



Memories of Evenjobb Post Office and Shop

Before I can remember, the Post Office was situated in the last house in Evenjobb on the main road facing Walton, which is still known as The Old Post Office. The Postmistress then was Mrs Davies, who retired. Then Mrs Casewell took over as Postmistress at Forge Cottage and I remember collecting the daily paper and buying National Savings Certificates from there in the early 1950s. We children from Beggars Bush, Hoddell and Evancoyd would always take the short cut down the footpath, across the stile, through Arbour Field, down to Evancoyd School.

Later on, when Mrs Casewell retired, the Post Office moved down to the Village Shop, local mail would be left at the Post Office and delivered on foot or bicycle by Mr Phillips, I think Mr Griffiths and later Mrs Dot Williams, after which we had a Mail Van delivery. Mrs Bridgewater ran the shop until her death in 1951. Her husband was the local carpenter.

Later, the property was purchased by Mr and Mrs Bennett who, I think, moved from Birmingham during the Second World War to Bank Lane Cottage, having searched countrywide for a Village Shop and were pleased when the one in Evenjobb became available. Mrs Bennett was a very good businesswoman, her mental arithmetic was amazing, she had the price of everything at her fingertips and added up people's purchases in seconds! She was quite strict with regard to opening and closing times. Most groceries were available, and bread would be delivered from Rhodes Bakers from New Radnor. I remember that paraffin was dispensed from a large oil tank which was in the area between the shop and cottage, up a couple of steps. Sadly, not so long after taking over the shop, her husband died in 1958, however Mrs Bennett kept the shop and post office going until she had a stroke and died in 1985 aged 87, which was a remarkable feat. The shop was put up for sale, but Mrs Bennett's daughter kept the cottage part of the premises.

During this time Maurice Jones and Olwen Morris temporarily kept the post office and shop open to avoid its closure. It really was a great benefit to the Village and surrounding area. Fortunately, Mrs Christine Bufton applied to become Post Mistress and was appointed. Christine and her husband Elwyn renovated the property and, while the repairs were taking place, Christine temporarily kept the Post Office from the hallway in her bungalow. There was great excitement when the newly refurbished Post Office reopened and a large newspaper spread in June 1986 heralded the event. However eventually, after strong competition from the supermarkets, the shop closed. The Post Office made a decision to close smaller offices and the post office closed in 2008. The property is now a private residence.

About the Cover - The Angel Declares Resurrection


"He is not here. He is risen" declares the triumphant angel with upraised arm. Those words are on the banner, bottom right. This is the sunrise scene on the first Easter, as told by St Mark, when Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome arrive with spices to anoint Jesus' body (Mark 16.1). The woman in the right-hand panel carries their large jar of spices. Finding the dazzling white angel in front of an empty tomb frightened the women who promptly ran away. The hills behind might be Radnorshire's "purple headed mountains" with a golden hint of a rising sun. Angels floating on clouds above clasp their hands and watch the momentous event.

The window was given to Gladestry Church by Miss Alice Welson in 1923 in memory of a beloved (but unnamed) friend who 'fell asleep in Jesus' on Nov 7, 1922, aged 59 years, and also for Evan Powell Welson, Church Warden 1880-1885, who died on March 27, 1885, age 67.


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


Our guest speaker was Sylvia Richards, and Sylvia gave us an incredibly interesting and engaging talk on a project she



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Celtic Saint of the Month - St Beuno - 21st April

Have you ever found a curlew's nest? No? Well, you can blame St Beuno for that (according to legend of course). A traditional story says Beuno was wading back home from Anglesey when he dropped his sermon book into the sea. A curlew found it and placed it on a rock by the shore, so in return Beuno protects all curlews by keeping their nests well hidden.

To move on to more verifiable facts, Beuno is often considered as the St David of the north because he did so much church planting and missionary endeavours, especially in the north-west of Wales. He was born in the ancient Kingdom of Powys and later moved south for education and ordination at Caerwent. There is a chapel dedicated to him at Llanfeuno under Clodock in the Black Mountains. Later he moved back north to Berriew in mid-Wales, where a local prince gave him land for his first monastery. There is still a standing stone in Dyffryn Lane known as Maen Beuno (Beuno's Stone). It is early Bronze Age, but it is believed Beuno used it as a landmark for preaching to the local

churches along the route at Pistyll and Tudweiliog. Beuno also had a church at Aberffraw on Anglesey (remember the story of the curlew?).

Have you heard of Beuno's Mark (Nôd Bueno)? Inside Clynnog church you can still see Beuno's Chest (not that it dates as far back as Beuno). It is where people would put offerings of money. One kind of offering was for the lambs and calves that were born with Beuno's Mark, a congenital slit in

people. Beuno lived in Berriew for several years until, one day, he saw a Saxon warrior on the far side of the river and thought it best to move to safety. He travelled westwards until he reached the Lleyn Peninsula. On the way he and his followers, planted




Maen Beuno Standing Stone

churches around Gwyddelwern, where he is said to have healed an Irishman, and one of his holy wells is nearby.

Moving further north to the coast, Whitford church is dedicated to St Mary and St Beuno. Not far from there is Holywell, (a famous place of pilgrimage) where Beuno settled for a while, along with his niece Winefride (Gwenffrewi) who was travelling with him. There are several wells associated with her and you will find her shrine in Shrewsbury Abbey. Beuno left Winefride there and travelled west to Caernarvon and, after being given a gift of land, he settled at Clynnog Fawr where, twenty-five years later he died on the Sunday after Easter in 642 and was buried in a small oratory adjoining the church. For hundreds of years vast numbers of pilgrims came to Clynnog to start their pilgrimage to Bardsey Island along the Saints' Way. Beuno and his followers

Llangunllo's annual walk this year is on Saturday 3rd May.


Starting at The Greyhound in Llangunllo at 9.45, we will walk to Knighton along Glyndwrs Way, roughly 7 miles.

I was delighted to find the article about my Great Uncle Charles in the March edition of The Radnor. Sir Charles Edwards (1867 - 1954) was my paternal grandmother Elizabeth Davies' elder brother and the youngest of four sons. I never met him but, as a child, felt as though I knew him, for I often heard the family speak of him affectionately and discuss his achievements as a Member of Parliament (MP) for Bedwellty constituency in Monmouthshire. My father Leonard and his brother Stan spoke fondly of their "Uncle Charlie" who, when they were young lads in the early 1920s, used to visit the family at the Brynny (up the lane from Skyborry Green). They remembered that on his arrival he always said, "It feels good to be back to my roots". During his stay he loved to visit Llangunllo, where he was born at Crungoed Cottage, and was once invited to speak at a celebration at Gravel Chapel where he confessed to stealing plums from a tree near the chapel as a young boy.

In my book "Upper Teme Valley Memories" Uncle Stan recalls one of the annual visits to the Brynny:

"We all helped with the work at home, lambing, milking, and haymaking, a job requiring a twenty-gallon barrel of Yeoman's cider at 6d per gallon to be stored in the workshop and rationed out to last through the harvest. Well, that was the intention! Another job was to collect stones to fill the holes in the sunken lane.

As a rule, the teamwork went well, but I remember one exception. Mother's brother, Sir Charles Edwards, who was the MP for Bedwellty in Monmouthshire, and his wife Lady Margaret came for their annual visit. We boys were set the task of cleaning out the trap, making sure there was no chicken feed or lumps of coal left inside. The pony was groomed, Mother polished the horse brass, and Father went to collect our guests from Knighton Railway Station. We boys washed at the well, Mother checked behind our ears, and, wearing our tidiest clothes, we waited to greet our guests at the bottom of the lane and then walked behind the trap. At the steepest section, there was a shriek from Aunt Margaret. Uncle Charlie hung on but his lady wife came [a pause here to choose the right words] skirt-over-bonnet over the back of the trap. Luckily there was no real damage. One of us, or rather all of us, had forgotten to secure the bolt under the seat."

Ireland, 1985: In the months leading up to Christmas, coalman and family man Bill Furlong (Murphy) discovers startling secrets kept by



Easter Faith In Atheist Russia

Three years after the Russian Revolution of 1917, a great anti-God rally was arranged in Kiev. The powerful orator Bukharin was sent from Moscow, and for an hour he demolished the Christian faith with argument, abuse and ridicule. At the end there was silence.

Then a man rose and asked to speak. He was a priest of the Russian Orthodox Church. He went and stood next to Bukharin. Facing the people, he raised his arms and spoke just three triumphant words: 'Christ is risen!'

At once the entire assembly rose to their feet and gave the joyful response, 'He is risen indeed!' It was a devastating moment for an atheist politician, who had no answer to give to this ancient Easter liturgy. He had not realised he was simply too late: how can you convince people that God does not exist when they have already encountered Him?

Centenary Celebrations for the First Church in Wales

The first church to be consecrated after the disestablishment of the Church in Wales in 1920 has just celebrated its 100th anniversary.

St Martin of Tours in Llay, near Wrexham, opened in 1925 as the village was being developed. It was built to serve miners at the new Llay Main Colliery and their families. It was described in a newspaper report at the time as being *"cheering evidence of the courage and vitality of the Church in Wales"*.

St David's Day Celebration at Knighton Community Centre

There was a full turnout for the St David's Dav celebration at the Comm on 2nd March. The programme featured Welsh folk music from accomplished harpist Eleri Darkins. This was followed by songs and dancing by a group of children from Knighton C/W Primary School, led by Judith Credoz. Prizes were awarded for the best dressed children in Welsh costume. There were readings in Welsh by Rosemary Hanna and Matt Clarke, a folk song from Judith and a performance of Welsh tunes by the Knighton Handbells group. Rosamund Black from the Welsh Textile Museum gave a fascinating illustrated talk about the costumes of Welsh harpists of the past before the Llanfair Singers brought the event to a close.

A team of Comm volunteers helped organise children's activities, while others in the cafe served Welsh cakes and bara brith. Many thanks to Judith Credoz who organised the programme, to Knighton Rotary Club and the Midcounties Co-op for their donations, and to all those who contributed to this very enjoyable free event.



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


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

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Looking Back in Time and Managing the Accounts!

Llangunllo Churchwardens accounts and "overseers of the poor" began in 1693 and are among the earliest in Wales. From the beginning they were written in English, rather than Welsh, albeit sometimes "Radnorshire English!" In the past, churchwardens were local government as well as church official, and their accounts provide for the first time a picture of everyday life in the parish. Until 1868 churchwardens were allowed to levy a rate on all parishioners, even if not church attenders, and the money recorded in the accounts was expenditure from this.

One of the first entries is in 1694 with Mr Cooper being paid £1 for beautifying the church and in 1695 £1 and 5 shillings was paid for mossing and crofting the church (for protection under the tiles.)

In 1716, Elinor Philip, the cleaner, received 1 shilling and in the same year a book of prayer for the King was purchased, also at 1 shilling. This was followed in 1728 with a prayer book for the Royal Family.

When the Rural Dean came on his annual official visit in 1706 the sum of 2 shillings and 6 pence was spent to treat him, and in 1718 when the new vicar arrived 3 shillings was paid out, presumably to welcome him to the parish.

With "vermin" in the churchyard, the accounts refer to payment for the killing of foxes, polecats, hedgehogs, jackdaws, and on one occasion, a great wild cat! Ale was generally purchased in celebration when the said vermin were dispatched.

Rogation Sunday was one of the days favoured for beating the parish bounds when the parishioners were led by the vicar, who stopped from time to time for readings from the gospels. Free refreshment was often provided and expenditure of 3 shillings a year for "ale for the parish round" is recorded during much of the 18th Century.

The north side of the churchyard was unpopular for burial, it was believed to be under the influence of the devil, so ground favoured to the south and east of the yard was used and re-used over the generations. The bones which inevitably came to light were collected and, in 1720 and 1782, entries appear for "burying the bones."

From 1730 the school, held in the church, was financed from the accounts and varying sums of money were continuously spent on materials for repairing the fabric of the building, the clock and the bells in the tower.

As overseers of the poor, Llangunllo Churchwardens undertook a number of duties.

In 1718 a statement of burial for Elinor Griffiths, dependent on the parish, amounted to $\pounds 3$, 12 shillings and 6 pence and included payment to those who attended her, a shroud, ale, bread, butter and cheese for the wake and 1 shilling for the Parson.

In 1743 the overseers provided a man with a pair of shoes, a shirt, clogs, waistcoat and breeches at a combined cost of 15 shillings and 6 pence.


The school from 1769 was bequeathed $\pounds 2$ and 5 shillings annually for teaching poor children.

Charity was also extended to neighbouring parishes, as in 1719, when Beguildy was given 5 shillings for loss by fire.

Sometimes the poor and aged of the parish benefited from donations distributed via the church. In 1829 the late William Bryan of Crungoed left £2 in his will to be given to those of seventy years or upwards. One Anne Wild, at the grand age of 97, received her 2 shillings with others on Good Friday after Divine Service. The following year, D Griffiths Esq, gave 2 guineas among the poor which was received partly in money and partly in coals.

Llangunllo also looked to help the poor in other areas. In 1822 the parish collected money for those in Ireland affected by the failed potato crop of the summer, which alongside limited employment opportunities, created famine in the west and south west of the country. Donations were received from seventeen households to help the suffering families.





Knucklas Notes

As I write, it is not quite spring yet, but by the time that you read this it will be, and the clocks will have been adjusted forwards by an hour (overnight ready for March 30th.). By then, the Spring Equinox will have passed giving us more daylight than night.

Spring will bring with it a great flurry of activity, as plants surge upwards from the soil and there will be some lovely displays of daffodils etc. Lambing will be in full spate on local farms.

Easter Sunday is on April 20th, always an extremely important day in the life of the churches and chapels. Good Friday is two days before. These dates are later than on most years..

Many plans have been made to challenge and delight local people as well as to attract visitors from further afield.

On April 11th, the Thai New Year, the Castle Inn will reopen to the public for evening meals on Fridays and Saturdays.

On the last Friday evening of each month, the highly successful Open Mic evenings continue at the Community Centre, with cooked food on offer. These events are organised by Stevie Yeomans and his Shop Front Heroes, and team of helpers. But the Hall is generally open for socialising on a Friday night and, of course, can be hired for special occasions.

Taking a wider perspective, the Everest Hall in Llanfair Waterdine, along with the Pavilion, offers a whole host of activities ranging from monthly midweek church services to social get-togethers and these are open to, and patronised by, some Knucklas residents. The Everest Hall is also hosting regular church services whilst the Parish Church is under repair. Interestingly, Presteigne is planning something not dissimilar for Wents Meadow - a community store and bar.

The management of the Heart of Wales Railway Line, a much-vaunted worldwide tourist attraction but also needed by some local residents, seem to have 'backtracked' on their cuts to our local service and will be restoring our weekday five trains a day (each way). Even better, they will now be encouraging 'Active Travel' by progressively bringing in carriages which can accommodate 10 cycles, instead of just two. Well done, all our determined campaigners!

Herefordshire Arts Week (in September) is even now being prepared for, using the very successful format from previously, with a major display in Knucklas Community Centre, along with hot food. And the freshly installed patio should prove an added attraction.

The bridge onto Chapel Close (by us) is still out of service but 'Julie's bungalow', along with the extensive gardens, is under renovation by the Thomas brothers from Felindre. It will be so good to see it lived in and enjoyed again after years of dereliction.

Council tax rises of 8.9% and water rates bills with a much greater increase than that, are causing concern. Meanwhile, Royal Mail are increasing their charges for 1st. and 2nd. class letters from April 7th.




Church Kneelers – St Edward's, Knighton
