and were helped enormously by the positive response when we asked if we might follow the river through private land. Sincere thanks to all those concerned. Elsewhere walkers relied on the footpath network and one of our most striking findings was just how rare it is to be able to walk by the river.

After a sunrise start on the 16th, collecting a water sample at the source, the Llangunllo walkers handed the 'baton' to Whitton WI at Monaughty in the early afternoon. Whitton reached Dolley Old Bridge (and the first sighting of the invasive plant Himalayan Balsam) at the end of the first day, then handed over to Chatterbrook WI on the morning of 17th September. Chatterbrook came out in force, enjoying the sunflowers at Ackhill, Presteigne beach and the Withybeds on their way from Dolley Old Bridge into town.

Reaching the Welsh-English border was a significant moment. There is a great need for cross border action in addressing water quality issues in the Lugg/Wye catchment so our handover from the Radnorshire WIs to the Herefordshire WIs saw us championing collaboration on the border bridge. Representatives from Herefordshire and Radnorshire WI Federations came to cheer the walkers on, and we were also joined by citizen scientists from the Friends of the River Wye, who have been monitoring water quality on the Lugg for several years now. The WI were thrilled to feel their support as they raised their testing equipment in a salute.

Thanks to the Herefordshire Federation in securing equipment from Fresh Water Watch, each WI involved carried out tests of the nitrate and phosphate levels in the river during their walk. Our results over the week gave us a snapshot of the problem facing the Lugg and Wye along with many other rivers: an excess of these chemicals entering the river from agriculture and sewage. In our catchment more than $\frac{2}{3}$ of this load comes from agriculture, with sewage accounting for less than a quarter - not the proportion you would guess from most newspaper, and food for thought...about our food. Pausing to do these tests during our walk made us appreciate the dedication of the citizen scientists who do this week in

and week out to collect this essential data (search for WyeViz and the Friends of the River Wye website to find out more).

Gathering reinforcements along the way, Chatterbrook walked on to speed the baton well into Herefordshire, handing over to the Leominster Lasses WI at Mortimer's Cross. Via Stoke Prior, Marden, Tupsley and Hampton Bishop WIs the confluence at Mordiford Bridge was eventually reached on Friday 20th September. A reception committee of Radnorshire walkers joined in for the final stretch, witnessing the sample from the source being raised in a toast to the health of rivers at the confluence.

Our sample is now set to travel further, joining the WI representatives at the March for Clean Water in London on 3rd November, and we will continue to get to know our local river and understand the challenges it faces.

Felindre WI

Felindre WI's September event was a talk by Ray Rand of Blood Bikes Wales.

The first Blood Bikes group started in 1962, with the National Association of Blood Bikes being formed in 2008, then in 2011, Blood Bikes Wales commenced, with the Powys group being formed in 2019.

With no A&E departments in Powys, the local group rarely transport actual blood, instead mainly providing a courier service for medicines, frozen milk supplies for premature babies, foetal transplant material, etc. Riders often meet up with riders from other parts of Wales or England, passing supplies on from rider to rider.

All the bikes are owned, insured, and maintained by the organisation, and riders undergo regular training. Their conspicuous yellow and red livery makes blood bikes easily identified by other road users. All riders and support staff are volunteers, funded by public donations and some business sponsorship, with their services provided completely free to the NHS.

WI President Jayne Harris thanked Roy for his very interesting talk, presented him with a cash donation from Felindre, then thanked member Rebe Brick for hosting the meeting and providing refreshments.

Felindre WI's October event was a daisy triptych painting session, tutored by member and local artist Kath Horn.

Kath talked members through the technique of using acrylics to paint shaded backgrounds for the three sections of the painting, then demonstrated how to paint a daisy in each section. Not all our daisies were as artistic as Kath's, but we all ended up with a pleasing picture to hang on our walls.

WI President Jayne Harris thanked Kath for hosting the meeting, providing refreshments and for her expert tutoring.

Llangunllo WI Visit Clayton Engineering Limited

Members and partners visited Clayton Engineering in Knighton for our October meeting and I think it was true to say we didn't quite know what to expect, but all I can say is WOW. None of us could have imagined how interesting our visit to the factory, down a lane many of us hadn't noticed before, turned out to be. We started our visit with the managing director Stephen giving an illustrated talk about the company, explaining that they have been designing and manufacturing launch and recovery equipment for the RLNI for over 45 years, and that the RNLI now own the company ensuring that they retain the specialist knowledge and skills the company has developed over their long association.

With the help of Henry and Chris, two of his colleagues, we ventured into the workshops and we were very surprised to see first-hand what the company did. We heard about how they build and service the tractors on site, as well as having teams that can go out to support station engineers should they not be able to resolve the problem themselves.

We saw tractors and trailers specifically designed to launch and recover lifeboats from the beach, others designed to launch inflatable lifeboats, to a massive tractor and carriage able to imitate a slipway to launch a lifeboat directly into the sea. The incredibly complicated technology that goes into the tractors and other equipment along with the capabilities of the vehicles is truly amazing.

We thoroughly enjoyed our visit and thanked Stephen and his colleagues for giving up their evening to share with us the vital work the company does working with the RNLI. It was also good to hear that the majority of the workforce is local, and that they have an active apprenticeship programme. No visit would be complete without a group photo, so here we are in front of the huge impressive tractor, just look at the size!! Thanks Clayton Engineering.

We finished off our evening with an enjoyable meal at the Horse and Jockey and lots of discussions about our visit.

As Remembrance Day approaches we think about the horrific and destructive wars currently raging, where now many more civilians than soldiers are killed

Here are a selection of verses written during World War One, reflecting changing attitudes from the start of the war through to its end.

Our Country's Call

10th September 1914

Hark! Your country's calling, Johnny, Come to stem the flood; See the savage German, Johnny Spilling British blood!

Up and jine your brethren, Johnny, Down with German Knaves! We must fight the varmints, Johnny, Or become their slaves.

Better die a hero, Johnny, Than a coward be; Bravely face the foeman, Johnny, Britain calls for thee.

To the Front... 24 Sep. 1914

Who said that Radnor boys be slaw To hear the call of duty? When to the front they're asked to go, They'll strike for King and Country, Our Radnor lads be hard as steel, They won't be trod by German heel.

You dinna know our Radnor boys, They binna funky cowards; And tho' they dinna make noise, They'll shuo the German homewards; By gosht! They'd think it jolly fun To drive cauld steel thro' German-Hun!

But by 1915, folks at home are asked to think of and pray for those fighting in the trenches... As more and more men are wanted...

The Boys in the Trenches April 1915

As in bed you lie so snug, Safe from bayonet and 'plug,' Think of those who bear the brunt Of the fighting at the front.

While your comforts you enjoy, Think of Tom, our valiant boy! Pray for him who, with hees gun, Helps to check the cruel Hun.

In the furrows on the farm, Safe from any hurt or harm; Give a thought, or breathe a prayer For our hero fighting there

Tho Llanbister boasts her 'score' Men be wanted – more and more; From the trenches comes the call, "Come and help us one and all." And, later on, the reality of the pointless suffering is hitting home

The Boys June 1917

Far from their native land,
Far from the home;
Out on a foreign strand,
Far, far from home!
Out in the tranches there,
We wonder how they fare;
And often breathe a prayer,
For those from home.

Out there mid shot and shell, They fight for home! Oft in that ghastly hell, They think of home. Many have nobly died, Sorrows have multiplied! Thousands to God have cried From mournful homes.

We pray to God above,
Mid war's alarm,
To keep the lads we love,
Safe from all harm.
In spite of shot and shell,
Out of the mouth of hell,
He'll bring them safe and well,
With his strong arm.

Among the 700 or so poems I can find no mention of the Armistice. And little mention of celebration at the end of the war. However, on a lighter note, in July 1919 it seems Llanbister was caught on the wrong foot!

Llanbister - July 1919

"Where's the welcome home committee?
Be they dead? Well, 'tis a pity!"
From Melenydd to the cityThis we hear!
They have made no preparation
For the great Peace celebration!
Over here!

At Llangunllo and Llandiawy, Folks be having summat showy! Five-bob dinners! That's the story Over there!

Whats gone wrong in auld Llanbister? Not a fry, or boil, or roaster Nor a tea to cheer the youngster! Was it fair? BUT... eventually folks of Llanbister got their act together and Llanbister and Cantal Schoolrooms were filled with jams and jellies -


"All agree the tea is topping!

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Llangunllo Women Who Gave Their Support To The 1923 Peace Petition

The Peace Petition of 1923 was initiated by the Welsh League of Nations Union (WLNU). It was founded in the aftermath of WW1 to support people Wales-wide in campaigning for peace and international cooperation, with 1,014 community groups and 61,262 members actively involved in the league's campaigning activities.

Founding of the WLNU was initially proposed by David Davies at the August 1918 National Eisteddfod in Neath. It began as a regional committee of the British League, who on 25/5/1920 organised the first Welsh League conference in Llandrindod Wells. Annie-Jane Hughes-Griffiths was vice chair of the WLNU and it was through her and the Welsh Centre for International Affairs, and in partnership with other national organisations, community groups and volunteers, 'Wales for Peace' explored how Welsh people could contribute to the search for peace, hence in 1923 the women of Wales organised an unprecedented appeal to form the Welsh Women's Peace Petition and Memorial.

There was a particularly strong focus on leveraging Wales' connections with America through the 'American Welsh Diaspora. The Memorial Petition appealing to the women of the USA "from home to home" and "hearth to hearth" to join them in a call for "Law not War". For the USA to join and lead the new League of Nations the campaign mobilised organisers in every community across Wales, with women leafleting door to door and then returning for the completed signature sheets. Nearly three quarters of Welsh women signed the petition.

The petition, said to be seven miles long in length, and signed by 390,296 Welsh women, was placed in a great oak chest carved by EJ Hallam. The declaration was placed in a gilded Moroccan leather binding which was produced through Cardiff's school of arts and crafts.

They made their transatlantic voyage accompanied by the Welsh delegation of Annie Hughes-Griffiths, May Ellis, Elinor Prys and Gladys Thomas, where it was presented to the women of America, with the quote, "May we hand down to the generations who come after us, the proud heritage of a warless world". Both were bequeathed to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington.

Over 2023-24 WCIA, Academi Heddwch, the Women's Archive Wales, the Smithsonian Institute, Heddwch Nain Mamgu, the National Library and Museum of Wales and the Sennedd joined "peace forces" for a campaign marking the centenary of Wales' remarkable Women's Peace Appeal of 1923-24.

It was agreed it could be on loan from the National Museum of America, and the hundred year old peace petition had an emotional welcome back to Wales on 5/4/2023 coinciding with the announcement of an award of nearly £250,000 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to bring the story to life.

The chest, petition and declaration arrived at the National Library of Wales and signalled the first step in making it accessible to the people of Wales. The petition has been catalogued, digitised and opened to the public.

The children of Wales were the first to send by wireless a greeting of goodwill to all other children in every land under the sun. The women of Wales were the first to send a message of peace from the homes of one people to the homes of another. The teachers of Wales were the first to teach the principles of the League of Nations in the schools. The churches of Wales were the first to make an annual offering in furtherance of World Peace. Leaders of religion in Wales were the first to present a Memorial to the leaders of religion in America on behalf of the League.

2024 Peace and Goodwill Message

A chest full of signatures, and a century of defining a landscape of peace,
But does peace stand a chance today?
We catch a glimpse somewhere between the discourse and the dust,
In the bright eyes of the child,
Who traces the arc of a kite across fresh acres of sky,

The Bats of St Mary's Church New Radnor

Our bat colony is a maternity (breeding) colony of soprano pipistrelle (Pipistrellus pygmaeus). It is difficult to estimate the size of the colony as this is counted from the adult population. The approximate number of bats that emerged was about 200 bats, based on the count on the Bats n Bangers evening. By early August the pup born this year can be learning to fly and following along behind the adults, so it seems likely to be a colony of about 100 - 120 adult bats.

From the exit points that were observed, the roost location is at the top of the chancel wall (the wall plate) and where the roof structure connects to the walls. The bats tend to rest close to the exit point and will cluster loosely or tightly



depending on the ambient temperature in the roost in this part of the church.

In comparison with other bat species in Wales, it is one of the smallest, but it is abundant and the most encountered. It eats small insects: generally midges, gnats and mosquitoes.





Welsh Vintage Sports Car Trial

Most of you cannot help to have seen or heard these 100-year-old cars tearing about our roads and lanes over the weekend of the 12th-13th October. This car trial has been running for around 75 years and consists of climbing 18 steep and muddy tracks throughout our Ministry Area. The higher they get up the hill, the higher their score, no speed trial is involved. Over 100 of these cars assemble at Presteigne from all over England and Wales, some being driven 100's of miles and some arriving on trailers. They all have to drive a certain distance from Presteigne on Saturday before commencing the hill climbs. There are two main spectator sites at Ralph's Cider Weekend at Badland and the final 3 hills of the trial at Cwmwhitton. This year the conditions were perfect for the competition, with plenty of mud on the tracks which tested the drivers and their "bouncers", whilst conditions overhead were favourable for the spectators. There were record numbers at Cwmwhitton as the car parks were virtually full, the cars being marshalled by Knighton and District Rotary Club, who collected donations for local charities including Whitton Church. Spectators were treated to a wonderful afternoon of vintage sport before the results were announced in the farmyard at Cwmwhitton. The old cars then headed off to their homes from all over the country, the less fortunate being carried on trailers.







Knucklas Notes

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


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Llangunllo Memories of World War 1

As reported in local papers -

January 1915

A successful social was held in the School Room which included songs and competitions. The event was well attended and a good sum was realised for a fund for the soldiers and sailors.

January 1916

On Furlough – Gunner Arthur Price, Royal Field Artillery, son of Mr Charles Price, Brook House, Llangunllo, has been home on furlough for a few days. He has been at the front since last March.

Post Script – Sadly he died on 11th June 1916, no known grave, commemorated on ARRAS Memorial and awarded the Military Medal. He is named on Llangunllo War Memorial, and with the other young men lost from our community, will be remembered on Sunday 10th November.

January 1918 - Sir Arthur Pearson's Appeal

A splendid response has been made in this parish to the appeal on behalf of the blind soldiers. A carol party was formed which went around the district night after night singing carols. The party were heartily welcomed wherever they went and the gratifying sum of £18 was collected (£860 today.) This has been forwarded to Sir Arthur Pearson, the blind benefactor, to help with his noble work for soldiers blinded in the war.

July 1919

Peace Day was celebrated in Knighton, however, "Not all the veterans were satisfied with the proceedings – a correspondent to the Radnor Express contrasted the cold meat given the Knighton ex-servicemen with the silver medal the Llangunllo veterans had received!!"

The Knighton authorities moved quickly to put matters right and approved the spending of £250 (over £10,000 today) on a souvenir for each of the returning servicemen and for war widows.
