





Christmas Through The Ages

At our Christmas Eve carol service in Llangunllo carols were sung, of course, and we heard the familiar and much loved Christmas story read from St Luke's Gospel, but we also took a slightly different approach from usual. We took a look at many aspects of the festive season through the ages - different music, customs and food that have been part of the celebrations.

The Dark Ages were represented by Good King Wenceslas whose kind actions on the night of the Feast of Stephen (26th December) were acted out for us by an impromptu band of young actors, followed by us all singing the well-known carol that also tells the story.

From the Tudor period our own travelling minstrels brought us the lovely *Coventry Caro*l and the Georgian era gave us 'While shepherds watched their flocks by night.'

Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert, introduced the idea of bringing the Christmas tree indoors and decorating it and the singing of 'O Christmas Tree, O Christmas Tree' heralded the arrival of our own tree which the children decked out in sparkling tinsel and baubles.

Our trip through the centuries concluded with a touching glimpse of the trenches in World War 1, with two more of our local musicians giving us the poignant *'Silent Night'* – a reminder of soldiers from both sides singing during that often recalled break in hostilities.


The service was followed by a jolly social time which really put us in the mood for our very own 2024 Christmas celebrations.

New Radnor celebrates return of film director, 65 years on!

Kevin Brownlow, the director of the 1964, breakthrough movie, *It Happened Here*, returning on 30th November to the main Water Street site of his shoots in New Radnor, commented: "Of all the many places where we went on location the people here were always the most welcoming."



The film, first shown at various film festivals in 1964, portrays what it would have been like to have lived in a 1940s Britain which had lost the war and was under Nazi occupation.

Conceived by Brownlow in 1956, when he was only 18, the independent film, which took eight years to complete, includes early scenes shot in and around New Radnor, including at a derelict farmhouse on Black Yatt which was 'blown up' in a highly realistic battle scene. But the core of the New Radnor shoot involved a scene in which practically the whole village turned out to be 'evacuees' put on trucks from a war zone, but in which one small group left behind are caught up in a shoot-out with partisans and in which all but one were killed. The survivor was none other than Pauline Murray, star of the film, otherwise wife of Dick Jobson, New Radnor's doctor for more than thirty years.

It was Dick Jobson's own enthusiasm as an amateur film maker which led him to cross paths with Kevin Brownlow in, which in turn led to the invitation to come and shoot parts of the film in New Radnor in 1959. Headquarters for the whole operation was the Jobson's grand old house in Broad Street. And when Pauline was not on set she was busy cooking for all the film crew who pitched up there. That aside, the film critics are unanimous that, though not a professional actor, it was above all her performance which so forcefully captured the dilemma of what an ordinary person might do in circumstances not of their own choosing.

This was one of the difficult issues explored by Kevin Brownlow in conversation with another famous film maker, Martin Smith, at the New Radnor community centre on 30th November. Both discussion and film viewing had the audience of forty absolutely rapt. But arguably stealing the show were the three New Radnor ladies who stepped up to the plate to tell how they got involved as extras and the excitement of it all. Libby Roe, Jane Lissaman and Pat McGilvray were only young children in 1959, but their reminiscences of the event, including being dumped on lorries or indeed being 'shot', were utterly vivid.

Looking back on Felindre WI

Our Institute really began in Beguildy on August 1st 1927 with a membership of 30-40. Owing to the black-out and difficulty in getting speakers during the war years, attendance dwindled and it was decided on October 3rd 1941 to suspend meetings during the winter. In fact meetings were not resumed until October 1947. By this time there was more interest in the Felindre area than at Beguildy, so it was re-opened as Felindre WI, supporting the Community and going from strength to strength in all aspects of WI.

We were very involved with the Field Name Survey during 1969/70. One of our members Mrs JAP Thomas, who was Chairman of the Organising Committee for the survey, had the honour of receiving the Prince of Wales Countryside Award from H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. Mrs Thomas was on the National Agriculture and Produce Sub-Committee.

We were a lively WI with a netball and a rounders team also competing in Federation events. We were proud that one of our members became County Federation Chairman.

Fast forward to the second millennium, still very active competing in short mat bowls and new age curling events with other WIs within the County. vWe experienced much success in the County Show and on several occasions represented the County in the WI Rose Bowl Competition at the Royal Welsh Show, winning on one occasion.

During the 'noughties' Felindre WI produced another Federation County Chairman, who was also Vice-Chair of the Wales Federation. We continued to support all County Events, Campaigns and fund raisers. Three of our members sang in the Federation Choir, entertaining and fund raising locally.

Numbers started to dwindle through no fault of our own despite having membership campaigns, targeting every household, and holding Open Evenings which were well attended but still no members. The ladies were very happy to support us for functions but didn't want to join. The younger ladies of the community did open up a WI of their own in the upper Teme

At the time of writing most gardens are covered in snow, quite picturesque for all photographers. Children are enjoying having a lot of fun making snowmen and games in the snow. The 2nd of February is called Candlemas in the Church Calendar, the day when we return our Nativity sets to a safe place ready for Christmas 2025. For all involved in floristry, it is a busy time, a chance to show off their latest skills with beautiful flowers, mostly red. Rather like fashion designs, new ideas change every year. February is not one of the most popular months in the garden, but the promise of spring and planning for warmer days ahead can be rewarding, especially if seated in a comfortable chair.

Welsh Hymns 4 - Builth

Rhagluniaeth fawr y nef, Mor rhyfedd yw Esboniad helaeth hon O arfaeth Duw: Mae'n gwylio llwch y llawr, Mae'n trefnu lluoedd nef, Cyflawna'r cwbwl oll O'i gyngor ef.

Great providence of heaven-What wonders shine In its profound display Of God's design: It guards the dust of earth, Commands the hosts above, Fulfils the mighty plan Of his great love. Llywodraeth faith y byd Sydd yn ei llaw, Mae'n tynnu yma i lawr, Yn codi draw: Trwy bob helyntoedd blin, Terfysgoedd o bob rhyw, Dyrchafu'n gyson mae Deyrnas ein Duw.

The kingdoms of this world Lie in its hand; See how they rise or fall At its command Through sorrow and distress, Tempestuous storms that rage, God's kingdom yet endures From age to age. Ei th'wyllwch dudew sydd Yn olau gwir, Ei dryswch mwyaf, mae Yn drefen glir; Hi ddaw â'i throeon maith Yn fuan oll i ben, Bydd synnu wrth gofio'r rhain Tu draw i'r llen.

Its darkness dense is but A radiant light; Its oft-perplexing ways Are ordered right. Soon all its winding paths Will end, and then the tale Of wonder shall be told Beyond the veil.

"Rhagluniaeth fawr y nef", sung to the tune Builth, is another very popular Welsh hymn.

It was written by David Charles (1762-1834). He was born in Carmarthenshire into a comfortable family but his father lost all their money and he had to work. He was apprenticed to a flax-dresser and rope-maker in Carmarthen and afterwards spent three years at Bristol. He returned to Carmarthen when he married Sarah, the daughter of Samuel Levi Phillips, a Haverfordwest banker, and set himself up as a tradesman. He had


long been involved with the Calvinistic Methodists and became an elder. He was among the first lay preachers who were ordained in 1811. The tune 'Builth' was composed by David Jenkins (1848-1915) Despite a humble background, in Trecastle, Brecknockshire he graduated in music from Aberystwyth and Cambridge and became a Professor at Aberystwyth University.

The stirring words of the hymn are rooted in Calvinistic Methodism. Most of Wales developed a quite distinct type of Methodism, strongly influenced by Calvin's beliefs in predestination (the doctrine that all events have been willed by God), usually with reference to the eventual fate of the individual soul and church government. Calvinistic Methodists formed the Presbyterian Church in Wales. English Methodists had different interpretations and structures. The hymn celebrates the 'great providence of heaven', God's hand in shaping world affairs and the reasons will be discerned, at first faintly 'Tu draw i'r llen' through the veil.

An arrangement of the hymn by Jeff Howard can be watched on YouTube conducting many Montgomeryshire community choirs at the 2015 Montgomershire National Eisteddfod. Jeff himself conducts and you may recognise some of the singers. www.youtube.com/watch?v=2kEwtasY02c



We heard how the court functioned, and what the role and life of the visiting judges and staff would have been like.

Gabby talked about the history of the building and the detailed work undertaken to maintain its authenticity and history during the restoration, and continued upkeep. Many of us were completely unaware of the extensive involvement of some of our own community who live in Llangunllo, which certainly added another very interesting aspect to the tour. We were all struck by how dark the rooms were, and in particular how difficult it must have been working in the kitchen with just the flickering gas light, the contrast of living above and below stairs was quite stark.

The damp prison cells were also a reminder of the purpose of the building, along with some stories of those who unfortunately found themselves in the dock, like William Morgan and Mary Morgan, thought to be the last woman to be hung in Wales, along with the number of escapes from Presteigne gaol.

The visit was rounded off with mulled wine and warm mince pies in front of a roaring fire and a traditionally decorated Christmas tree where we all exchanged Christmas cards and Secret Santa presents.

We thanked all the staff for making our visit so interesting, and agreed it had been a lovely way to spend an afternoon, and as our next years programme card was distributed, we look forward to what 2025 will bring. Wishing everyone health and happiness for 2025.

David Roberts Poem

Dated: 6 April 1916

Is it reassuring to read of familiar weather?

This poem reminds me of the Vicar of Wolstaston, the Rev Donald Carr who, one Sunday afternoon in 1865, almost perished when returning from his other parish of Ratlinghope, over the Long Mynd! 'A Night in the Snow' is the book he wrote of his amazing survival.

It was republished in 1998 (He originally wrote it to raise funds for his Church.) His boots... are in the museum in Shrewsbury...

The Blizzard!

The night was cauld and stormy, The gale was howling wild! Along the lanes you couldna go When snow so high was piled!

The shepherd was in terror, When gwain to see the flock! And in the ffilds he roamed afar, By giar! Till twelve o'clock!

The snow was drifting orful, And he was almost blind! Amid the drifts, so dredful 'dip', Hees 'ship' he couldna find.

He had a goodish lantern,
But that un gave no light!
'Twas dredful from the path to roam,
Far from hees home that night!

He didna knaw the fences, The road he couldna see! And as he tried to find hees farm, In great alarm was he!

Hees 'ship' were surely buried, Beneath some yards o' snow! He had to leave them to their fate, For straight for home he'd go.

Afore he found the homestead, He had a ruffish fight; And tho' at times quite close was he, He couldna see the light!

Our friend was sorely troubled, And almost in despair! For in the blizzard wild and strong, Quite long he wandered there.

At last there was a glimmer, Hees window came in sight; And you may guess how glad was he To see its welcome light.

Knucklas Notes

Since the middle of November the weather has been in turns wet and stormy and fiercely cold, but it was mild and calm around Christmas Day. Comparatively little damage was done by the storms to local structures, but trees on the roads, including the all-important road to Knighton, caused problems at times. Through it all, however, although the local train-service was again disrupted, the bus-service did amazingly well for our village, dogs were faithfully walked and all the bins were emptied according to the revised festive schedule. And, during term-time, the school bus has continued to pick up and drop children at Glan Nant. All this despite the fact that Knucklas fails to qualify for the salting and gritting programme which applies to more major through-routes.

There was a brief power-outage in our area but of very short duration compared with 30 hours, and more, further up the Teme Valley. Local roads were under sheets of water at times but no houses in our area were flooded, so far as I know.

Because of the challenging weather a number of events around the New Year were cancelled or postponed, including church and chapel services. What did go ahead was a Baptist Chapel service for Christmas morning and the Sunday after, with participants from Knighton, and a pre-Christmas Carol service at Heyope Parish Church. For this well organised event, conducted by Rev'd John Hanna from Knighton, the nave of the church was filled to beyond capacity and was followed by a well appreciated social time, with attractive refreshments available. The Llanfair Choir came over and shared some of their musical talents during the service.

The Castle Hill Community Land Project combined with the Community Centre Committee to mount a fine local arts and crafts display and sale, along with attractive refreshments in early December. In January, the Wassail took place but with reduced participation, due to the weather conditions. Another Burns Night is planned for late January.

A New Year celebration, with refreshments, was held on the night of December 31st at the Community Centre.


Congratulations to Tom Smith of Mill Bungalow, Knucklas, who is now a very fit 90 years old.

Celtic Saint of the Month Brigid of Kildare - Ist February - died c. 523




St. Brigid by Kathleen Verschoyle (1892-1987)

I wonder if we realise that some of the festivals we celebrate in our churches date right back to pre-Christian times. This is particularly true of our agricultural festivals. Harvest is the most widely celebrated one, though it only became a church festival in the 19th century. In rural areas we ask for God's blessing on the crops at Rogationtide in May, and some churches still celebrate Plough Sunday in January. In the first millennium, when our Celtic saints started to preach the Gospel and found churches and monastic communities throughout our islands and beyond, they looked for ways of connecting with local customs and long-held beliefs, turning them into Christian celebrations, just as we have done with harvest festivals.

St Brigid's Day and Candlemas on the following day are good examples of this. The agricultural festival at this time of year was called Imbolc. It is such an ancient word that it is difficult to get to its original meaning, though it seems to contain the word for belly or womb or alternatively to do with milk and lactation. It was explained as the time of celebrating the start of the

lambing season, with the ewes in lamb and starting to lactate. There was also a goddess called Brigid who, among other things, was associated with healing, fire, fertility, domestic animals, the natural world and compassionate care, who may have been celebrated on this day too.

It so happened that there was born to a Christian family in Leinster a girl who was called Brigid, who became a much beloved saint. St Brigid is honoured in Ireland as one of their three patron saints, the other two being Patrick and Columba, but we know very little about her. She came from a humble background, though her parents had been baptised by St Patrick and her sanctity was recognised at an early age. She founded the abbey at Kildare and was well known for her hospitality and charity towards all those in need. The Lives that were later written about her are full of stories of the miraculous provision of food, drink and healing and a perpetual fire was kept burning at the abbey until the Archbishop of Dublin extinguished it in the 12th century on the grounds of superstition. So celebrating St Brigid on 1st February was an excellent way of "Christianising" the ancient traditions which marked the first signs of spring and gradually turning




Kildare Cathedral is built on the site of St Brigid's double monastery

people's minds away from a goddess to honouring a Christian saint who had done so much to bring the love of God to the people of Leinster and beyond.

There are dozens of churches, chapels and holy wells dedicated to Brigid (Bríd in Irish, Brìde in Scottish Gaelic, Ffraid in Welsh) and also on the Continent on the pilgrimage routes to Rome. It is suggested that there were other Irish saints called Brigid, but they have all been subsumed into the famous Brigid of Kildare. Nearest to us we have Llansantffraid yn Elfael, above the road between Builth and New Radnor, and Llansantffraid Cwmdeuddwr near Rhayader.
