

Harvest Time

Looking Back on Harvest Festival Celebrations

In the Autumn, churches across various denominations in Britain celebrate a Harvest Festival. The "Harvest Festival" is said to be primarily a Victorian innovation rooted in biblical themes.

The Bible mentions several festivals associated with the harvest. The Feast of Weeks, known as Shavuot, signified the commencement of the harvest season with the collection of the first fruits, while the Feast of Ingathering, or Sukkot, celebrated the conclusion of the harvest when all produce was collected and safely gathered in.

There is no fixed date for Harvest Festivals. In this country, these celebrations usually occur on a single day in either September or October and in rural communities, the Harvest Festival has become a significant annual event, often attracting a large congregation to the service.

In years gone by, when there was a plentiful national harvest, a designated Thanksgiving Day was established by the Church of England to express gratitude to God for the bounty. These were referred to as Harvest Thankgivings and held from the late 18th Century to the middle years of the 19th Century.

By the 1860s the concept of an annual Harvest Thanksgiving service had gained popularity within the church calendar and by the 1870s were also being held by non-conformist churches. St Paul's Cathedral in London hosted its inaugural service in 1874.

In the early days of Harvest Thanksgivings, the church was adorned with the final sheaf of corn from the harvest. As time progressed, the decorations grew increasingly elaborate, with parishioners contributing a colourful selection of flowers, fruit and vegetables. A traditional which continues today.

Harvests Around the World

Around the world, harvests are celebrated in different ways in different places and happen at different times of the year.

Canada in October and USA in November have "Thanksgiving" and people celebrate by enjoying a family roast dinner and think about the time when Pilgrims (who had just arrived in America) had their first crop of wheat and shared food with the Native Americans. It is a national holiday and everyone has the day off.

In Barbados a special "Crop Over" harvest is held in June when it is time to harvest the sugar cane. The whole island celebrates with concerts, dancing and fastest cane cutter competitions.

The wine harvest in Argentina has amazing parades and festivals with musicians, food, entertainers and dancers. A Harvest Queen is chosen who then sets off a fantastic firework display.

In West Africa, there is a celebration called "The Festival of Yams" usually in August. It is held in the hope of averting famine in the coming year and people celebrate by dancing and sharing the vegetables with the village.

The continent of Asia has a variety of festivals. Some areas of Thailand celebrate the fruit harvest with competitions, art displays and making floats from thousands of tropical fruits and vegetables.

In Indonesia, during the rice harvest of May and June, villages are covered with bright flags, simple bamboo temples are put in the corners of the fields and small rice dolls are placed in the stores to keep evil spirits away.

"The Harvest Moon Festival" in mid-autumn is loved by people in China and looked forward to all year. Coinciding with the full moon, they believe this is the best time for harvest, ceremonies are held both to give thanks and to encourage the harvest-giving light to return again in the coming year. It is also a time for friendship, people try and see friends and family they haven't seen all year, and together enjoy picnics, the bright lanterns, eat mooncakes and watch puppet shows.

In our Ministry Area, the churches of Whitton, Heyope and Pilleth will begin the "Harvest Festival Season" holding their services in September and the other churches in October. We look forward to coverage of these in the next editions of The Radnor.



Dear Friends

About the Cover - Angels and Music

The angel on the cover holds a portable organ. He, along with an angel holding a harp, accompany St. Thomas, the Patron Saint of the church in Douglas on the Isle of Man. The angels represent worship of God through music. They fill the world and heaven with divine music, representing our prayers to the Lord, and the Lord's prayers to us, through music. This connection, while not explicitly biblical, offers a fascinating insight into the perceived relationship between prayer, music, and the divine.

The original coloured glass window was replaced in 1927 by this beautiful stained glass window. It was given by the children of William and Emma Clegg. Fittingly, William was the church organist. The stained glass is the work of Messrs. Jones and Willis, a Birmingham firm established in 1847 who later opened premises in London and Liverpool.

Celtic Saint of the Month Colman of Templeshambo – 27th October c. 595

All good things come to an end. This is probably my last Celtic Saint of the Month. For the last five years I have been discovering saints who ministered, evangelised and founded churches throughout the Celtic nations and beyond. It has been hard to find the facts among the legends and traditions. Many saints *Lives* were written many years later, based on oral tradition, often for political reasons, and we have the names of places, villages, holy wells and churches which indicate who lived or travelled there as founder of a church (llan) or monastic community (clas). Over the last few years we have probably included most of the saints of Wales, Ireland, Scotland, Cornwall, Brittany and the Isle of Man that we have interesting stories about. There are many more of whom we only know the names of the churches they founded and their stories have been lost. Looking at Wales alone, there are about 800 saints we know of from the 6th to 8th centuries, at least 30 with feast days in October.

Have you heard of Giraldus Cambrensis, Gerald of Wales? He was Archdeacon of Brecon in the 12th century, though he really wanted to be Bishop of St David's, but this was overruled by King Henry I, who reckoned he would be a trouble-maker, particularly as there was a campaign to make St David's an archbishopric, equivalent to the Archbishop of Canterbury. (It took another 800 years for the Welsh Church to become independent of the See of Canterbury.) Not that the king didn't respect him, in fact Gerald became a chaplain to the king in 1184 and was chosen to accompany the king's son, John, on a visit to Ireland. This is what started Gerald's literary career, for he wrote a history of Ireland, entitled *Topographia Hibernica*. This was followed by his next appointment, which was to accompany the Archbishop of Canterbury on a tour of Wales, actually a recruitment campaign for the Third Crusade. This resulted in two more important literary works, the *Itinerarium Cambriae* and the *Descriptio Cambriae*, still two valuable historical documents.

Now we come to our saint of the month, not Welsh but Irish, as recorded by Gerald of Wales, Colman of Templeshambo. Colman lived in the 6th century in Connacht. His monastery, Temple Sean Bothe, means the Temple of the Old Bothy. He is known for his love of ducks, especially the teal that lived in the pond by Colman's holy well. These teal were under Colman's special protection and could not be harmed. The story goes that that one night the cook scooped up water from the pond to boil the evening meal, but the water remained cold. When someone looked inside the pot, they saw a little

duck swimming around. The duck was rescued and taken back to the pond, whereupon the water started to boil. There are other stories: a kite, who caught a teal, was paralysed until the teal escaped, and a fox who tried

to eat a teal choked on the little bird. Hopefully it was rescued.







To answer the question posed in last month's interesting article, Memories of Felindre Village Shop and Post Office, yes, there was a connection between Knighton and Felindre's Meredith Thomas shops.

In my book *Upper Teme Valley Memories*, Mr. Jack Jones, who grew up at The Wharf during the First World War tells us:

"Mr Meredith Thomas kept The Stores next door to The Wharf, and the family also had two shops in Knighton. There were seven or eight assistants in the shop and the warehouse. Upstairs seven ladies worked in the tailoring and outfitting department: seamstresses, stitchers, ironers, pressers and fitters. When new black clothes were ordered for a funeral, staff from the Knighton shops would be called upon to assist."

Many thanks to all who contributed to making St Cynllo's a welcoming place, for those who provided food for thought as well as stomachs and, of course, for everyone who attended.



















St Luke - Wordsearch

To St Luke, whose feast-day is 18th October, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.

Is there a spiritual revival going on among our young people?

A leading Roman Catholic professor of Pastoral Theology at the University of Vienna thinks that this may well be so. For the Revd Paul Zulehner says that while Church is still losing young people, it is also gaining them.

"We're clearly witnessing a protest against mainstream secularisation, as groups of youngsters yearn for re-spiritualisation or re-enchantment. Many are looking for meaning beyond material success, when such perceptions have become enfeebled in our pluralistic societies."

Professor Zulehner was speaking to the Church Times after the recent Roman Catholic Church's Jubilee of Youth, which attracted a million-strong gathering in Rome, led by Pope Leo XIV.

Meanwhile, in Britain, Youth for Christ, an international evangelical youth ministry, has reported that weekly church attendance by young people had doubled from four to eight percent in five years. YFC said that half of young people were now declaring a belief in God, and 96 per cent express an openness to "supernatural experience".

The report also said that the number of younger people claiming to pray regularly had also increased sharply, although it is still small. 65 per cent said that they now viewed churches "positively", compared with just eight per cent in 2020 — defying "every prediction about declining religious engagement".

Professor Zulehner added that while many young people are sceptical about institutional Churches, they have found a "medium and language" through social media for sharing their religious interests.

He told Church Times: "Gospel influences are at work through Instagram, TikTok, and the networks today's youngsters rely on, which may ultimately prove as important in finding followers for Christ as the Church's leaders and traditions."

The Gates of the Kingdom


Give us, O God, the needs the body feels,
