Memories of Felindre Village Shop and Post Office

In the 1911 Census, Meredith Thomas lived at "The Stores," Felindre and was both grocer and draper. His family built the premises in the late 1870s and above the shop was a large room where two tailors sat crossed legged on the floor, and eight or nine seamstresses worked on garments. Customers were measured for a suit, or whatever garment they wanted, and then returned in three to four weeks to collect and settle their account.

In Welsh, the name Felindre comes from the words "melin tref" meaning "mill farm" and the fleeces of the local hill sheep may well have been the source of the cloth used by the Thomas family. It is said, a certain lady called Polly travelled from Abbey Cwm Hir to the mill with fleeces and then visited the room above the shop to order her latest outfit.

Over the years, Meredith Thomas appears to have built up a successful business and, alongside the grocery shop and tailoring, he also had live-in apprentice "store keepers" - boys who were trained on a four year tenure.

Slater's Business Directory of 1880 names Matthew Thomas as living at the Post Office and his occupation as Post Master and tailor. As a tailor did he possibly also work in the room above the village shop?

Interestingly in the 1881 Census, William Parker, born in Bleddfa, is also listed as a Store Keeper and Grocer in Felindre, along with a Sarah Reese from Llanidloes, suggesting competition to the Thomas family!

Over the years the shop and Post Office changed hands and in the early 1950s, on a Saturday morning, local boy Derek Brick, helped Mr Frank Barber who then ran the business. As the Saturday help, his duties included assisting Mr Barber to put up orders for the local customers, this would take place every fortnight. He was generally kept busy weighing up loose brown sugar to put in bags and cutting pieces of Maderia Cake and cheese from the large slabs of each displayed on the counter. Once in a while, he would have a telegram from the Post Office to deliver on foot to a villager, or possibly, to an outlying cottage and farm.

Before Mr Barber's day he remembers his parents talking of Mr and Mrs Jones at the shop and Post Offce. Their son Jack was clerk to Knighton Rural District Council, the offices then located at the side of the now Knighton Hospital.

In the 1960s Leslie and Mary Morris took over the running of the shop and Post Office, having previously been the licencees of the village public house, The Wharf Inn. They stocked a good range of groceries and provisions for the community and deliveries in and around the village were also undertaken. Jars of sweets were found on the shop shelves too, the sweets were weighed into paper bags, usually 1/4 of a lb, and enjoyed by the children and adults alike. Large pieces of bacon were sliced to order with the hand operated bacon slicer and pieces of cheese cut to customer size with a sharp wire, then all wrapped in paper. At this time bread, came from Felton's Bakery in Knighton and from Watsons, Llandrindod Wells, baked by father Fred and delivered in a van by son Bill.

During the week, the papers came to the shop with the post, but on a Sunday, with no post available, Mr Jones collected them from Knighton on his motorbike. The shop and Post Office worked together and petrol and paraffin were also sold.

When deliveries and supplies to the area were disrupted by winter weather and heavy snow fall, local farmers were ready to lend a hand. During one particular snowy winter Mr and Mrs Morris' son, Bernard, travelled down the valley by tractor to Knighton to collect milk and bread for his parents' shop and Felindre folk.

Their daughter-in-law fondly recalls that each night Mary took the daily takings to bed, placed them safely under her pillow and slept on them until the morning!

In 1978 Doug and Clarice Thomas moved from the Wain Farm to the shop and Post Office, which they kept until it finally closed.

Post Script - in the past the draper's shop and ladies/gentlemen outfitters in Knighton was known as Meredith Thomas. Was there a connection to Felindre's Meredith Thomas, maybe a reader of "The Radnor" can shed light on this?

About the Cover - Healing the Lame Man

This 'Arts and Crafts' window from 1925 is a touching memorial to a Bromyard physician, Josiah Browne, who died in 1924 at just 40 years of age. The New Testament is filled with tales of Jesus healing the lame, the blind, the deaf and those with mental illness. The window shows Jesus gently offering healing to a crippled man holding his crutch. He is supported by a woman, perhaps his wife or daughter, and they stare hopefully at the master physician. Jesus's halo is a red cross on a white surround; his robes are a rich drapery of white and gold. The rich colouring throughout reflects the 'Arts and Crafts' style as do the natural elements: flowers, leaves, trees. Scattered above and below the scene are symbols of the medical profession: a jar of ointment, a mortar and pestle, the Rod of Asclepius (snake on a pole).

The window at the Church of St Peter in Bromyard was designed by A.J. Davies and bears this inscription: "The Lord hath created medicines out of the earth. He hath given man skill that he might be honoured in his marvellous works."














Tref y Clawdd WI






Celtic Saint of the Month St Ultan of Ardbraccan – 4th September – died c. 657

St Ultan was a very talented member of the O'Connor clan of Meath, though he is best known for his care for poor young orphaned children. During the 7th century the Yellow Plague was raging through Europe and the British Isles, including County Meath in Ireland, where Ultan was abbot or bishop, or perhaps both. Many adults died of the plague, leaving orphaned children. Ultan cared for as many as he could, as many as 150 at a time. He is said to have invented the feeding bottle or, at least, this is the first mention in literature of such a thing. He bought cows' teats, filled them with milk and used them to feed the babies. A rann in the Leabhar Breac says of him,

"The great sinless prince, in whom the little ones are flourishing, greatly play the children round Ultan of Ard Breccain."

Ultan succeeded St Breccan as Abbot-Bishop of Ardbraccan around 570. There he founded a school and it is said he educated and fed thousands of poor students from all over Ireland. Among his many talents, he was the one who collected the writings and miracles of St Brigid, adding his own illuminations to this and other manuscripts. He wrote beautiful hymns as well, including one in praise of St Brigid for her part in bringing the Gospel of Christ to Ireland: Christus in nostra insula (Christ in our island). He also collected stories about the life of St Patrick, which were used as a source for later writers, especially Tírechán.

St Ultan's Church was part of a small monastery and St Ultan's Well can still be visited. Unfortunately it has now run dry, due to nearby zinc mining, but it is still a place of pilgrimage, especially on the eve of St Ultan's Day. The church itself was destroyed many times, by Vikings at first and later by various Irish insurgents. The present building is 18th century, but is no longer in use. The parish church is now at Bohermeen, but still dedicated to St Ultan.

Inspired by the story of St Ultan's care for children, medical doctor and political activist Dr Kathleen Lynn established St Ultan's Infant Hospital in 1919 at 37 Charlemont Street in Dublin. Her work with Dublin's inner-city poor led her

to open up a hospital specifically for mothers and infants in response to the high infant mortality rate in the city, extreme poverty and living conditions at the time. It was the only hospital in Ireland entirely managed by women. Every year, the hospital organised a pilgrimage and a picnic to the site of St. Ultan's Well in Ardbraccan. The hospital closed in 1984 and merged with the National Children's Hospital.







Knucklas Notes

There have been a large number of fetes, carnivals and shows all around the area including, in Knucklas, the highly successful Village Fete and the more relaxing Allotments Open Day. Both required a great deal of dedicated work by the organisers and helpers but were blessed by fine weather and a great atmosphere. Further afield, the Royal Welsh Show seems to go from strength to strength and must be one of the finest of its kind in the country and beyond.

But there is more to come; not least Herefordshire Arts Week which can boast six different venues in Knucklas alone and notably, at Knucklas Community Centre, a joint exhibition by four local artists along with a continuing supply of refreshments including even light lunches! This venture was very popular last year. The Hall and the artists' studios are open daily from **Saturday 6th until Sunday 14th September**, 11am until 5pm.

Chancel Repair Funds - What's that all about?

If you look at your church's statement of accounts you may have noticed details about the income and capital of one of these. The Church in Wales currently has the administration of 318 of these worth around £2.5 million in total and ranging from a value of approximately £70,000 to £30.

Dating back to Medieval times the obligation for the repair and upkeep of the Chancel (the separate part of the church where the altar and choir stalls are usually to be found) fell to the Rector, who would receive income from tithes, glebe lands and other such sources to assist with this obligation.

Centuries passed and these lands and assets changed hands in ever more complicated ways until the 1836 Tithe Act replaced the somewhat unwieldy tithes, being a **tenth of produce** (hence tithe barns for storage) with **an annual monetary tithe rent payment.**

Various Church of England institutions, including the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, acquired the right to receive these tithe rent-charges and then, following the disestablishment in 1914 under the Welsh Church Act, those rights for our churches passed to the Church in Wales.

1936 when tithe rent-charges were abolished by statute, certain institutional bodies who had the right to receive these payments were issued stock in compensation for the loss of income.

The Tithe Act of 1936 then empowered the Church in Wales to stipulate how these funds were to be held and run and those regulations were adopted in 1937 and never amended until, in 1988, that power was repealed by the UK Parliament.

So - what was the problem?

Only the **income** from these funds and **not the capital sum** could be used and **only** for the **upkeep of the chancel.** However, many chancels were in good shape whilst other parts of the church were badly in need of repair.

Many of the funds were too small for their income to be of any use. Also, the administration of these funds was unproportionally costly in time and money, there were issues when a church closes, and any application to use these funds involved an onerous process.

What was the answer?

To amend the regulations so that the capital could be used as well as the income, and work on all parts of the church structure could be eligible. Also to rationalise the ways other problem issues are dealt with.

Fortunately the Charity Commission indicated that they have the power to make an order to achieve this purpose without involving an Act of Parliament and those amendments were established in October 2024.

So - what does this mean for individual churches?

Now, if you need to do work on the structure of any part of your church building you can refer the matter to the Ministry Area Council, with an indication of what you need to do and quotes from builders.

Subject to their approval an application can then be made for shares to be sold at one of the quarterly sales so that funds can be released to cover the cost of the repairs.

St Cynllo's has been very grateful to be able to use our Fund to pay for the recent work to the masonry of the tower and gable end walls of both transept and chancel. The process has been very straightforward, with everyone involved offering greatly appreciated help and advice.

I hope this information is of some use. Good luck with any project that your Chancel Repair Fund might be able to support.

Cyril's Diary

Ann Edwards, from Beguildy post office and shop, has come into possession of her Uncle Cyril's diary. In 1920 Cyril was 18 years old and he decided to leave home for New Zealand, voyaging on RMS Corinthic. Here are some extracts of the final days of the voyage before the start of his new adventure in New Zealand.

Wednesday 17th March 1920 (St Patrick's)

This morning we came to Colon and we were very much impressed as we drew near to the land and saw the wonderful trees and scenery. The Panama Canal is absolutely H.

We see alligators, lizards, etc. there are some monkeys in the palm trees on the banks by the side of the boat. Deers, tigers, jaguars, lions and all kinds of wild animals abound in the wild around here.

The scenery is grand, all kinds of palm and cactus of most wonderful green grow here. It is all hilly at present, but of course we have not gone very far at present.

Tonight we are having an Irish concert and dance and I am looking forward to it immensely. I am now going to look for snakes in the bank.

Saturday 20th

Last night I saw a grotesque sight. (I hope that is a suitable word.) The sea is awfully calm with scarcely a ripple and the fish get the "breeze up" and rise near the surface and swim away quickly. One can see this because they are covered in phosphorus and their shape is awfully clear, and they leave a long lighted trail behind them.

Sunday 27st

We are about to cross over the line and we are looking forward with great excitement to the doings of King Neptune. There is a very old custom, which is nearly always carried out on all ships which enter the equatorial waters. King Neptune, Ruler of the Seven Seas, is a very stern ruler and any person entering his Equatorial Domain for the first time, without the permission of this Majesty, does so at his or her own risk.


Saturday 29th



A Tribute to Derrick Price

From a 10 year old boy with his own little bell, to an 89 year old leading his town's carnival parade, Town Crier Derrick Price was a Knighton legend. Always leading the town's carnival procession, attending the annual Remembrance Day event and turning up to hundreds of other town events in his smart costume with gleaming shoes and of course, his bell.

Derrick, 90, passed away at Llanidloes Hospital on Monday, July 14, after being the town crier for 60 years. Born and bred in Knighton, Derrick's childhood ambition was not to be a town crier like his great-grandfather, grandfather and father. He swore he would not follow in their footsteps and take on a role that had been in his family since 1863, but when, in 1960, his father died, his opposition ceased overnight. Within a week of his father's death he was out delivering his first cry. Since then he's been a fixture in Knighton and the surrounding areas, and has even performed duties at events overseas.

For many years he and friends organised the Wales and Border Town Crier's Competition in Knighton, attracting criers from all over the area for a weekend of fun. As President of Grove Golf Club in Leominster he would present caps and trophies to the junior players as well as enjoy a round or two of golf himself. His efforts were rewarded when he received the Ancient and Honourable Guild of Town Criers' highest honour in 2009, and he was awarded an MBE in 2004.

His role was essentially ceremonial, but when his great-grandfather, grandfather and father were town criers it was an official position with responsibilities. As well as making traditional announcements, in years gone by the town crier was a bailiff, would wake workers in the mornings, and light the town's gas lamps. In the mid-1800s his great-grandfather was even responsible for announcing the auctions of women in Knighton. Such an auction would be incongruous now, but it was a means of divorce in the 1800s.

Derrick was a general builder in his everyday life, but his home has a sign saying 'Town Crier's House' and his builder's board had a picture of him as town crier on it. Derrick enjoyed his role as a figurehead in the town, once saying; "I'm the fourth generation of town crier in Knighton and I've enjoyed every minute of it. I have met some wonderful people, not just from this country, but from around the world."

Derrick was the mayor of the town five times between 1984 and 2002, and he served on the town council for about 44 years. He leaves behind his wife Margaret, his son Philip and daughter Debbie and grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

His family said: "Derrick was always willing to help people out, he was very kind hearted and would help anyone. He did lots of voluntary work and he was the caretaker at the church hall up until he went into hospital. Both Clun and Knighton Carnivals will miss him and one person said 'another legend has gone'.

Former Knighton Mayor Councillor Chris Branford said: "Derrick was a great ambassador for Knighton. As town crier Derrick led the procession for the carnival for many years. I was pleased and grateful to lead the carnival parade with Derrick last year. Unfortunately, it was Derrick's final walk for the carnival.

"Derrick will be greatly missed far and wide. He was loyal, always reliable and very hard working. My love and thoughts go to Margaret and his family. He was a one-off gentleman and friend."





September 14th Holy Cross

The cross on which our Lord was crucified has become the universal symbol for Christianity, replacing the fish symbol of the early church, though the latter has been revived in recent times. After the end of the persecution era, early in the fourth century, pilgrims began to travel to Jerusalem to visit and pray at the places associated with the life of Jesus. Helena, the mother of the emperor, was a Christian and, whilst overseeing excavations in the city, is said to have uncovered a cross, which many believed to be the Cross of Christ. A basilica was built on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and dedicated on this day in the year 335.

September 21st Matthew the Apostle & Evangalist

Matthew appears in the list of the twelve apostles of Jesus and, according to the gospel written under his name, was a tax collector. Mark and Luke called the tax collector Levi, and it has been assumed that they are one and the same. This occupation was despised by his fellow Jews as a betrayal to the occupying Roman force, but Christ showed that judging by outward appearance was not what he was about. He ate with Matthew and with his friends, scandalising those around him. Matthew affirmed that his life would now change because of following Jesus, and that he would make amends for any former wrongdoing. This was enough for Jesus, for he had drawn someone back to God. He was forgiven; therefore, he was acceptable, therefore he was received.






